





# **International Baccalaureate Mini-Magnet Primary Years Programme Evaluation Year 3**

In 2004, the Bess Streeter Aldrich strategic planning team in alignment with the district strategic plan determined that the school needed a program that would increase student enrollment and provide quality education that was responsive to the needs and expectations of our students and parents. Aldrich parents were surveyed to find out their educational desires for their children. They showed a strong desire for a world language program that takes place within the regular school day. After exploring the International Baccalaureate Primary Years Programme, the team felt this program would be an excellent fit for Aldrich. In addition, the team felt the continuity of educational opportunities that come from the PYP in a K-12 structure would be beneficial to our students and was logical for our district.


Aldrich became authorized as an International Baccalaureate Primary Years Programme World School in July, 2008. Over the past 3 years, we have worked diligently to ensure that the International Baccalaureate Organization philosophy and standards and practices have become part of our school culture. During the 2010-11 school year, Aldrich will partake in a required intensive self-study of assessing our program against the standards and practices set forth by the International Baccalaureate Organization (IBO). The self-study is guided by a questionnaire which involves the whole school in assessing the delivery of the programme. After the self-study is completed and documentation is sent to the IBO, a team from IBO will visit the school in Fall of 2011 to ensure the quality of programme, while offering feedback to the school. As a result of their visit, the school will receive a written report with commendations, recommendations and, where appropriate matters to be addressed by the school.

#### **Participation**

The International Baccalaureate Primary Years Programme at Aldrich Elementary School is a school-wide mini-magnet serving students in the Aldrich attendance area as well as students from fourteen other Millard Elementary attendance areas and five surrounding school districts (2009-2010).




## 3<sup>rd</sup> Grade Reading ELO




## 3<sup>rd</sup> Grade NeSA-R

## International Baccalaureate Mini-Magnet Middle Years Program Year 5 Program Evaluation

#### **Introduction and Purpose**

As required by board policy and strategic plan parameters, the Office of Assessment, Research, and Evaluation carries out 5-year evaluations of all programs. The 2005-2006 school year was the first year of implementation for the International Baccalaureate Middle Years Programme (IB-MYP) mini-magnet at Millard North Middle School. During the 2006-2007 school year the program was in its second year at North Middle and for the first time, students in the 9<sup>th</sup> grade at North High began to take part in the IB-MYP curriculum through class work and community service. International Baccalaureate 9th graders fall into three distinct categories at North High: IB-MYP only, IB-MYP and Diploma Path or Diploma Path only. "IB-DP"DP stands for Diploma Program Diploma Path is a list of optional diploma programs offered by Millard.

The data in this report comes from the fifth year of the program.

The following, from the Millard North Middle School and Millard North High School MYP web page, presents background on the program.

The International Baccalaureate Middle Years Programme (MYP) is designed for students aged 11 to 16. This period, encompassing early puberty and mid-adolescence, is a particularly critical phase of personal and intellectual development and requires a programme that helps students participate actively and responsibly in a changing and increasingly interrelated world. Learning how to learn and how to evaluate information critically is as important as learning facts.

The curriculum contains eight subject groups (Language A, Language B, Humanities, Technology, Mathematics, Arts, Sciences, Physical Education) together with a core made up of five areas of interaction (Health and Social Education, Community and Service, Environments, Approaches to Learning, and Human Ingenuity).

The Millard North Middle School strategic plan team in alignment with the district strategic plan, in 2002 determined that the school needed a rigorous alternative to the traditional middle level program that would further challenge all students to reach advanced levels. The action team working on this plan felt the International Baccalaureate Middle Years Programme was the answer in that it would not only provide the alternative the team wanted, but would also better prepare students for success at the Diploma Years level. In July of 2004 the Millard Board of Education gave approval for the implementation of this program at North Middle School. Millard North High School in turn, adopted the 9th and 10th grade component of the program. In its adoption, Millard North High School has assumed the responsibility of the reporting of year five assessments to the International Baccalaureate, as well as the completion of the Personal Project.

#### **Participation**

The International Baccalaureate Middle Years Programme is a 5-year program. Students are allowed to self-select into and out of the program during years one through four. Due to the reporting of assessments to the International Baccalaureate, students are not allowed to option into the program after year four has ended. The program at North Middle provides the first three years of the service beginning in grade 6. The program then culminates in grades 9 and 10 at Millard North High School.











# 7<sup>th</sup> Grade Math ELO Scores








The IB program allows the student to think deeper about topics and discuss them more thoroughly from many perspectives.

My daughter does seem more interested in doing community service.

The IB program has been an excellent transition for my child from the Montessori program to a traditional setting. I am pleased with the additional critical thinking and reflection process incorporated into this IB program.

I do believe that it is helping my child prepare for the next level and to have good study habits.

His thinking has broadened. He has started thinking out of the box.

My daughter enjoys the interactive participation in the way information is explained/shared. It helps her to open up, ask more questions, and be proactive about her grades and interests.

She likes being with other students who want to do well in school. Also, being challenged instead of bored is an advantage.

We have a lot more class discussions in IB instead of busy work/doing worksheets.

*I like the having a choice of projects.* 

We work with each in groups and we take turns on the role we have. If I am the leader of the group this time, I won't be the leader of the group the next time.

The "daily" unit questions focus us to what we are learning.

The community service requirement was fun. I have done more than my required 10 hours because I liked it.

I like doing the community service but I don't like doing the reflection afterwards.

My parents made me be in the IB program in the  $6^{th}$  grade but this year I chose to stay in it.

We have learned to debate in class without arguing.

# Question 11 -- Is there any other information you would like us to know about your experience with the International Baccalaureate Programme?

I think the teachers are great, they show a positive attitude.

The rigorous program with the enormous amount of homework denies the students the opportunities to fully enjoy the programme. A thoughtful modification of the program may reduce the number of students who drop out and make it a less stressful and more enjoyable experience.

If the college placement results and acceptance of credit and college level are as advertised, which we will know in 3 to 4 years, then it is impressive!

This program is much better organized at the high school.

Honors Spanish was required and the teachers expectations have made my daughter consider quitting the whole program. If this has been a common experience perhaps requirement should be rethought.

MYP program has too many "extra" requirements (i.e.: reports after volunteering). Please keep the busywork to a minimum.

### Responses of Students at Millard High School

This program has taught me to look beyond the immediate consequences of a decision.

Points of interactions allow me to understand how it reflects in a lesson.

IB brings students with similar backgrounds into the same class.

In some of the classes, the IB context was missing but in my English class, IB is a part of the class.

IB has taught me how to think and reflect on what is being learned.

When I got to IB, it felt like the first time I used my brain. In previous years, teachers would force us to memorize information and then spit it back out on tests. IB is not like that.

*IB* pushes me out of my comfort zone and expands my perspectives.

Community service is fun!

IB makes you look passed the initial decision. It forces a person to look at the bigger implications.

The problem solving method has not limited my independent thoughts but it guides me to make decisions.

#### **Class Size Comparison**

6<sup>th</sup>, 7<sup>th</sup>, and 8<sup>th</sup> grade MYP students are assigned to academic teams as well as exploratory classes such as Art, Computers and Physical Education and World Languages exclusively apart from their peers who do not participate in MYP. The following table represents a comparison of the average class of MYP and Non-MYP core classes.

In its inception, 9<sup>th</sup> and 10<sup>th</sup> grade IB-MYP students share the classroom with Non-MYP students. There are no course sections that are exclusively assigned to IB-MYP students in these grades. Beginning in August of 2009 students who enrolled in the IB-MYP is grouped in common class sections in order to create a more cohesive base for instruction and a richer IB-MYP culture. All 9<sup>th</sup> and 10<sup>th</sup> grade students who are then dispersed among these grouped sections will receive the benefit of the International Baccalaureate instructional model in Language Arts, Science, Math, Social Studies, World Languages, Technology, and Physical Education.

# **Program Costs Millard North Middle School**

Of the 802 students who attended Millard North Middle School in 2009-2010, 503 (62.7%) of the students participated in the IB-MYP (compared to 54.9% the previous year). The cost of this program is \$28,190.40. The cost of this program is down \$309.80 from last year. The per-pupil expenditure for this program is \$56.04.

## **Program Costs Millard North High School**

There are 1232 enrolled in the 9<sup>th</sup> and 10<sup>th</sup> grade Millard North High School. 218 (17.7%) of these students participate in IB-MYP this year. Compared to 2009-2010, there are 49 more students that are in IB-MYP this year.

The cost of this program is \$34,881.36. The per-pupil expenditure for this program is \$160.00. The cost of this program is up 4,769.36 from last year. This is in part due to the cost incurred by the IB Programme's evaluation.

IB-MYP students share classes with Non-IB students at MNHS. As a result, many of the 9<sup>th</sup> and 10<sup>th</sup> grade students receive instruction using the IB instructional model. The perpupil cost for FTE per instructional period at Millard North High school is \$3846.35. There is no personnel cost difference for IB-MYP students and Non-IB-MYP Students at this school.

#### **Building Input**

Both of the program coordinators worked together to create two 194<sup>th</sup> day contract classes for IB-MYP teachers. These classes were focused on the development of Unit Planners and IB-MYP Assessment, both requirements within the IB-MYP program.

Both Scott Ingwerson and Amber Ripa, coordinators at MNMS and MNHS, met twice a month during the 2009-2010 school year. During these meetings the coordinators focused on the continued development of the program as a whole as well as the upcoming program evaluation. To prepare for this evaluation the following documents were created: self study questionnaire, vertical alignment of curriculum, detailed job descriptions for all stakeholders, training logs, school organizational charts, school philosophy statement, language policy, assessment policy, and samples of student work.

In an effort to address concerns that were voiced during the 2008-2009 program review, several changes were made at the high school level. The first change addressed the Community and Service Requirement. Students are now encouraged to join an activity at MNHS in an effort to become part of their community. This type of activity will count towards 10 hours of community credit. The students are still required to complete 10 hours of service which can be done through school sponsored service activities or individual service activities. The second change addressed the Personal Project. Students in the 9<sup>th</sup> grade are now required to attend the 10<sup>th</sup> grade Personal Project Presentations. Additionally, attendance is taken at the Personal Project Supervisor meetings during the 10<sup>th</sup> grade and parents are notified when a student has missed more than one meeting. These two changes seem to have alleviated some of the concerns that were voiced about direction for the Personal Project.

In addition to sending individual teachers to IB authorized trainings during the 2009-2010 school year, staff from both MNMS and MNHS attended a half day workshop with an IB trainer to evaluate unit planners and prepare as a team for the evaluation visit. We will continue this collaboration in the 2010-2011 school year.

During the first week of October, both schools participated in the IB evaluation site visit. The IB sent three team members to review the practices and procedures at the two schools. The team was given copies of all IB required documentation to review prior to the visit. The visitors spent one day at MNMS and one day at MNHS. During these days the team met with central office administration, parents, students, teachers and administrators from both buildings. The team investigated the status of the program as a whole in relation to the expectations of the International Baccalaureate.

Final recommendations from IB should arrive at the schools by March of this year. During the exit interview, the team suggested that as a result of the increased student enrollment and staff involvement within the programs, it was recommended that the schools dedicate a full time coordinator at each building. The team also recommended that both schools should continue to work on vertically aligning the curriculum and

assessments and begin to work on developing interdisciplinary units and additional unit planners.

#### **Summary**

The Millard North Middle School strategic plan team in alignment with the district strategic plan, in 2002 determined that the school needed a rigorous alternative to the traditional middle level program that would further challenge advanced level students. It was also the intent of the team to address a declining enrollment at North Middle School during that time. Millard North High School in turn, adopted the 9th and 10th grade component of the program.

Consistent with previous evaluations of this program, students in IBMYP exhibit strong academic performance on a consistent basis from grade level from grades 6 through 10. It is clear that the IBMYP has increased student enrollment at North Middle School and has brought the desired level of rigor to the classrooms. The program seems to attract a large number of 9<sup>th</sup> graders to Millard North High School, but the number of students participating in the program drops off from grade 9 to grade 10.


Parent surveys and student interviews indicate that there is a high level of satisfaction with the program at both Millard North High School and North Middle School.

In previous program evaluations submitted to the board, both schools needed to make a significant effort to work with one another in order to create continuity within the program, and Millard North High School needed to schedule IBMYP students in sections that are almost exclusively IB in terms of student composition. Both locations have made a marked improvement towards these goals. All of the efforts put forth by the staff at both buildings appears to be strengthening the program from grades 6 through 10.

# 4<sup>th</sup> Grade Reading ELO






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
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

## **Student Focus Group Comments**

A focus group meeting was held with a representative group of IBPYP students in the fall of 2010. Students were asked specific questions about their experience in the program. These were a particularly bright and enthusiastic group of students.

#### The following are examples of responses by students who participated in the focus groups:

I moved to Aldrich in the second grade and I can really see a difference between this school and my old one. I think it is the IB Attitudes.

Aldrich is a kind and considerate place to be.

The IB terms are used by teachers all the time and now they are words we use every day.

I don't think any other school has a walking club.

Science and Social Studies classes are always connected to IB Attitudes and Profiles.

We think about IB Profiles and Attitudes in all of our classes.

When working in groups, we let the IB Attitudes and Profiles "lead the group".

I have learned that I need to know what the question is before I try to answer it.

Some of the words used in IB are, Risk Takers, Communication, Empathy, Caring, and Respect.

*In science, we did a project on the environment.* 

The  $2^{nd}$  and  $3^{rd}$  grade classes are divided and identified by letters and animals (abilities and learning styles).

I like to be challenged and pushed to a higher level that is more difficult.

I learn best by interacting with a problem and then have it repeated to me if I don't understand it.

In 4<sup>th</sup> grade, we made a landfill and figured out how it affects the community both positive and negative.

We used the SmartBoard to learn about ground water.

We learned about different communities and how we relate to others in our community.

Spanish class taught me how to communicate with people who spoke Spanish when we were on a trip.

I have never seen bullying at Aldrich. Teachers care about what students are doing both right and wrong.

Our counselor talks to us about what bullying is and how to stop it.

Aldrich is a safe place.

We learned that tolerance is accepting people and what they have to say.

Students are taught to talk to an adult when they have a problem. We know they will help solve them.

We know that there are steps to solve bullying. First, try to handle it yourself. Next, if the problem continues, talk with our teachers. If bullying continues, talk with Dr. Melliger.

I have learned to problem solve in class and with people.

If I follow steps and take enough time to solve a problem, I can do it.

## **Training Costs\***

There are three levels of IB training.

<u>Level 1:</u> Application & Authorization Workshop is a three-day workshop that provides training and assistance for schools that have decided to apply for IB authorization. For the Primary Years Programme, Level 1 training includes an optional session covering Part B of the application process. Level 1 workshops are open only to teachers currently teaching in IB schools or in applicant schools. This training is provided in-district by Millard IB teachers.

<u>Level 2</u>: Experienced IB Teachers Workshop is a three-day workshop for teachers who have completed Level 1 training and/or who teach in schools that have begun to implement an IB Programme. For the Primary Years Programme schools, the Level 2 workshop is for authorized schools as well as for candidate schools that have submitted Part B of the application. Level 2 workshops are open only to teachers currently teaching in IB schools or in applicant schools. This training is provided for teachers off-site by IB.

<u>Level 3:</u> Topical Seminar is a three-day seminar covering a topic or several topics of interest. The relevancy of teaching experience and/or knowledge of the IB will vary from seminar to seminar and programme to programme depending on the topic on offer. This training is provided for teachers off-site by IB.

#### **Summary**

The Primary Years IB Programme (IBPYP) at Aldrich has currently satisfies two of its initial goals. To increase the student enrollment and to provide a high quality education that was responsive to the needs and expectations of their students and community.

The number of students enrolled at Aldrich has increased every year since the program started in the 2006-2007 school year. Enrollment of students who option into the district from surrounding school districts has steadily increased from the start but last year there was a slight decrease perhaps due to the new Learning Community rules being in place.

Student achievement data indicates that students that are enrolled at Aldrich generally achieve higher levels of success than their peers on district ELO assessments and they also perform higher when compared nationally on the TerraNova.

Other than the cost of training of staff, staffing for one (1) Spanish teacher, and the purchasing of required materials, the yearly cost of the IBPYP at Aldrich are comparable to the cost of running a non-IB school. In the 2009 – 2010 school year class sizes at Aldrich are larger in kindergarten, third, and fourth grades compared to other buildings in Millard Public Schools.

Parent surveys and student interviews indicate that there is a high level of satisfaction with the program.

# TerraNova Results 2010-2011

## Background

Since 2000-2001, Millard has administered the *TerraNova, First Edition* Multiple Assessments norm-referenced test. This test has not been in mainstream publication for the last two years. Therefore, in the spring of 2010, Millard Public Schools researched possible norm-referenced test replacements. Building administrators, teachers, and district-level leaders were part of the research process. Teachers and district level leaders completed a match to Millard curriculum standards alignment for all tests considered. With input from stakeholders and the Millard Assessment Committee, the more current *TerraNova*, *Third Edition* Complete Battery norm-referenced test was purchased. This test features 2007 norms and diverse reporting options and was the closest match to Millard curriculum standards of the norm-referenced tests reviewed.

This fall, 2010, Millard students in grades 3, 6, and 9 participated in the *TerraNova, Third Edition* Complete Battery norm-referenced test. All questions in the *TerraNova, Third Edition* Complete Battery are selected response items. With the updated *TerraNova, Third Edition*, MPS also adopted the updated *InView* as the related aptitude test in place of the previous *Test of Cognitive Skills, Second Edition* (TCS/2).

# Reading

The Reading item content is aligned with the standards of the International Reading Association (IRA), NAEP, and the National Council of Teachers of English (NCTE). TerraNova, Third Edition uses authentic literature from a diverse group of authors. Content includes comprehension, text analysis, and evaluating/extending meaning of the passages.

# Language

Language item content assesses students' skills in the key components of language proficiency: understanding of language structure, familiarity with standard written English conventions and rules, and knowledge of syntactic constructions and paragraph development.

### **Mathematics**

Items are aligned to the National Council of Teachers of Mathematics (NCTM) standards.

Content includes number relations, computation and numerical estimation, measurement, spatial sense, data analysis, and algebra.

### Science

Science items are based on national science standards and frameworks. They assess students' understanding relative to core science content areas: Life Science, Earth Science, Physical Science, and Nature of Science/Scientific Inquiry.

### Social Studies

Test items reflect the guidelines of the National Council for the Social Studies (NCSS) and emphasize the interrelationships of history, geography, governments, and economics in their framework, question formats, and graphics. Equity is ensured through representations of varied civilizations, cultures, geographic areas, and perspectives.

### InView

The InView is a group-administered aptitude test designed to be predictive of school success. It includes measures of verbal reasoning, sequences, analogies, and quantitative reasoning.


## Results

The results are presented both at the district level and at the building level in a non-cohort manner. The first analysis shows the overall district-wide performance for 3<sup>rd</sup>, 6<sup>th</sup>, and 9<sup>th</sup> grades, using national percentiles, for the subtests and for the total score. The total score is based on the reading, language, and math subtests (i.e., science and social studies are <u>not</u> represented in the total score).


Lower test scores are expected for our local performance on *TerraNova*, *Third Edition* compared to our local performance on the previous *TerraNova* due to changes in test content, significantly newer norming standards, and lack of familiarity with the test. The *TerraNova 3* Reading and Language items have been separated into two distinct subtests rather than being combined as in prior versions. The *TerraNova 3* Reading, Language, and Math subtests also assess higher depths of knowledge than did earlier versions of the test.

TerraNova 3 was scaled with the earlier TerraNova versions so a student would generally be expected to get about the same scale score on any version of TerraNova. With changes in test content and newer norms, however, any given TerraNova scale score can yield different normative scores (normal curve equivalent, national percentile, etc.) depending on the norm group in use. For example, in the Math subtest for grade 3, the scale score corresponding to a national percentile of 50 with 1996 norms would give a national percentile of 45 with 2007 norms.


Familiarity with a test can also impact test scores. "When the same form is administered for several years, it is not uncommon to see a score drop when a new form is introduced. The particular content of the previous form might have had an influence on the curriculum and/or teaching practice, and this influence might not have the same effect on student performance when *TerraNova 3* is first administered." 
Elementary results varied from the 66th percentile (Language subtest) to the 80th percentile (Math subtest.) Middle school results ranged from the 66<sup>th</sup> percentile (Language and Social Studies subtests) to the 71<sup>st</sup> percentile (Reading and Science subtests.) High school results varied from the 68<sup>th</sup> percentile (Language subtest) to the 74<sup>th</sup> percentile (Science subtest).



When comparing the 2010-2011 3<sup>rd</sup> grade students to the 3<sup>rd</sup> grade students of 2009-2010, this year's students scored slightly lower than the previous year's performance with the exception of a tenpoint decrease in the Language subtest. In both years, students scored well above the national average.




Comparing the 2010-2011 6th grade students to the 6th grade students of 2009-2010, this year's students scored moderately lower with the exception of a ten-point drop in the Social Studies subtest and a two-point gain in the Reading subtest. In both years the students scored well above the national average.





When comparing the 2010-2011 9th grade students to the 9th grade students of 2009-2010, this year's students scored higher on the Science and Social Studies subtests than last year's students. In both years, students scored well above the national average.

The following graphs show TerraNova total scores for grades 3, 6, and 9 across the 11 school years Millard has been using the TerraNova. These data reflect test results of different groups of students each year (non-cohort data). Scores for school years 2000-01 through 2009-10 are from *TerraNova*, *First Edition* with 1996 norms. Scores for the 2010-11 school year are from *TerraNova*, *Third Edition* with 2007 norms.

**Trends Across Years (Non-cohort Data)** 








The percent of students receiving special education services in the grade levels tested were as follows:  $3^{rd}$  grade – 14.4%;  $6^{th}$  grade – 14.1% and  $9^{th}$  grade – 10.7%.

This graph shows the district-wide TerraNova total score for students receiving special education services (SpEd) versus students not receiving special education services (non-SpEd). The national percentile of the mean NCE scores for students receiving special education services across the district ranged from the 30<sup>th</sup> percentile (9<sup>th</sup> grade) to the 44<sup>th</sup> percentile (6<sup>th</sup> grade).



# Summary

The analysis of non-cohort groups showed that Millard students continued to score well above the national average on the *TerraNova*. Maintaining a high level of academic achievement over time indicates that Millard's schools are delivering effective instruction.

There continues to be an overall gap in achievement between students receiving special education services and their non-disabled peers. The gap in achievement between these groups is quite variable among schools. School-level results in the appendix provide a comparison of this data.

With an updated norm-referenced test for 2010-2011, it is difficult to make comparisons with past scores. Across grade levels and buildings we did observe the expected "implementation dip" in scores consistent with the newer and more rigorous norms of the *TerraNova*, *Third Edition*.
