A meeting was held of the Board of Education of the School District No. 17, in the County of Douglas in the State of Nebraska. This meeting was convened in open and public session at 7:00 p.m., Monday, March 17, 2008, at the Don Stroh Administration Center, 5606 South 147th Street.

Notice of this meeting was given in advance thereof by publication in the Daily Record on, March 14, 2008; a copy of the publication is being attached to these minutes. Notice of this meeting was given to all members of the Board of Education and a copy of their Acknowledgment of Receipt of Notice and the agenda are attached to these minutes. Availability of the agenda was communicated in advance notice and in the notice of the Board of Education of this meeting. All proceedings hereafter shown were taken while the convened meeting was open to the attendance of the public.

At 7:00 p.m. Jean Stothert called the meeting to order and announced that the public meeting act is posted on the wall and available for public inspection. Mrs. Stothert asked everyone to say the Pledge of Allegiance.

Roll call was taken and all members were present.

Motion by Mike Kennedy, seconded by Brad Burwell, to approve the Board of Education Minutes from March 3, 2008, to approve bills, and to receive the treasurer's report and place on file. Upon roll call vote, all members voted aye. Motion carried.

Showcase: Officer Tony Ward introduced Dolli, an 18-month old yellow lab who is Millard's drug dog. Middle School students were honored for Nebraska Young Artist Awards, Nebraska State Visual Arts Competition, UNO Choir, and All-State Band.

Superintendent's Comments:

On Thursday, the Learning Community Superintendents will be meeting with Senators Raikes and Kopplin to discuss the financial implications of proposed amendments to LB988.

Today and tomorrow the board of education and administrators will be meeting with the International Baccalaureate group at Aldrich Elementary in regards to the elementary IB program.

The Learning Community superintendents met last week with representatives from the Building Bright Futures group, and will again meet with them this week.

The week of April 7th is spring break for the Millard Public Schools.

Board Comments:

Dave Anderson reported that he attended a meeting of area board of education members who were invited to meet with the Building Bright Futures group on March 6, 2008. There was a small turnout to hear the presentation by John Cavanaugh to give an update on their initiatives. This wasn't anything different from what Dr. Lutz has told the Board of Education, he noted. The Building Bright Futures group initially started with presentations to the community, and then to board members. It looks as though the Building Bright Futures group is trying to move into an implementation mode, Mr. Anderson reported.

Mr. Anderson attended a community input session at Millard North High School by students in the MYP International Baccalaureate program where they presented their personal projects, which is required in the

program. He noted that it was interesting to talk with the kids about their projects, and what they thought they could do differently. He said overall they were extremely well done by these sophomore students.

Mr. Anderson said he attended the NASB Board of Directors meeting last Saturday. He indicated it was a standard meeting with approval of the budget, and discussion of the possibility of losing Medicaid reimbursement program. Although an email was received today from the federal government in regards to funding this program.

Brad Burwell said he attended the interview in regards to the primary year's International Baccalaureate program at Aldrich Elementary. He indicated this was a very positive meeting.

Mr. Burwell announced that he has been selected to be the Master of Ceremonies for the District spelling bee being next week in Millard.

Linda Poole said she attended the NASB Board of Director's meeting last Saturday.

Mrs. Poole also attended the interview of board members at Aldrich. She talked with the principal and was told the IB group was impressed with the members of the board of education.

Mrs. Poole said she was going to be visiting Abbott Elementary and Disney Elementary.

Mrs. Poole reported that she will be leaving next Wednesday to attend a national board meeting on Thursday, and a delegate assembly on Friday. The National School Board Conference will be held Saturday through Tuesday.

Mike Pate said there was a Foundation Board meeting last Thursday. The board approved \$350,000 for classroom grants for this year. He said this shows how committed the Foundation is for the Classroom Grants program. During the meeting they also approved numerous scholarships. Mr. Pate reminded everyone about the Foundation Hall of Fame Banquet will be held on Friday, May 9, 2008 at the Qwest Center. He invited everyone to mark their calendars for the event.

Mr. Pate encouraged corporate sponsors and individuals to participate in the Foundation's Annual Golf Tournament, which will be held on Friday, June 6, 2008 at the Players Club at Deer Creek.

The new Foundation office building is scheduled for completion by the end of July.

Jean Stothert said she attended the Metropolitan Area Boards of Education meeting last week. She said there were members from every school district. They shared information on policies for student's freedom of expression with student newspapers, and what each school district offers for summer school. Mrs. Stothert said that Millard is the only district that allows students from outside of Millard to participate in their summer school. A few members were going to check with their district on their summer school programs because they didn't know if outside students could attend.

Mrs. Stothert said there was a lot of confusion about the election of the Learning Community Council, and especially about the appointment of school board members. None of the members agreed on how the election would take place, or how the appointment of board members would take place. The group will be inviting Senator Raikes, or a representative from his office, to come and explain his legislative bill.

Students of school age residing in the District, students who have at least one (1) parent residing in the District, and students of school age who may be by law allowed to attend the District's schools without charge, shall be permitted to enroll in the District's schools tuition-free.

Nonresident students may apply for enrollment in the District pursuant to the District's Option Enrollment Program. Nonresident students not accepted through the District's Option Enrollment Program may seek enrollment pursuant with District Rule 5100.1 (III) (C) and (D) 5100.1 (III) (A)(3) and (4)

The District may accept foreign exchange students when space permits and such students are legally residing in the United States. Foreign exchange students are encouraged to participate in the curriculum of the school they attend in a manner which promotes the education of other students.

District personnel shall determine final grade placement for students transferring from non-public schools or from schools outside of the District.

All students must comply with federal and state health laws and regulations.

Enrollment of Students/Residency Requirements

5100.1

I. Rules Governing the Enrollment of Students

- A. <u>Enrollment of Resident Students</u>. Students of school age residing in the District, students who have at least one (1) parent residing in the District, and students of school age who may be by law allowed to attend the District's schools without charge, shall be permitted to enroll in the District's schools tuition-free.
- B. Questionnaire Form. Students who reside in the District with a person other than the student's parents or legal guardian will be required to complete District and Nebraska Department of Education questionnaire forms which shall include, among other things, the name and address of the contact person for medical emergencies, student disciplinary matters, school conferences, and truancy. The forms must be completed and returned to the District within the time-frame set by the District.
- C. Enrollment of Future Residents. Students whose parents or guardian are planning to become District residents in the reasonably near future may be enrolled in the District tuition-free. Reasonable proof of future residency will be required by the District prior to enrollment. If the parents or guardian of such student have not become District residents within nine (9) weeks of enrollment, the student may be excluded from further attendance until residency is established.
- D. <u>Homeless Children and Youth</u>. Children and youths who are homeless and who request admission, shall be admitted according to the following:
 - 1. The students defined in state law as homeless children or youths shall be admitted without payment of tuition.
 - 2. The Director of Pupil Services will be notified and provide placement when a homeless child or youth needs to be enrolled.
- E. Expelled Students. A student who has been expelled from a public school in any school district in any state or from a private, denominational, or parochial school in any state and who has not completed the terms of the expulsion, shall not be permitted to enroll in the District until the District's Board approves, by a majority vote, the enrollment of the student. As a condition of such enrollment, the District's Board may require attendance in an alternative school, class or education program pursuant to Nebraska Revised Statute §79-266 until the terms of the expulsion are completed. A student who has been expelled from a private, denominational, or parochial school or from a school in another state may not be prohibited from enrolling in the District for any period of time beyond the time limits placed on expulsion pursuant to the Student Discipline Act or for any expulsion for an offense for which expulsion is not authorized for a public school student under the Student Discipline Act, if the student is a resident of the District or the student has been accepted pursuant to the District's Option Enrollment Program.

II. Resident Students Who Move During the School Year

A. Students who move out of the District during the school year may continue attending school in the District for the remainder of the school year tuition-free.

III. Enrollment of Nonresident Students

- A. The District may admit the following nonresident students:
 - 1. Students who have at least one (1) parent residing in the District.
 - 2. Students accepted through the District's Option Enrollment Program.
 - 3. Nonresident students from Nebraska may be admitted pursuant to a contract with the school district where the student is a resident, with the payment and collection of tuition pursuant to the contract.
 - 4. Nonresident students of another state may be admitted, with the advance payment of tuition at a rate determined by the Board.
- B. Nonresident students may not attend schools which are closed to option enrollment due to capacity standards. Nonresident students may request enrollment at any District school which is not closed to option enrollment.

IV. Wards of the State or a Court

A. Any student who is a ward of the state or a ward of any court and who resides in a foster family home within the District which is licensed or approved by the Department of Health and Human Services or who resides in a foster home within the District which is maintained or used pursuant to Nebraska Revised Statute §83-108.04 shall be deemed a resident of the District. Students who are placed in foster homes within the District by individuals, or by agencies other than the Department of Health and Human Services or in foster homes which are not maintained or used pursuant to Nebraska Revised Statute § 83-108.04, as hereinbefore provided, shall be required to complete a residency questionnaire and shall be subject to the same residency requirements as other nonresident students seeking enrollment in the District.

V. Improper Enrollment

- A. If a student is improperly enrolled in the District, the District in its sole discretion may:
 - 1. Exclude the student from the schools of the District and charge tuition for the time period that the student was improperly enrolled; or
 - 2. Permit the nonresident student to remain enrolled as a nonresident student provided tuition is paid in advance.

VI. Illegal Aliens

A. Illegal aliens will not be denied a public education based on their illegal alien status.

VII. **Definitions**

A. "Guardian" shall mean a person or agent of an institution who has been named by a court of competent jurisdiction to be the legal guardian of a student.

- B. "Homeless child or youth" shall mean:
 - 1. An individual who lacks a fixed, regular, and adequate nighttime residence; and
 - 2. An individual who has a primary nighttime residence that is:
 - A supervised publicly or privately operated shelter designed to provide temporary living accommodations including welfare hotels, congregate shelters, and transitional housing;
 - b. An institution that provides a temporary residence for individuals intended to be institutionalized; or
 - A public or private place not designed for, or ordinarily, used as a regular sleeping accommodation for human beings.
 - 3. The term "homeless child or youth" does not include any individual imprisoned or otherwise detained pursuant to an Act of the Congress or a State law.
- C. "Improper enrollment" shall mean students enrolled in the District who do not meet the residency, option enrollment, or other statutory requirements to enable tuition-free admission into the District.
- D. "Parents" shall mean the biological parents of the student or a person who has adopted the student in a court of competent jurisdiction.

Enrollment of Students

Kindergarten Age, Proof of Identity, Physical Examination and Immunization, Instructional Level Placement

5100.2

- I. <u>Admission to Kindergarten: Age Requirement.</u> The District shall not admit any child into kindergarten unless such child has reached the age of five (5) years or will reach such age on or before October 15 of the current year with the following exception:
 - A. The Board may admit a child who will reach the age of five (5) between October 16 and February 1 of the current school year if the parent or guardian requests such entrance and provides an affidavit stating that:
 - 1. The child attended kindergarten in another jurisdiction in the current school year; or
 - 2. The family anticipates a relocation to another jurisdiction that would allow admission within the current school year; or
 - 3. The child has demonstrated through recognized assessment procedures approved by the Board that he or she is capable of carrying the work of kindergarten.
 - a. Recognized Assessment procedures that the district's Educational Services Division follows include:
 - i. A parent/guardian wishing to have their child considered for early entrance must be a resident within the Millard Public Schools boundary.
 - ii. The parent/guardian must attend a parent meeting about early entrance testing.
 - iii. The assessment date and time will be scheduled at the end of the parent meeting.
 - iv. The parent/guardian must bring to the testing center, prior to testing:
 - Consent for Evaluation,
 - Copy of the child's birth certificate,
 - Complete the Social/Emotional Adaptive Skills Inventory during the testing session,
 - A fee paid to the Millard Public Schools
 - v. Early entrance into kindergarten will be based on meeting or exceeding all assessment cutscores.
 - vi. A report will be provided the parent/guardian and a copy placed in the child's school record.
 - vii. If the child will be accepted into kindergarten, information will be shared with receiving school personnel.
 - viii. If the child meets the criteria for early entrance they must attend full-day.
 - b. Assessment Components include, but are not limited to:
 - Screening Assessment for Gifted Elementary Students SAGES-2, administered by qualified district personnel (a score at or above the normal range based on 5 years, 7 months, the average age for a beginning kindergartner in Millard)
 - ii. Early math (counting, number recognition within the average range)
 - iii. Reading (alphabet, letter sounds, phonemic awareness, concepts of print w/ three book levels within the average range)
 - iv. The BASC is completed by parents (60% or higher)

- v. Visual motor screening (within the average range)
- vi. Slosson Test or APPSI-II will be administered if more information is needed (Quotient of 120 or higher)
- vii. Other assessments deemed necessary
- II. Proof of Age and Identity, Physical Examination, and Immunization.
 - A. Upon enrollment of a student in the District, the enrolling school shall:
 - 1. Require compliance with the physical examination requirements of District Rule 5600.3(I).
 - 2. Require compliance with the immunization requirements of District Rule 5600.3(II) and (III).
 - 3. Notify in writing the person enrolling the student that if a birth certificate or other reliable proof was not provided upon enrollment that he or she must provide within thirty (30) days either:
 - a. A certified copy of the student's birth certificate; or
 - b. Other reliable proof of the student's identity and age, along with an affidavit explaining the inability tot produce a copy of the birth certificate.
 - B. If a certified copy of a birth certificate cannot be produced, then other reliable proof (in order of preference) of the student's identity and age must be provided along with an affidavit explaining the inability to produce a copy of the birth certificate:
 - 1. Baptismal certificate;
 - 2. Passport;
 - 3. Immigration certificate; or
 - 4. Bible record.
 - C. Upon failure of the parent or guardian to comply with the preceding paragraph, written notice shall be given to the parent or guardian that unless he or she complies within ten (10) days the matter shall be referred to the local law enforcement agency for investigation. If compliance is not obtained in such ten (10) day period, then the matter shall be immediately reported to the local law enforcement agency. Any affidavit received pursuant to the preceding paragraph that appears inaccurate or suspicious in form or content shall be reported immediately to the local law enforcement agency.

III. Withdrawal (Age 6 and Below).

- A. In accordance with the Nebraska Compulsory Education Law, any person with legal or actual charge or control of a child who will reach (6) years of age prior to January 1 of the then-current school year, may discontinue the enrollment of such child by meeting with the principal and providing the following documentation:
 - 1. A signed affidavit stating that the person intends for the child to participate in a non-accredited or non-approved school and the person intends to provide the Commissioner of Education with a statement pursuant to Nebraska Revised Statute § 790-1601 (3) on or before the child's seventh birthday; or

- 2. A signed affidavit stating that the child is participating in an education program that the person believes will prepare the child to enter grade one (1) for the following year.
- 3. The principal shall notify the Director of Pupil Services of the withdrawal.
- B. In accordance with the Nebraska Compulsory Education Law, any person with legal or actual charge or control of a child who will not reach six (6) years of age prior to January 1 of the then-current school year, may discontinue the enrollment of such child by meeting with the principal and completing the building withdrawal procedures. The principal shall notify the Director of Pupil Services of the withdrawal.
- V. <u>Transfer from Other Schools: Instructional Level Placement</u>. Students who apply for initial admission to the District's schools by transfer from non-public schools or from schools outside the District will be initially placed on the same instructional level as the school from which they transferred pending their observation and evaluation by classroom teachers, Pupil Services' staff, and the school principal. The school principal will determine the final placement of such students after the District's observation and evaluation have been completed.

Nonresident Students: Enrollment Option Program

5100.3

I. General Statement. Nebraska law enables any kindergarten through twelfth grade Nebraska student to attend a school in a Nebraska public school district in which the student does not reside subject to limitation standards authorized by law and adopted by the public school district. The option is only available once to each student prior to graduation unless the student relocates in a different resident school district; or the option school district is a Class I district.

II. Standards for Acceptance and Rejection.

A. Capacity. The Board shall annually adopt a resolution on or before April 1 setting forth its specific standards for acceptance and rejection of applications as an option school. The Board's adoption of a resolution before April 1 does not preclude the Board from adopting a subsequent resolution on or before April 1 with specific standards partially or wholly different from its previous resolution(s). The standards may include the capacity of a program, class, grade level, or school building, or the availability of appropriate special education programs. Capacity shall be determined by setting a maximum number of option students that the District will accept in any program, class, grade level, or school building, based upon available staff, facilities, projected enrollment of resident students, projected number of students with which the District will contract based on existing contractual agreements, and availability of appropriate special education programs. Standards shall not include previous academic achievement, athletic or other extracurricular ability, disabilities, proficiency in the English language, or previous disciplinary proceedings except as provided in Neb. Rev. Stat. §79-266.01.

The District may by resolution declare a program, class, or school unavailable to option students due to a lack of capacity. If the District declares that a program, class, or school is unavailable to option students due to a lack of capacity, the District will set forth in the resolution the maximum number of students it has determined constitutes capacity of its programs, classes, grade levels, and school buildings based upon available staff, facilities, projected enrollment of resident students, projected number of students with which the District will contract based on existing contractual arrangements, and availability of appropriate special education programs.

B. <u>First Priority</u>. The District shall give first priority for enrollment to option students whose request for enrollment would aid the racial integration of the District and the resident school district and to siblings of option students, except that the District shall not be required to accept the sibling of an option student if the District is at capacity except as provided for in Neb. Rev. Stat. §§ 79-240 (2) and (4).

III. Application, Cancellation, and Student Records.

A. <u>Application</u>. To attend an option school district, the student's parents or legal guardian shall submit an application to the board of education of the option school district between September 1 and March 15 for enrollment during the following and subsequent school years. If the District is the option school district, the application shall be delivered to the office of the Superintendent or Superintendent's designee. Applications submitted after March 15 must be accompanied by a written release from the resident school district. The option school district shall provide the resident school district with the name of the applicant on or before April 1.

The application shall set forth in detail the substantial educational opportunity available to the option student in the option school district that is unavailable in the resident school district. A particular

- school within a school district may be requested, but the school assignment of the option student shall be determined by the option school district.
- B. Cancellation. No option student shall attend an option school district for less than one (1) school year unless the student relocates to a different resident school district, completes requirements for graduation prior to the end of the student's senior year, transfers to a private or parochial school, or upon mutual agreement of the resident and option school district to cancel the enrollment option and return to the resident school district. Except as provided in the preceding sentence, the option student shall attend the option school district until graduation unless the student relocates in a different resident school district, transfers to a private or parochial school, or chooses to return to the resident school district. In case of cancellation, the student's parents or legal guardian shall notify the school boards of the option and resident school districts and the Department of Education by March 15 for automatic approval for the following school year.
- C. <u>Application and Cancellation Forms</u>. The student's parents or legal guardian shall use the application and cancellation forms furnished by the Department of Education.
- D. <u>Waiver of Deadlines</u>. Upon agreement of the school boards of the resident and option school districts, the deadlines for application and approval or rejection may be waived.

E. Acceptance.

- 1. <u>Notification of Acceptance</u>. The option school district shall notify, in writing, the parent or legal guardian of the student, the resident school district, and the Department of Education whether or not the application is accepted on or before April 1.
- 2. <u>Automatic Acceptance</u>. The following option students shall be automatically accepted and the deadlines prescribed in Neb. Rev. Stat. § 79-234 shall be waived:
 - a. Students who relocate in a different school district but want to continue attending the original resident school district and who have been enrolled in the original resident school district for the immediately preceding two (2) years.
 - b. Students who relocate in a different school district but want to continue attending the option school district.
- 3. <u>School Assignment</u>. Option students may request a particular school building within the option school district, but the building assignment of the option student shall be determined by the option school district.
- F. <u>Siblings</u>. Siblings of option students shall make their own independent application for attendance as an option student.
- IV. <u>Notification to Applicant of Rejection and Right to Appeal</u>. If an application is rejected by the District in its capacity as an option or resident school district, the District shall state in the notification the reason for the rejection. The parent or legal guardian may appeal the rejection to the State Board of Education within thirty (30) days after the date the notification of the rejection was received by the parent or legal guardian.
- V. <u>Treatment of Option Students</u>. For purposes of all duties, entitlements, and rights established by law, including special education, option students shall be treated as resident students of the option school district unless otherwise provided for by law.
- VI. <u>Accepting Credits</u>. If the District is the option school district, it will accept credits toward graduation that were awarded by the resident school district. Further, the District shall award diplomas to option students if the student meets the District's graduation requirements.

VII. <u>Attendance at Private/Parochial School</u>. An option student who subsequently chooses to attend a private or parochial school shall be automatically accepted to return to either the resident or option school district upon the completion of the grade levels offered at the private or parochial school. If such student chooses to return to the option school district, the student's parents or legal guardian shall submit another application to the option school district's board of education which shall be automatically accepted, and the application deadlines shall be waived.

VIII. Definitions.

- A. "Department of Education" shall mean the Nebraska State Department of Education.
- B. "Enrollment Option Program" shall mean the program established in Neb. Rev. Stat. § 79-232 et seq.
- C. "Option school district" shall mean the public school district that a student chooses to attend other than the student's resident school district.
- D. "Option student" shall mean a student that has chosen to attend a public school district other than the student's resident school district.
- E. "Parents" shall mean, in the case of parents who are divorcing or divorced, the custodial parent.
- F. "Racial integration is aided" if a student transfers to an option school district in which his or her race is a smaller percentage of the total student enrollment of the option school district than it is at the student's resident school district.
- G. "Resident school district" shall mean the public school district in which a student resides.
- H. "Siblings" shall mean all children residing in the same household on a permanent basis who have the same mother or father or who are stepbrother or stepsister to each other.

Enrollment of Students

Foreign Exchange Students

5100.4

I. Admission.

- A. The District will annually approve foreign exchange programs prior to considering and admitting foreign exchange students for the ensuing school year. The Board will be provided with a written list of the foreign exchange programs approved by the District.
- B. The District will accept a maximum of nine (9) students from foreign nations through the District's approved foreign exchange programs unless otherwise determined by the Superintendent.
- C. Foreign exchange students must be at least sixteen (16) years old, but not older than nineteen (19) years old, on or by September 1st of the school year in which the student is going to enroll in the District. Foreign exchange students must not have graduated from high school (or an equivalent educational institution) prior to enrollment in the District.
- D. No foreign exchange student will be enrolled in the District until the foreign exchange student has provided the District with all records and information requested by the District. Foreign exchange students must also comply with any health requirements imposed by state or other governing law.
- E. To be enrolled, acceptance by the District of foreign exchange students must be made prior to the commencement of the school year; no acceptance of foreign exchange students will be made during the school year.

II. Requirements During Attendance in the District.

- A. Foreign exchange students must reside in the District during the school year.
- B. With the exception of providing activity tickets, no District funds will be expended on foreign exchange students unless expressly authorized by the Board.
- C. If practicable, placement of more than one student of a particular foreign nationality in the same high school will be avoided.
- D. Foreign exchange students completing twelfth grade in the District will be provided with an honorary diploma. If a foreign exchange student wishes to receive a District high school diploma, the student must make application to the school principal at the beginning of the school year, and must successfully complete District graduation requirements.
- E. Foreign exchange students are subject to all District Policies and Rules.

Student's Surname

I. Rules Governing Student Surnames.

- A. <u>Enrollment</u>. Students enrolling in the District will be enrolled using the surname used in the student's birth certificate unless the student's surname has been changed by a court of competent jurisdiction in which case the District will use the surname ordered by such court.
- B. <u>District Records</u>. When preparing or filling out records pertaining or relating to a District student, the District will use the surname used in the student's birth certificate unless the student's surname has been changed by a court of competent jurisdiction in which case the District will use the surname ordered by such court.

Enrollment of Students: Enrollment Information

5100.6

I. <u>Collection of Information.</u> At the beginning of each school year, the District will collect enrollment information on paper report forms to provide a baseline for judging the accuracy of the District's computerized database. Paper reports will be used on the third school day and on September 20th; computerized records will be used thereafter.

When a student enrolls during the school year, the principal or principal's designee will be responsible for collecting the applicable census data for all the children in that student's family. The District's administration may develop and implement guidelines and procedures to assist school principals or the principals' designee in obtaining the appropriate census and enrollment information.

II. <u>Contents and Timelines of Enrollment Reports.</u> An accurate enrollment report will be accessible to authorized users on or by the 20th day of each month. It will be the responsibility for each District school to ensure that each student is properly recorded in the District's database.

Student database information shall include each student's:

- A. Grade, teacher (for elementary grade students), race, and sex;
- B. Status (whether the student has been added to or dropped from enrollment in the District); and
- C. Housing subdivision.

Introduction & Instructional Practices

The Counseling Program Framework is designed to provide a K-12 developmental and comprehensive guidance program that supports all Millard students. The comprehensive program incorporates a developmentally appropriate delivery system that supports students in the following domains:

- Academic achievement
- Personal/Social development
- Career planning

The developmentally appropriate delivery system should include the following four components:

- <u>Guidance curriculum</u> that provides a method by which every student receives school guidance curriculum content in a systematic way. This can be accomplished through classroom activities, group activities, and special programs.
- <u>Individual student planning</u> that provides all students an opportunity to work closely with their parents or guardians to plan, monitor and understand their growth and development, and to take action on their next steps for personal, educational, and occupational growth. This can be accomplished through individual and group appraisal, individual and group advisement, and transition activities.
- Response services that address the direct, immediate concerns of students, parents, and staff and includes, but is not limited to: individual counseling, crisis counseling, referrals or consultations with parents or guardians, teachers or other specialists. The purpose of response services is to help students whose problems interfere with their learning and academic, personal/social, and career success. This can be accomplished through participation in individual and group counseling, consultation and referral to other programs or agencies, and crisis counseling. Through response services, support is provided to address current societal issues.
- System support that enables the school counseling process to be effective through leadership and advocacy, consultation, collaboration and teaming, program management and professional development. In addition, school counseling provides appropriate support to other programs in the school.

Counselors will differentiate these components of program delivery to meet the unique needs of students. This will include making accommodations to the counseling curriculum, providing support for personal/social development, and advocating for students from special populations.

The framework identifies outcomes for each of the three domains and documents developmentally appropriate objectives to support each outcome. The outcomes and objectives support Strategy 3, goal setting; Strategy 6, transition; and Strategy 7, negative influences, of the district strategic plan. The outcomes are aligned with the standards identified by the American School Counselor Association and the Millard Academic and Life Skills Essential Learner Outcomes (ELOs). The outcomes for each domain are identified below.



Academic Achievement

- Outcome 1: Students will acquire the knowledge and skills that contribute to effective learning in school.
- Outcome 2: Students will set goals to prepare for their future.
- Outcome 3: Students will understand the relationship of academic performance to future choices.

Personal Social Development

- Outcome 1: Students will apply the knowledge, attitudes, and interpersonal skills acquired to help them understand and respect self and others.
- Outcome 2: Students will make decisions, set goals, and take necessary action to achieve their positive life goals.
- Outcome 3: Students will practice safety and survival skills.

Career Planning

- Outcome 1: Self-Awareness. Students will develop the skills to investigate the world of work in relation to knowledge of self and to make informed career decisions.
- Outcome 2: Career Awareness. Students will employ strategies to achieve future career goals with success and satisfaction.
- Outcome 3: Career Preparation. Students will understand the relationship between personal qualities, education, training and the world of work.

The objectives to support each outcome are identified by developmental level (K-5, 6-8, and 9-12). In addition, a system for assessing or documenting student progress toward the outcomes and objectives is provided.

Counselors must allocate their time to insure that all outcomes and objectives are met within the four components of the delivery system. Millard counselors should apply the allocation of time/tasks as identified in the following chart. These allocations help to accommodate all components of the framework and to insure proactive instruction. The outcomes and objectives identified in the framework document the minimum services provided by Millard school counselors. In schools where additional counseling time is available, multiple lessons may be delivered to support the outcomes.



Legislative Bills and Issues

Senator and Committee Priority Bills

LB 988 (Education Committee) **This bill passed and was sent to the Governor on April 2, 2008.** This bill changes TEEOSA in several ways. The elementary class size allowance becomes a requirement. Grades K-3 would be required to be in classrooms of less than 20. Assessed valuation will replace adjusted valuation in calculating school district resources. Schools will be compared to other schools of similar size to arrive at the basic funding level. This bill adds a factor for student growth, and building new schools, remodeling or adding to existing schools. Budget authority would be based on 120% of needs and inter-local agreements would be phased out. Local effort rates would be increased meaning more funds from local sources. This bill reduces expected increases in state aid by 66 million dollars in FY 2009-2010. **This bill reduces MPS state aid increase certified on February 1 from 8.2 million to \$650,000.**

LB 1092 (Harms) requires seatbelts on busses purchased after January 1, 2009. **This bill was bracketed and so it is likely it will not be advanced this year.** The bill also requires that the students wear the belts.

LB 1154 (Raikes) Changes learning community provisions. This bill is on Final Reading. Senator Kopplin's amendment to remove the funding language pertaining to ESUs was not successful. There are many provisions in this bill that include adding superintendents in an advisory capacity. The Secretary of State would run the first few meetings instead of the Commissioner of Education. School district boundaries could be modified prior to the establishment of the Learning Community if an agreement is completed. Distribution of the common levy would reflect previous resources for the first three years. The Capital levy potential uses are narrowed. Provisions regarding the diversity plan and educational options would be streamlines. The qualifications to become a learning community would be modified.

LB 1157 (Adams) **This bill is on Final Reading.** This bill adds assessments (state tests) for several grades and subjects in attempts to align Nebraska with the NCLB standards. The Appropriations bill for LB 1157 was debated on Tuesday. The funding for this program is found in NCLB according to the Education Committee. Senator Raikes and NDE are not on the same page according to the Senator.

LB 1153 (Raikes) relates to payments for SPED and provides for a SPED allowance within TEEOSA. This bill also provides for SPED students to participate in graduation ceremonies. This bill was advanced to Select File today (April 2).

 remains a worthy goal. So does South Carolina's attempt to participate in a pending federal pilot

The catch up club will provide the needed time to help teach students the basic life skills and academic skills used to be successful at school. With this added support delivered in the catch up club students will gain the skills to be more successful on their daily assignments which will allow them to achieve higher on state and district assessments as well as understand concepts important to future learning.

Get Ahead Transition

The intent of *Get Ahead* is to provide learning opportunities for students at risk of failing or having difficulties adjusting to middle school. This program will be in addition to the Millard Jump Start program and directed toward those identified as at risk by elementary schools.

After School Program

The intent of this proposal is to develop and deliver after-school programming options for students enrolled at the Millard Learning Center. This proposal will address two issues: (1) the significantly low overall score relating to the 40 Asset framework, the Asset "Constructive Use of Time"; and (2) to give students the opportunity to participate in extracurricular activities which will increase the information students will be able to enter into their Personal Learning Plans and future applications for employment and college.

Successful High School Strategies Academy

Building: Millard North High

As part of the Pyramid of Interventions, identified students will receive personal support and strategies for success. This program will address the needs of incoming students who have been identified by their middle school as having academic or personal struggles which might hinder them from being successful in school. The Millard North High (11th & 12th graders) will provide guidance and mentoring with the support of staff to ensure that identified at-risk middle school 8th graders receive personalized attention as they transition to the high school during an orientation program called Successful High School Strategies Academy. It is a program that will allow mentors and mentees to meet once a quarter to build positive relationships and establish academic goals. These goals will then become part of the students Personalized Learner Plan (PLP) and continual updates will be made as the year goes on.

Offering More Timely Interventions

Currently we our serving students well over time with interventions of adding study halls and guided study halls to their schedule when they are academically struggling. Since students at West only have four periods a day, we need good evidence to take away a fourth of their schedule to provide the study hall intervention. We need a more systematic and timely intervention that does not involve pulling students out of academic classes they need. We want to add the Tuesday and Thursday night study center from 3:30 to 5:30 to our pyramid of interventions. This intervention will be designed for students whose grade slips due to attendance problems, lack of effort, or just struggling on a unit. We will still offer the long term guided study halls for students who need greater assistance. We believe that this extra support system will make a big difference on getting students on track more quickly and will not require losing and academic opportunity.
