A meeting was held of the Board of Education of the School District No. 17, in the County of Douglas in the State of Nebraska. The meeting was convened in open and public session at 6:30 p.m., Monday, March 21, 2011, at the Don Stroh Administration Center, 5606 South 147th Street.

Present: Dave Anderson, Mike Pate, Linda Poole, and Patrick Ricketts

Notice of this meeting was given in advance thereof by publication in the Daily Record on Friday, March 18, 2011; a copy of the publication is being attached to these minutes. Notice of this meeting was given to all members of the Board of Education and a copy of their Acknowledgment of Receipt of Notice and the agenda are attached to these minutes. Availability of the agenda was communicated in advance notice and in the notice of the Board of Education of this meeting. All proceedings hereafter shown were taken while the convened meeting was open to the attendance of the public.

Students performed prior to the Board meeting to celebrate Music in the Schools month.

At 6:25 p.m. Dave Anderson opened the public hearing on Rule 6750.1 – Student Fees

Roll call was taken and Dave Anderson, Mike Pate, Pat Ricketts and Linda Poole were present.

Mr. Anderson received no requests to speak on Rule 6750.1 – Student Fees.

Motion by Mike Pate, seconded by Linda Poole, to adjourn the meeting, upon roll call vote, all members voted aye. Motion carried.

At 6:30 p.m. Dave Anderson called the meeting to order and announced the public meeting Act is posted on the wall and available for public inspection. Mr. Anderson asked everyone to say the Pledge of Allegiance.

Roll call was taken and Dave Anderson, Mike Pate, Pat Ricketts, and Linda Poole were present. Absent were Julie Kannas and Mike Kennedy.

Motion by Mike Pate, seconded by Pat Ricketts to excuse Mike Kennedy and Julie Kannas from the meeting, upon roll call vote, all members voted aye. Motion carried.

Motion by Linda Poole, seconded by Patrick Ricketts, to approve the Board of Education Minutes from March 7, 2011, to approve the Special Board of Education Minutes for March 14, 2011, to approve the bills, and receive the treasurer's report and place on file, upon roll call vote, all members voted aye. Motion carried.

Linda Poole summarized the Board Committee of the Whole meeting held on Monday, March 14, 2011. The topics for discussion were legislation and budget.

Mr. Anderson said there were no requests to speak on agenda items, but he had two requests, and they would speak at the end of the meeting, because the topic was not on the agenda.

Mr. Anderson also thanked the groups who performed prior to the meeting.

Superintendent's Comments:

- 1. Over the past week-end there was a meeting with Senator Nelson to discuss issues about schools from the federal level and also talked about the stimulus money.
- 2. At the next meeting the timeline for community members, who have interest in being a school board member will be laid out according to the District's policy.
- 3. The next board of education meeting will be on Monday, April 4, 2011. Due to the National School Boards Association Conference there will be no Committee meeting during April.
- 4. On Thursday there is a Learning Community sub-council #4 meeting. Mike Pate, Dwite Pedersen, and Rick Kolowski will be at the meeting and discussion is expected to be on the attendance legislative bill, and the Learning Community.

Board Comments:

Mike Pate expressed his frustration with attending Learning Community meetings. He commented that he has yet to see what will come out of the Learning Community. He equates the meetings to power struggles between several individuals. He can't understand those members who have made comments about the open enrollment process improving academic achievement, because he feels this is not a solution. The problems are much bigger. All districts have been opening up their schools for the many years during option enrollment, prior to open enrollment. So, it is not much different than what has happened these many past years. He has a concern that every member does not have the opportunity to voice their concerns without someone else berating what was said.

Mr. Pate said he is still asking questions about where the funds are spent from the Learning Community. He stated Rick Kolowski was elected to Phi Delta Kappa, which he has been before, but he wanted to know who pays for the membership and who pays for his transportation. He wants to check on the funds used for their lobbyist. He said he will continue to watch the spending of the Learning Community, and will keep asking questions.

Mr. Pate encouraged community members to become engaged as to what the Learning Community is doing. He is afraid that in several years we could be back to "One City One School District".

Alison Brokke, student representative from Millard West High School, Isis Hernandez, student representative from Millard South High School, and Jeff Story, student representative from Millard North High School, provided updates on all of the activities in athletics and academics at their respective high schools during the last couple of weeks.

Bylaws of the Board

School Board Vacancies - Procedure for Filling

9100.1

When a vacancy exists on the Millard Board of Education it shall be filled as provided by law and by the following procedures.

- 1. At the first regular meeting of the Board after the vacancy exists, the Superintendent shall provide the legal qualifications for appointment to the Board, the length of the term remaining, and a proposed schedule for receiving applications for appointment to the vacancy.
- The Board at that meeting shall establish the final date for filing of applications, which date shall be no sooner than 30 days after the publication of notice in a legal newspaper announcing the existence of the vacancy, qualifications for the position and inviting applications for appointment to fill the vacancy, and communication to the news media notifying the public of the existence of the vacancy and the final date for the filing of application to fill the vacancy.
- 3. The Board will establish the form applications shall take, including:
 - a) a resume containing routine personal data (name, address, telephone numbers, etc.) a summary of the candidates education and experience, and a statement indicating why they are qualified for appointment to the Board; and,
 - b) a petition signed by at least 50 (fifty) registered voters from the Millard District, using a petition available from the Secretary of the Millard Board of Education.
- 4. Completed applications will be filed with Secretary of the Millard Board of Education no later than 4:30 pm on the date applications are due. The documents will be date stamped and reviewed for compliance with these procedures.
- 5. The Secretary of the Millard Board of Education will, in conjunction with the Douglas and Sarpy County Election Commissioners, review the petitions and determine if 50 or more registered voters of Millard School District 17 have supported each applicant. The Board Secretary will notify each applicant whether their petition was valid or invalid.
- 6. The Secretary of the Millard Board of Education will forward copies of the resumes and petitions to each member of the Board as each eligibility determination is made. Unless more time is needed to verify the petitions, all resumes and petitions will be sent to Board members within seven days of the application deadline. Board members will review the resumes in the form they are received.
- 7. At the next regular meeting of the Board following the identification of all qualified candidates, if the number of candidates exceeds five, the list of candidates shall be reduced to five finalists. Each Board member shall vote for five candidates to be finalists for the position. The vote will be by roll call. Only persons submitting resumes and valid petitions may receive votes. The five candidates receiving the most total votes will be finalists for appointment. In the event of a tie for the fifth position, the Board will reconsider only those candidates tied for fifth in order to break the tie. Tie-breaking votes shall be by secret ballot.
- 8. The Superintendent shall notify, by telephone, all candidates as to whether they received sufficient support to become a finalist for the position.
- 9. At the next meeting of the Board Committee of the Whole following the selection of the finalists, the Board will interview the finalists. Approximately 30 minutes will be allowed for each candidate. The candidates will be asked to make a maximum five-minute statement concerning their qualifications, followed by a 25-

minute question and answer period. The order of appearance of the candidates will be determined by a random drawing prior to publishing the meeting agenda.

- 10. The election of the new Board member will be placed on the agenda of the next regularly scheduled Board meeting following the interviews. The election will be by roll call from the names of the candidates interviewed without nominations from the floor. Voting will continue until one candidate receives a majority votes. When the tally determines an applicant has been selected for appointment to the Board, the vote and the appointment shall be ratified by a roll call vote.
- 11. The Board's legal counsel, with the assistance of the office of the superintendent, shall oversee the conduct of the election and the tally of the votes. The ballots shall become a part of the records of the District.

The superintendent (or designee) shall be authorized to sell or otherwise dispose of any unused property or equipment in the District. Prior to such sale, the unused property or equipment shall be presented to the Board in the District Treasurer's Report.

The superintendent (or designee) shall select a method of sale that is likely to produce the greatest return for the district. Such method may include, but is not necessarily limited to, local public auctions, online electronic auctions, negotiations, or trade-ins. If, after due diligence, it is determined that an item has no monetary value, the item may be recycled or otherwise disposed of.

The proceeds from the sale of property shall be applied first to the costs associate with the sale. The remaining balance, if any, shall be receipted into District funds as directed by the superintendent (or designee).

The superintendent (or designee) may promulgate administrative procedures to further the implementation of this policy.

The Office of the Superintendent or its designee, in compliance with applicable law, shall be authorized to determine any continued useful life or application of depreciated, outmoded, damaged, and otherwise obsolete district property and shall further be authorized to determine appropriate methods of disposal, whether it be by sale, auction, donation, destruction, or other means. When such disposals occur, appropriate administrative procedures shall be followed and all disposals shall be reported and any proceeds surrendered to the Office of the Superintendent.

Disposal of Discarded or Withdrawn Library Media Resources

After withdrawing library media resources from the collection, library media specialists shall proceed as follows:

- 1. Box the discarded materials and forward to the District Processing Center. A detailed list of the included items shall accompany each carton, listing author, title, and call number.
- District Processing Center personnel shall remove the withdrawn items from the electronic database.
- Withdrawn materials shall be classified and materials deemed suitable for potential future sale or donation shall be retained until the means of final disposal is determined.
- 4. Final disposal of withdrawn materials will occur a minimum of one time a year through a public sale, or auction. Monies received will be surrendered to the Office of the Superintendent. If a buyer is not available, materials may be donated to civic or service agency. Those materials not sold or accepted for donation shall be disposed of through other district means.

Disposition/Disposal of Unused Texts

When textbooks have gone out of adoption or have otherwise been determined as surplus, the following procedures will be followed:

- 1. Books shall be sorted and boxed by title and grade level (elementary) or by course/discipline (secondary) and sent to the Support Service Center.
- 2. Buyers of used books shall be contacted and the books offered for sale.
- 3. Proposals for purchase received from book buyers will be evaluated and the best proposal identified, i.e., price to be received, amount of handling involved for district personnel, percentage of books available to be taken, time frame for disposal.
- 4. Books will be sold to vendor submitting best proposal and monies received will be surrendered to the Office of the Superintendent.
- If no purchasing interest is realized then the books shall be disposed of by recycling, destroyed by dumping, or other means as may be determined.

Disposal of Obsolete/Unused/Surplus Equipment or Materials

Equipment or materials, which are no longer needed or are unusable in the operation of the district, should be removed from the district in order to maintain a safe, clean, and uncluttered environment and to eliminate the necessity for storage of nonfunctional property. Such equipment may include instructional or office equipment, furniture, vehicles, fixtures, maintenance devices, etc. The Assistant Superintendent for Auxiliary Services, or a designated representative shall determine the surplus status of any designated piece of equipment. Surplus items may be disposed of at public auction or an announced public sale.

Building principals shall notify Support Service Center when equipment may be eligible for surplus status. Such equipment will be removed from the building and relocated to other district facilities while the disposal status and process are being determined.

- 2. Support Service Center Personnel will remove (where applicable) the surplus equipment information from the electronic district equipment inventory database.
- 3. Surplus equipment or materials shall be classified and such equipment or materials that may be deemed suitable for potential sale shall be retained until the means of final disposal is determined.
- 4. The need for a surplus equipment auction will be determined by the Office of the Assistant Superintendent for Auxiliary Services as amassed quantities of surplus equipment warrant.
- 5. An auctioneer will be contracted by the district to conduct the surplus equipment auction.

 Advertisement and coordination of the auction is the responsibility of the auctioneer.
- 6. Proceeds of any public sale or auction will be remitted to the Office of the Superintendent.
- 7. Equipment deemed as having no potential resale value will be disposed of by salvage, dumping, or other means as may be determined.

Standards for Student Conduct

5400.6

I. Introduction.

- A. <u>Policy Statement</u>. Every Millard School District student has the right to an education. The following Standards have been instituted to ensure that right. Each student and their parents are required, on their own, to become familiar with these Standards, and to help provide an atmosphere conducive to learning.
- B. <u>Grounds for Exclusion</u>. A student may be excluded from school if there is reasonable evidence that the student has committed a prohibited act listed below while on school grounds, in a vehicle owned, leased, or contracted by a school being used for a school purpose or in a vehicle being driven for a school purpose by a school employee or by his or her designee, or at a school-sponsored activity or athletic event, or any other place where the governing law permits the District to discipline students for prohibited conduct.
- C. Exclusion from School Grounds and Activities. A student who is excluded from school for a suspension or expulsion shall not enter upon district property, or ride in a vehicle owned, leased, or contracted by the District being used for a school purpose or in a vehicle being driven for a school purpose by a school employee or his or her designee, or participate in or attend a school-sponsored activity or athletic event. Expelled students may enter upon District property for the sole purpose of attending alternative education at a location and time designated by the Director of Pupil Services.
- D. <u>Length of Expulsions</u>. Unless specified otherwise within these Standards, the expulsion of a student shall be for a period not to exceed the remainder of the semester in which it took effect unless the misconduct occurred within ten (10) school days prior to the end of the first semester, in which case the expulsion shall remain in effect through the second semester, or within ten (10) school days prior to the end of the second semester, in which case the expulsion shall remain in effect for summer school and the first semester of the following school year. Neb. Rev. Stat. §79-283(2).
- E. <u>Contact of Legal Authorities</u>. The principal of a school or the principal's designee shall notify as soon as possible the appropriate law enforcement authorities, of the county or city in which the school is located, of any act of a student described in Neb. Rev. Stat. §79-267 which the principal or designee knows or suspects is a violation of the Nebraska Criminal Code. Neb. Rev. Stat. §79-293(1).
- F. <u>Sanction to be Followed</u>. If minimum and maximum sanctions are not specified for a specific prohibited act, the recommended sanction shall be imposed.
- G. <u>Expulsion as Sanction</u>. Expulsion is specified as a sanction for particular conduct because the District's Board of Education finds that the type of conduct for which expulsion is specified has the potential to seriously affect the health, safety, or welfare of the student, other students, staff members, or other persons, or to otherwise seriously interfere with the educational process. Neb. Rev. Stat. §79-262(1).
- H. <u>Students with Disabilities</u>. Disciplinary procedures for students who have disabilities as defined by the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act and Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973 shall be subject to the disciplinary procedures set forth in District rules 5400.2 and 5400.3 and applicable federal and state law.
- I. <u>Mandatory Compliance</u>. Students and their parent(s) or guardian(s) are hereby notified that compliance with the District's Standards for Student Conduct is mandatory. It is the responsibility of all students and their parent(s) or guardian(s) to become familiar with these Standards.

II. <u>Violations Against Persons.</u>

- A. <u>Use of Violence</u>. Use of violence, force, coercion, threat, intimidation or similar conduct in a manner that constitutes a substantial interference with school purposes.
 - 1. Pushing, Shoving or Related Noninjurious Behaviors.
 - a. <u>Maximum Sanction</u>. Short-term suspension. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of suspension.
 - 2. <u>Fighting</u>. Mutual attempt to physically harm another person through mutual combative physical contact.

a. First offense.

- (1) Minimum Sanction. Short-term suspension. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of suspension. There is no mandated minimum sanction below grade six (6).
- (2) Maximum Sanction. Long-term suspension. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of suspension.
- (3) Mandatory Action. Legal authorities shall be contacted. Neb. Rev. Stat. §§ 79-267(1) and 293.

b. Two offenses or more.

- (1) Minimum Sanction. Long-term suspension. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of suspension.
- (2) Maximum Sanction. Expulsion. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of expulsion.
- (3) Mandatory Action. Legal authorities shall be contacted. Neb. Rev. Stat. §§79-267(1) and 293.
- 3. <u>Physical Assault.</u> Initiation of a violent act against another person through aggressive physical contact.
 - a. <u>Minimum Sanction</u>. Long-term suspension. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of suspension. There is no mandated minimum sanction below grade six (6).
 - b. <u>Maximum Sanction</u>. Expulsion. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of expulsion.
 - c. <u>Mandatory Action</u>. Legal authorities shall be contacted. Neb. Rev. Stat. §§79-267(1) and 293.
- B. <u>Physical Injury to District Employees, Volunteers, and Students.</u> Causing or attempting to cause personal injury to an employee, a school volunteer, or to any student. Personal injury caused by accident, self-defense, or other action undertaken on the reasonable belief that it was necessary to protect some other person shall not constitute a violation of this provision. Neb. Rev. Stat. §79-267(3).

1. Sanctions on School Grounds.

- a. <u>Minimum Sanction</u>. Long-term suspension. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of suspension.
- b. <u>Mandatory Action</u>. Legal authorities shall be contacted. Neb. Rev. Stat. §§79-267(3) and 293.

2. Sanctions off School Grounds.

- a. <u>First Offense</u>. Citation during academic school year or the student admits that he or she has violated subsection II(B). Suspension from extracurricular activities for remainder of the semester or nineteen (19) school days, whichever is more.
- b. <u>Second Offense</u>. Suspension for extracurricular activities for one (1) year. Prior violations of II(B) on or off school grounds will be included as previous offenses.

C. Use of Threats or Intimidation.

- 1. <u>Use of Threats (Verbal and Written)</u>. All threats, including those alleged to be jokes, will always be taken seriously and are subject to the following disciplinary action.
 - a. <u>Level One Threat</u>. Using a threat as part of a common expression or in a context that the recipient does not feel threatened, frightened, or coerced (e.g., "Oh, I could just kill you for that" or "I will punch you in the nose").
 - (1) Maximum Sanction. Short-term suspension. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of suspension.
 - b. <u>Level Two Threat</u>. Using an expression or an implied or veiled threat with the intent of threatening, frightening, or coercing another and the recipient feels threatened, frightened, or coerced (e.g., "I will kill you.").
 - (1) Minimum Sanction. Short-term suspension. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of suspension. There is no mandated minimum sanction below grade four (4).
 - (2) Maximum Sanction. Long-term suspension. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of suspension.
 - (3) Mandatory Action. Legal authorities shall be contacted. Neb. Rev. Stat. §§79-267(1) and 293.
 - c. <u>Level Three Threat</u>. Threatening to kill or injure another person or threatening to damage property with potential for personal injury, without possessing a weapon or other object that could kill or injure the threatened or intimidated person, and the student describes how it will be done, including any threats that concern dangerous chemical substances, biochemical attacks, or bioterrorism.
 - (1) Minimum Sanction. Long-term suspension. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of suspension. There is no mandated minimum sanction below grade four (4).
 - (2) Maximum Sanction. Expulsion. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of expulsion.
 - (3) Mandatory Action. Legal authorities shall be contacted. Neb. Rev. Stat. §§79-267(1) and 293.
 - d. <u>Threatening with an Object</u>. Threatening with an object which looks like a weapon or an object that could be used to injure someone. To qualify as a lookalike weapon, the object must closely resemble a real weapon in size, shape, and color even when examined up close.
 - (1) Minimum Sanction. Long-term suspension. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of the suspension.
 - (2) Maximum Sanction. Expulsion. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of expulsion.

- (3) Mandatory Action. Legal authorities shall be contacted. Neb. Rev. Stat. §§79-267(1) and 293.
- 2. <u>Bomb Threat (Verbal or Written)</u>. Threatening to use any type of explosive or incendiary device generally referred to as a bomb to injure a person(s) or destroy property.
 - a. <u>Minimum Sanction</u>. Mandatory expulsion. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of expulsion.
 - b. <u>Mandatory Action</u>. Legal authorities shall be contacted. Neb. Rev. Stat. §28-1221; Neb. Rev. Stat. §879-267(1) and 293.

D. <u>Firearms, Explosives, and Weapons.</u>

 Firearms, Etc. Knowingly possessing, handling, transmitting, using, intimidating with, or threatening with any firearm, explosive, destructive device, pipe bomb, or stun gun. For purposes of this subsection II (D)(1), firearm means any weapon, including a starter gun, which will or is designed to or may readily be converted to expel a projectile by the action of an explosive, or the frame or receiver of any such weapon, or any firearm muffler or firearm silencer, or any destructive device. Such term does not include an antique firearm.

a. Sanctions on School Grounds.

- (1) Minimum Sanction. Mandatory expulsion for one (1) year. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of expulsion.
- (2) Mandatory Action. Legal authorities shall be contacted. Neb. Rev. Stat. §§ 28-1202 to 1204.04, 1215, 1216 and: 1220 Neb. Rev. Stat. §§ 79-267 (5) and 293.

b. <u>Sanctions off School Grounds</u>.

- (1) Citation for illegal possession of a weapon during academic school year or the student admits that he or she has violated subsection II(D). Suspension from extracurricular activities for one (1) year.
- 2. <u>Use and Possession of Other Guns</u>. Using, intimidating with, threatening with, possessing on one's person, handling or transmitting any paint ball gun, air soft gun, B.B. gun, or pellet gun.

a. Sanctions on School Grounds.

- (1) Minimum Sanction. Mandatory expulsion for one (1) year. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of expulsion.
- (2) Mandatory Action. Legal authorities shall be contacted. Neb. Rev. Stat. §§ 28-1202 to 1204.04, 1215, 1216 and: 1220 Neb. Rev. Stat. §§ 79-267 (5) and 293.

b. Sanctions off School Grounds.

- (1) Citation for illegal possession of a weapon during academic school year or the student admits that he or she has violated subsection II(D). Suspension from extracurricular activities for one (1) year.
- 3. <u>Possession of Other Guns in Vehicles</u>. Possessing any paint ball gun, air soft gun, B.B. gun or pellet gun in any vehicle on school grounds, provided that any such gun is not in any manner handled either within or outside of the vehicle.
 - a. Minimum Sanction. Expulsion. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of expulsion.

- 4. <u>Other Weapons</u>. Using or threatening with a knife, throwing star, brass knuckles, chemical substances (including, but not limited to, mace, pepper guns, and bleach), and any other object that could be used to injure a person.
 - a. <u>Sanctions on School Grounds</u>.
 - (1) Minimum Sanction. Mandatory expulsion. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of expulsion.
 - (2) Mandatory Action. Legal authorities shall be contacted. Neb. Rev. Stat. §§28-1202 to 1204.04; Neb. Rev. Stat. §§79-267 (5) and 293.

b. <u>Sanctions off School Grounds</u>.

- (1) Citation during academic school year or the student admits that he or she has violated subsection II(D). Suspension from extracurricular activities for one (1) year.
- 5. <u>Possession of Certain Prohibited Objects</u>. Knowingly possessing, handling, or transmitting knives, throwing stars, brass knuckles, or other objects not enumerated above which could cause injury.
 - a. <u>Minimum Sanction</u>. Short-term suspension. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of suspension.
 - b. <u>Maximum Sanction</u>. Long-term suspension. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of suspension.
- 6. <u>Possession of Look-a-Like Weapons</u>. Possessing a look-a-like weapon, the object must closely resemble a real weapon in size, shape, and color even when examined up close.
 - a. <u>Minimum Sanction</u>. Short-term suspension. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of suspension.
 - b. <u>Maximum Sanction</u>. Long-term suspension. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of suspension.
- 7. <u>Exception for Certain Firearms</u>. Subsection II(D) shall not apply to:
 - a. The issuance of firearms to or possession of firearms by members of the Reserve Officers Training Corps when training; or
 - b. Firearms which may lawfully be possessed by the person receiving instruction under the immediate supervision of an adult instructor who may lawfully possess firearms.
 - c. Firearms and guns which may lawfully be possessed and used off school grounds, not at a school function, activity, or event.
- E. <u>Extortion</u>. Threatening or intimidating any student for the purpose of or with the intent of obtaining money or anything of value from such student.
 - Maximum Sanction. Expulsion. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of expulsion.
 - 2. <u>Mandatory Action</u>. Legal authorities shall be contacted. Neb. Rev. Stat. §§79-267(4) and 293.
- F. <u>Sexual Assault or Attempted Sexual Assault</u>. Any sexual assault or attempt to sexually assault any person. Sexual assault shall mean sexual assault in the first or second degree as defined in Neb. Rev. Stat. §§28-319 and 320 or sexual assault of a child in the first, second or third degree as defined in Neb. Rev. Stat. §§ 28-319.01 and 320.01. Neb. Rev. Stat. §79-267(9).

1. Sanctions on School Grounds.

- a. <u>Minimum Sanction</u>. Mandatory expulsion for one (1) year. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of expulsion.
- b. <u>Mandatory Action</u>. Legal authorities shall be contacted. Neb. Rev. Stat. §§79-267(9) and 293.

2. Sanctions off School Grounds.

- a. <u>Minimum Sanction</u>. Suspension from extracurricular activities for one (1) year.
- b. Maximum Sanction. Expulsion for one (1) year. A complaint must have been filed by a prosecutor in a court of competent jurisdiction alleging that the student has sexually assaulted or attempted to sexually assault any person off school grounds not at a school function, activity, or event, and the student's presence at school has a direct and immediate effect on maintaining discipline, order, or safety in the school. Sexual assault shall mean sexual assault in the first degree as defined in Neb. Rev. Stat. §28-319, sexual assault in the second degree as defined in Neb. Rev. Stat. §28-320, sexual assault of a child in the second or third degree as defined in Neb. Rev. Stat. §28-320.01, or sexual assault of a child in the first degree as defined in Neb. Rev. Stat. §28-319.01, as such statutes now provide or may hereafter be amended Neb. Rev. Stat. §79-267(9).
- G. <u>Sexual Contact</u>. The intentional touching of another person's sexual or intimate parts or the intentional touching of another person's clothing covering the immediate area of the other person's sexual or intimate parts, without the consent of the other person. Sexual contact also includes the non-consensual touching by the other person of the actor's sexual or intimate parts or the clothing covering the immediate area of the actor's sexual or intimate parts when such touching is intentionally caused by the actor. The sexual contact must be such that it can be reasonably construed as being for the purpose of sexual arousal or gratification of either party. Neb. Rev. Stat. §828-318 and 320.

1. Sanctions on School Grounds.

- a. <u>Minimum Sanction</u>. Short-term suspension. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of suspension.
- b. <u>Maximum Sanction</u>. Expulsion. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of expulsion.
- c. <u>Mandatory Action</u>. Legal authorities must be contacted upon the request of the offended party. Neb. Rev. Stat. §79-293.

2. Sanctions off School Grounds.

- a. Citation during academic school year or the student admits that he or she has violated subsection II(G). Suspension from extracurricular activities for one (1) year.
- H. <u>Sexual Harassment</u>. Unwanted or unwelcome activity of a sexual nature which materially interferes with or substantially disrupts the educational process. This may include, but is not limited to, unwanted touching, pinching, patting, verbal comments of a sexual nature, sexual name-calling, pressure to engage in sexual activity, repeated propositions, written messages, notes, cartoons or graffiti of a sexual nature, and unwanted body contact.
 - Maximum Sanction. Expulsion. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of expulsion.

- I. <u>Harassment.</u> Any intentionally hurtful, demeaning, or disparaging acts, words, symbolic representations, or behavior used by a student or students against another student or students that is disruptive of the educational process. This includes, but is not limited to, verbal, physical, visual, or graphic actions such as name-calling, taunting, mocking, slandering, humiliating, defaming, teasing, pestering; and making derogatory remarks, demeaning jokes, disparaging drawings or notes.
 - Maximum Sanction. Expulsion. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of expulsion.
- J. <u>Bullying</u>. Any intentionally hostile or offensive verbal, written, graphic, demonstrative, or physical act that has the purpose of exerting domination over another student through the act of intimidating, frightening, oppressing, or adversely controlling the student, and that is disruptive of the educational process or any ongoing pattern of physical, verbal, written, graphic, demonstrative or electronic abuse, on school grounds, in a vehicle owned, leased, or contracted by a school being used for a school purpose by a school employee or his or her designee, or at school-sponsored activities or school-sponsored athletic events. This may include, but is not limited to, verbal, graphic, written or electronic activities such as name-calling, taunting, blackmailing, inciting to fight, terrorizing, or physical or demonstrative activities such as poking, blocking or impeding, following, hair pulling, mock hitting motions, intentionally bumping, tripping, and damaging clothing.
 - 1. <u>Maximum Sanction</u>. Expulsion. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of expulsion.
- K. Hazing. Any activity by which a person intentionally or recklessly endangers the physical or mental health or safety of an individual for the purpose of initiation into, admission into, affiliation with, or continued membership with or participation in any group or activity. Such hazing activity shall include, but shall not be limited to the following: whipping; beating; branding; forced and prolonged calisthenics; prolonged exposure to the elements; forced consumption of any food, liquor, beverage, drug, or harmful substance not generally intended for human consumption; prolonged sleep deprivation; harassing by exacting unnecessary or disagreeable work, banter, ridicule, or criticism; or any brutal treatment or the performance of any unlawful act which endangers the physical or mental health or safety of any person. Consent to the hazing by the student(s) shall not be a defense to hazing.
 - 1. Maximum Sanction. Expulsion. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of expulsion.

III. Violations Against Public Health and Safety.

A. <u>Possession of Alcohol or other Drugs</u>. Possession or use of an illegal narcotic drug, controlled substance, mood-altering or behavior-affecting substance, or look-a-like substance, or possession or use of a prescribed medication by a student for whom the prescribed medication was not prescribed; or possession or use of drug paraphernalia. Possession or use of alcohol or an alcohol-containing beverage or liquor capable of human consumption.

1. <u>Sanctions on School Grounds</u>.

- a. <u>First Offense</u>. Suspension for nineteen (19) school days. Suspension from extracurricular activities while not in school due to the suspension. Parents, at their own expense, may choose to participate in a District-approved suspension reduction program. Successful completion of this program may reduce the suspension and curtailment of extracurricular activities by a maximum of nine (9) school days (results in a total of ten (10) days out of school).
- b. <u>Second Offense</u>. Mandatory expulsion. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of expulsion. Prior violations of subsection III(A) on or off school grounds will be included as previous offenses.

 Mandatory Action. Legal authorities shall be contacted. Neb. Rev. Stat. §§79-267(6) and 293.

2. <u>Sanctions off School Grounds.</u>

- a. Citation during academic school year or the student admits that he or she has violated subsection III(A). Curtailment of extracurricular activities for nineteen (19) school days.
 - (1) First Offense. Parents, at their own expense, may choose to participate in a District-approved suspension reduction program. Successful completion of this program may reduce the curtailment of extracurricular activities by a maximum of nine (9) school days (results in a total of ten (10) school days curtailment of extracurricular activities). Previous offenses of subsection III(A) on or off school grounds during the current academic school year would not allow participation in this option.
 - (2) Second Offense. Suspension from extracurricular activities for one (1) year.
- B. <u>Distribution of Alcohol or other Drugs</u>. Distribution or attempted distribution to any other person, of any illegal narcotic drug, controlled substance, look-a-like substance, mood-altering or behavior affecting substance, drug paraphernalia, or alcohol.
 - 1. Sanctions on School Grounds.
 - a. <u>First Offense.</u> Mandatory expulsion. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of expulsion.
 - b. <u>Mandatory Action</u>. Legal authorities shall be contacted. Neb. Rev. Stat. §§79-267(6) and 293.
 - 2. Sanctions off School Grounds.
 - a. Citation during academic school or the student admits that he or she has violated subsection III(B). Curtailment of extracurricular activities for one (1) year.
- C. <u>Possession, Use and Transportation of Medications</u>. The possession, use, and transportation of prescribed and non-prescribed medications shall be in accordance with the following rules.
 - Possession of Medications (Preschool and Elementary Levels). Possession of prescribed or non-prescribed medications, or possession of prescribed or non-prescribed medications on school grounds or during transportation to and from school, is prohibited. Elementary school students may possess and use inhalers, as well as glucose tablets, according to the provisions of rule 5600.2.
 - a. <u>First Offense</u>. Short-term suspension. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of suspension.
 - b. <u>Second Offense</u>.
 - (1) Minimum Sanction. Long-term suspension. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of suspension.
 - (2) Maximum Sanction. Expulsion. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of expulsion.
 - 2. <u>Possession of Medications (Middle School Level)</u>. Possession of prescribed or non-prescribed medications, or possession of prescribed medications on school grounds <u>or</u> during transportation to and from school, is prohibited. Middle school students may transport non-prescribed medications to and from school but must turn it into the nurse

upon arrival at school. Middle school students may possess and use inhalers, as well as glucose tablets, according to the provisions of rule 5600.2.

- a. <u>First Offense.</u> <u>Short-term suspension.</u> <u>Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of suspension.</u>
 - (1) <u>Minimum Sanction.</u> <u>Short-term suspension.</u> <u>Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of suspension.</u>
 - (2) <u>Maximum Sanction. Long-term suspension. Suspension from</u> extracurricular activities during time of suspension.

b. <u>Second Offense</u>.

- (1) <u>Minimum Sanction.</u> <u>Long term suspension.</u> <u>Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of suspension.</u>
- (2) <u>Maximum Minimum Sanction. Mandatory Expulsion.</u> Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of expulsion.
- 3. Possession of Medications (High School Level). Possession of prescribed medications is prohibited. High school students may possess non-prescribed medications, but they may not possess prescribed medications except in transport to and from school. Prescribed medications must be turned into the nurse upon arrival at school. High school students may possess and use glucose tablets and inhalers according to the provisions of rule 5600.2.
 - a. <u>First Offense</u>. <u>Long term suspension</u>. <u>Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of suspension</u>.
 - (1) <u>Minimum Sanction. Short-term suspension. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of suspension.</u>
 - (2) <u>Maximum Sanction. Long-term suspension. Suspension from</u> extracurricular activities during time of suspension.

b. Second Offense.

- (1) Minimum Sanction. Mandatory Expulsion. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of expulsion.
- D. <u>Distribution of Prescribed Medications</u>. Distribution or attempted distribution to any other person, of any prescribed medication.
 - 1. <u>First Offense.</u> Mandatory expulsion. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of expulsion.
 - 2. <u>Mandatory Action</u>. Legal authorities shall be contacted. Neb. Rev. Stat. §§79-267(6) and 293.
- E. <u>Distribution of Non-Prescribed Medications</u>. Distribution or attempted distribution to any other person, of any non-prescribed medication.
 - 1. <u>First Offense</u>. Short-term suspension. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of suspension.

2. Second Offense.

- a. <u>Minimum Sanction</u>. Long-term suspension. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of suspension.
- b. <u>Maximum Sanction</u>. Expulsion. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of expulsion.

- F. <u>Receiving Non-Prescribed Medications</u>. Receiving non-prescription medications by high school students that are distributed by another student at school.
 - Maximum Sanction. Short-term suspension. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of suspension.
- G. <u>Under the Influence of Alcohol or Other Drugs</u>. Being intoxicated or under the influence of any illegal narcotic drug, controlled substance, prescribed medication by a student for whom the prescribed medication was not prescribed, mood-altering or behavior-affecting substance, or alcohol.

1. Sanctions on School Grounds.

- a. <u>First Offense</u>. Suspension for nineteen (19) school days. Suspension from extracurricular activities while not in school due to the suspension. Parents, at their own expense, may choose to participate in a District-approved suspension reduction program. Successful completion of this program may reduce the suspension and curtailment of extracurricular activities by a maximum of nine (9) school days (results in a total of ten (10) days out of school).
- b. <u>Second Offense</u>. Mandatory expulsion. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of expulsion. Prior violations of subsection III (G) on or off school grounds will be included as previous offenses.
- c. <u>Mandatory Action</u>. Legal authorities shall be contacted. Neb. Rev. Stat. §§79-267(6) and 293.

2. <u>Sanctions off School Grounds.</u>

- a. Citation during academic school year or the student admits that he or she has violated subsection III(G). Curtailment of extracurricular activities for nineteen (19) school days.
 - (1) First Offense. Parents, at their own expense, may choose to participate in a District-approved suspension reduction program. Successful completion of this program may reduce the curtailment of extracurricular activities by a maximum of nine (9) school days (results in a total of ten (10) school days curtailment of extracurricular activities). Previous offenses of subsection III(G) on or off school grounds during the current academic school year would not allow participation in this option.
 - (2) Second Offense. Suspension from extracurricular activities for one (1) year.
- H. <u>Exposure to Bodily Fluids</u>. Intentionally spitting, throwing, wiping, or otherwise dispersing bodily fluids on or to another student or staff member for the purpose of infecting, inciting, demeaning, or intimidating that person.
 - 1. <u>Minimum Sanction</u>. Short-term suspension. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of suspension.
 - 2. <u>Maximum Sanction</u>. Long-term suspension. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of suspension.
- I. Tobacco. Possession or use of tobacco or tobacco products.
 - Maximum Sanction. Long-term suspension. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of suspension.

J. <u>Possession of Fireworks</u>.

- Maximum Sanction. Long-term suspension. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of suspension.
- K. <u>Use of Fireworks</u>. Use or lighting of firecrackers or fireworks of any description.
 - Maximum Sanction. Expulsion. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of expulsion.

IV. <u>Violations against Public Decency and Good Morals.</u>

- A. <u>Public Indecency</u>. Behavior resulting in public indecency (see definition). This subsection shall apply only to students above grade five (5). Neb. Rev. Stat. §79-267(7).
 - Maximum Sanction. Expulsion. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of expulsion.
- B. <u>Profanity and Obscenity</u>. Written or oral language that is reasonably offensive or repulsive to the person hearing the same and which is disruptive of the educational process.
 - Maximum Sanction. Expulsion. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of expulsion.
- C. <u>Disparaging Language/Symbolism</u>. Disparaging or demeaning language or symbolic actions of any kind including, but not limited to gestures or language that is intended to disparage, demean, or subject another student or staff member to ridicule.
 - Maximum Sanction. Expulsion. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of expulsion.
- D. <u>Secret Organizations/Gangs</u>. Participation or membership in any secret fraternity, sorority, club, association, or organization is prohibited. The wearing of any ring, pin, or insignia of such a secret organization is also prohibited. Organizations or gangs, which initiate, advocate, or promote violence, drug or alcohol use, sex, criminal activity, or activities which disrupt the school environment or threaten the safety or well being of persons or geographic territory, unique appearance, or language, are a substantial disruption to and material interference with the educational environment, and are prohibited. The use of hand signals, graffiti, or the presence of any apparel, jewelry, accessory, or manner of grooming which, by virtue of its color, arrangement, trademark, symbol, or other attributes indicates or implies membership in or affiliation with such a group, constitutes a substantial disruption to and material interference with the educational environment, and are prohibited.
 - Maximum Sanction. Expulsion. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of expulsion.

V. <u>Violations against Property</u>.

- A. <u>Damage to Property</u>. Willfully causing or attempting to cause substantial damage or participating in behavior that results in negligent damage to property, or repeated damage to property. This shall include school property lent to the student which the student damages. As to any such damaged property, the student's parent(s) or guardian(s) shall be liable for the damage to the school property. Neb. Rev. Stat. §79-267(2).
 - 1. <u>Maximum Sanction</u>. Expulsion. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of expulsion.
 - 2. <u>Mandatory Action</u>. Legal authorities shall be contacted when the value of the property is five-hundred dollars (\$500.00) or more. Neb. Rev. Stat. §28-519; Neb. Rev. Stat. §\$79-267(2) and 293.
- B. <u>Theft/Larceny</u>. Stealing or attempting to steal property, or repeated theft of property. This will include school property lent to a student that is not returned upon demand by an authorized staff member and for which there is no reasonable justification for the failure to return the property.

Neb. Rev. Stat. §79-267(2).

- 1. <u>Maximum Sanction</u>. Expulsion. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of expulsion.
- 2. <u>Mandatory Action</u>. Legal authorities shall be contacted when the value of the property involved is two hundred dollars (\$200.00) or more. Neb. Rev. Stat. §\$28-511 and 518; Neb. Rev. Stat. §\$79-267(2) and 293.
- 3. <u>Sanctions off School Grounds</u>. Committing burglary or theft which constitutes a felony provided the student has received a citation by a law enforcement officer which involves the offense subject to this subsection or the student admits that he or she has violated subsection V(B). Suspension from extracurricular activities for one (1) year.
- C. <u>Arson or False Fire Alarm</u>. Intentionally starting a fire. Use of any fire causing agents to start or attempt to start a fire. Purposely or knowingly causing a false fire alarm. Neb. Rev. Stat. §\$28-502 to 504 and 907; Neb. Rev. Stat. §79-267(10).
 - 1. <u>Minimum Sanction</u>. Short-term suspension. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of suspension. There is no mandated minimum sanction below grade six (6).
 - 2. <u>Maximum Sanction</u>. Expulsion. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of expulsion.
 - 3. <u>Mandatory Action</u>. Legal authorities shall be contacted if it is believed the arson was criminal. Neb. Rev. Stat. §§28-502 to 504 and 907; Neb. Rev. Stat. §§79-267(10) and 293.
- D. <u>False Alarm or Report</u>. Purposely making a false alarm or false report, or purposely furnishing false information or making a false communication or statement, whether verbal, written or electronic, concerning the existence of any bomb, explosive device or weapon, dangerous chemical substance, or biochemical or terroristic device, or concerning another's intent or attempt to be made to kill, injure, or intimidate any individual or to use any bomb, explosive device, or weapon, dangerous chemical substance, or biochemical or terroristic device, or concerning the need for medical, police, or emergency services or procedures. Neb. Rev. Stat. §\$28-907 and 1221; Neb. Rev. Stat. §79-267(10).
 - Minimum Sanction. Short-term suspension. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of suspension.
 - 2. <u>Maximum Sanction</u>. Expulsion. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of expulsion.
 - 3. <u>Mandatory Action</u>. Legal authorities shall be contacted. Neb. Rev. Stat. §§28-907 and 1221; Neb. Rev. Stat. §§79-267(10) and 293.
- E. <u>Computers</u>. Direct or indirect use of District computers, computer networks, or computer systems, which involves offensive, personal, commercial, and/or religious messages, or any unauthorized access or use of a District computer, computer network, or computer system which violates District policy or state or federal law. Neb. Rev. Stat. §\$28-1341 to 1348; Neb. Rev. Stat. §79-267(10).
 - <u>Maximum Sanction</u>. Expulsion. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of expulsion.
 - 2. <u>Mandatory Action</u>. Legal authorities shall be contacted if the action constitutes a felony. Neb. Rev. Stat. §§28-1341 to 1348; Neb. Rev. Stat. §§79-267(10) and 293.

VI. Violations against School Administration.

A. Truancy. Unauthorized absence from school. Neb. Rev. Stat. §\$79-201 and 209.

- Maximum Sanction. Short-term suspension. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of suspension.
- B. <u>Gambling</u>. Playing any game of chance for money or other stakes. Neb. Rev. Stat. §79-267(10).
 - Maximum Sanction. Expulsion. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of expulsion.
- C. <u>Dishonesty</u>. Dishonesty that interferes with the educational process.
 - 1. <u>Maximum Sanction</u>. Expulsion. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of expulsion.
- D. <u>Cheating or Plagiarism.</u> Cheating on examinations including but not limited to ELO examinations. Plagiarism on projects including but not limited to reports, research papers, and portfolios.
 - Maximum Sanction. Long-term suspension. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of suspension.
- E. <u>Insubordination</u>. Disrespect for, defying authority of, or refusing to obey requests or directions of teachers, school officials or school employees.
 - 1. <u>Maximum Sanction</u>. Expulsion. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of expulsion.
- F. <u>Disruptive Behavior</u>. Behavior or possession of any item that materially interferes with or substantially disrupts class work, school activities, or the educational process.
 - Maximum Sanction. Expulsion. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of expulsion.
- G. <u>Nuisance Items.</u> Any item in a student's possession that is sufficiently annoying, offensive, unpleasant, or obnoxious that it substantially interferes with or materially interrupts the educational process. These items may include, but are not limited to, radios, camera cell phones, beepers, walkie-talkies, tape and CD players, IPods, MP3 players, cameras, devices that emit laser light beams, and other electronic devices.
 - 1. <u>Maximum Sanction</u>. Expulsion. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of expulsion.
- H. <u>Unlawful Activity</u>. Engaging in any unlawful activity not specifically covered herein, which constitutes a danger to other students or school personnel, or interferes with school purposes or the educational process. Neb. Rev. Stat. §79-267(10).
 - 1. <u>Maximum Sanction</u>. Expulsion. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of expulsion.
- I. <u>False Complaints</u>. False accusations or complaints against another student or staff member.
 - Maximum Sanction. Long-term suspension. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of suspension.
- J. <u>Noncompliance with Code Yellow or Code Red</u>. Intentionally leaving an assigned area already in containment during a Code Yellow or Code Red alert unless specifically given permission to do so by the supervisor of the assigned area.
 - Minimum Sanction. Long-term suspension. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of suspension.
 - 2. Maximum Sanction. Expulsion. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time

of expulsion.

- K. <u>Student Identification</u>. Failure of a high school student to present the school approved student identification card upon the request of a District staff member while on school grounds, in a vehicle owned, leased, or contracted by a school being used for a school purpose or in a vehicle being driven for a school purpose by a school employee or by his or her designee, or at a school-sponsored activity or athletic event.
 - Maximum Sanction. Short-term suspension. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of suspension.

VII. Repeated Offenses or Series of Prohibited Conduct.

- A. Two (2) or more violations of prohibited conduct or violation of two (2) or more of the acts prohibited herein within the academic school year which constitute a substantial interference with school purposes. Neb. Rev. Stat. §79-267(11).
 - 1. <u>Sanction</u>. Unless otherwise provided herein, prohibited conduct otherwise subject to short-term suspension shall be subject to long-term suspension; conduct otherwise subject to long-term suspension shall be subject to expulsion; prohibited conduct initially subject to expulsion shall be again subject to expulsion.

VIII. Curtailment of Extracurricular Activities.

A. General Statement. When reasonably necessary to aid the student, further school purposes, or prevent interference with the educational process, the District shall curtail a student's participation in District extracurricular activities. Students shall not be permitted to be on District property or participate in or attend District-sponsored extracurricular activities during the time period that the student is excluded from school for disciplinary reasons. In addition, students may be curtailed from extracurricular activities for misconduct taking place off school grounds and not at a school function, activity, or event during the academic school year pursuant to the provisions of this section and Rule 5400.4.

B. <u>Period of Ineligibility for Conduct on School Grounds.</u>

- 1. Period of Ineligibility. During any time period that a student is excluded from school due to short-term suspension, long-term suspension, expulsion, or emergency exclusion for conduct occurring on school grounds, in a vehicle owned, leased, or contracted by a school being used for a school purpose or in a vehicle being driven for a school purpose by a school employee or by his or her designee, or at a school-sponsored activity or athletic event, or any other place where the governing law permits the District to discipline students for prohibited conduct, the student so excluded shall also be ineligible for participation in extracurricular activities for the entire period of exclusion, and will also be prohibited from being on District property or attending any District-sponsored extracurricular events during the period of exclusion from school.
- 2. <u>Effective Following Semester if Necessary</u>. The ineligibility period shall remain in effect during the following semester (including the following school year) if there are insufficient school days in the semester to complete the ineligibility period.
- C. <u>Period of Ineligibility for Conduct off School Grounds</u>. The following prohibited conduct occurring off school grounds not at a school function, activity, or event during the academic school year shall subject the student to the following periods of ineligibility for extracurricular activities:
 - 1. <u>Guns, etc.</u> Knowingly possessing, handling, transmitting, using, intimidating with, or threatening with any object or material that is ordinarily and/or generally considered a firearm, explosive, destructive device, or weapon, including, but not limited to, guns, firearms, pipe bombs, stun guns, paint ball guns, air soft guns, B.B. guns and pellet guns, provided the student has received a citation by a law enforcement officer which involves the offense subject to this subsection or the student admits that he or she has violated this subsection.

- a. Suspension from extracurricular activities for one (1) year.
- 2. Other Weapons. Using or threatening with a knife, throwing star, brass knuckles, chemical substances (including, but not limited to, mace, pepper guns, and bleach), and any other object that could be used to injure a person, provided the student has received a citation by a law enforcement officer which involves the offense subject to this subsection or the student admits that he or she has violated this subsection.
 - a. <u>Sanction</u>. Ineligibility period of one (1) year.
- 3. <u>Sexual Contact</u>. The intentional touching of another person's sexual or intimate parts or the intentional touching of another person's clothing covering the immediate area of the other person's sexual or intimate parts, without the consent of the other person. Sexual contact also includes the non-consensual touching by the other person of the actor's sexual or intimate parts or the clothing covering the immediate area of the actor's sexual or intimate parts when such touching is intentionally caused by the actor provided the student has received a citation by a law enforcement officer which involves the offense subject to this subsection or the student admits that he or she has violated this subsection.
 - a. <u>Sanction</u>. Ineligibility period of one (1) year.
- 4. <u>Possession of Alcohol or other Drugs</u>. The use or possession of an illegal narcotic drug, drug paraphernalia, look-a-like substance, controlled substance, mood-altering or behavior-affecting substance, or alcoholic beverage, provided the student has received a citation by a law enforcement officer which involves the offense subject to this subsection or the student admits that he or she has violated this subsection.
 - a. <u>First Offense</u>. Ineligibility period of nineteen (19) school days. Parents, at their own expense, may choose to participate in a District-approved suspension reduction program. Successful completion of this program may reduce the curtailment of extracurricular activities a maximum of nine (9) school days (results in a total of ten (10) school days curtailment of extracurricular activities).
 - b. <u>Second Offense</u>. Suspension from extracurricular activities for one (1) year. Prior violations of subsection III(A) on or off school grounds will be included as previous offenses.
- 5. <u>Distribution of Alcohol or other Drugs</u>. The dispensing, sale, or the intent to sell or dispense an illegal narcotic drug, look-a-like substance, controlled substance, moodaltering or behavior-affecting substance, or alcoholic beverage, provided the student has received a citation by a law enforcement officer which involves the offense subject to this subsection or the student admits that he or she has violated this subsection.
 - a. <u>Sanction</u>. Ineligibility period of one (1) year.
- 6. <u>Under the Influence of Alcohol or other Drugs.</u> Being intoxicated or under the influence of any illegal narcotic drug, controlled substance, prescribed medication by a student for whom the prescribed medication was not prescribed, mood-altering or behavior-affecting substance, or alcohol, provided the student has received a citation by a law enforcement officer which involves the offense subject to this subsection or the student admits that he or she has violated this subsection.
 - a. <u>First Offense</u>. Ineligibility period of nineteen (19) school days. Parents, at their own expense, may choose to participate in a District-approved suspension reduction program. Successful completion of this program may reduce the curtailment of extracurricular activities a maximum of nine (9) school days (results in a total of ten (10) school days curtailment of extracurricular activities).
 - b. <u>Second Offense</u>. Suspension from extracurricular activities for one (1) year. Prior violations of subsection III(G) on or off school grounds will be included as

previous offenses.

- 7. Physical Injury to District Employees, Volunteers, and Students. Causing or attempting to cause personal injury to any District employee, school volunteer, or to any student, provided the student has received a citation by a law enforcement officer which involves the offense subject to this subsection or the student admits that he or she has violated this subsection.
 - a. <u>Sanction</u>. Ineligibility period of remainder of the semester or nineteen (19) school days, whichever is more.
 - Second Offense. Suspension from extracurricular activities for one (1) year.
 Prior violations of subsection II(B) on or off school grounds will be included as previous offenses.
- 8. <u>Sexual Assault or Attempted Sexual Assault.</u> Sexually assaulting or attempting to sexually assault any person, provided the student has received a citation by a law enforcement officer which involves the offense subject to this subsection, the student admits that he or she has violated this subsection, or a complaint has been filed by a prosecutor in a court of competent jurisdiction alleging that the student has sexually assaulted or attempted to sexually assault any person.
 - a. <u>Sanction</u>. Ineligibility period of one (1) year.
- 9. <u>Theft/Larceny</u>. Committing a burglary or theft that constitutes a felony, provided the student has received a citation by a law enforcement officer which involves the offense subject to this subsection or the student admits that he or she has violated this subsection.
 - a. <u>Sanction</u>. Ineligibility period of one (1) year.
- 10. <u>Repeated Offenses</u>. Two (2) or more offenses of one (1) of the above prohibited actions. Prior offenses of the above prohibited actions will be included as previous offenses.
 - a. <u>Sanction</u>: Ineligibility period of one (1) year.
- D. <u>District Events During Ineligibility Period</u>. Students who are ineligible for participation in extracurricular activities will also be prohibited from attending any District-sponsored extracurricular events during the ineligibility period.
- E. <u>Effective Following Semester if Necessary</u>. The ineligibility period shall remain in effect during the following semester (including the following school year) if there are insufficient school days in the semester to complete the ineligibility period.
- F. <u>Commutation</u>. Penalties assigned under this Section may be reduced by the Superintendent or Superintendent's designee upon the successful completion of counseling, community service, or other alternatives to curtailment set by the District. The District shall have the sole discretion in determining whether the student is eligible for commutation, and what form the counseling, community service, or other alternatives to curtailment must be successfully completed before commutation may take place. Any costs associated with counseling, community service, or other alternatives to curtailment shall be borne by the student or the student's parent(s) or guardian(s).
- G. <u>Effective Date</u>. The effective date of the curtailment of extracurricular activities shall be the date that the principal or principal's designee provides the student with the oral or written notice of the charges except the principal shall not issue a letter of curtailment until there is a student admission, court decision or uncontested citation.

IX. DEFINITIONS.

- A. "Alcoholic beverage" shall mean any substance subject to the jurisdiction of the Nebraska Liquor Commission.
- B. "Citation" shall mean a summons to appear in court issued by a law enforcement officer.

- C. "Controlled substance" shall mean opiates, opium derivatives, depressants, stimulants, and the substances and derivatives as defined by Neb. Rev. Stat. §28-401(4) including, but not limited to, "uppers", "downers", barbiturates, amphetamines, LSD, heroin, hashish, hallucinogenic or cocaine, and substances, such as glue, to the extent any such substance is used for the purpose of mood or behavior alteration by a student, and any other substance which alters the mood or behavior and which is not taken for medical purposes (e.g., steroids).
- D. "Curtailment of extracurricular activities" shall mean that the student is ineligible for participation in or attending any extracurricular activities. During any time that a student is excluded from school for conduct occurring while within school jurisdiction, the student is ineligible for participation in or attending any extracurricular activities.
- E. "Destructive device" shall mean (1) any explosive, incendiary or poison gas-bomb, grenade, rocket having a propellant charge of more than four (4) ounces, missile having an explosive or incendiary charge of more than one-quarter ounce, mine, or device similar to any of the devices described in the proceeding clauses; (2) any type of weapon (other than a shotgun shell which is generally recognized as particularly suitable for sporting purposes) by whatever name known which will, or which may be readily converted to expel a projectile by the action of an explosive or other propellant, and which has any barrel with a bore of more than one-half inch in diameter; and (3) any combination of parts either designed or intended for use in converting any device into any destructive device or from which a destructive device may be readily assembled.
- F. "Exclusion" shall mean that time period a student is excluded from school during short-term suspension, long-term suspension, emergency exclusion, or expulsion. It may also mean that period that the student is mandatorily reassigned.
- G. "Expulsion" shall mean exclusion from all schools in the District (except the location designated for alternative education).
- H. "Extracurricular activities" shall mean all athletic teams, activities, groups, clubs, homecomings, proms, dances, graduation ceremonies, and all other organizations or events sponsored by or associated with the District which are not part of the District curriculum.
- I. "Firearms" shall mean (1) any weapon (including a starter gun) which will or is designed to or may readily be converted to expel a projectile by the action of an explosive; (2) the frame or receiver of any such weapon; (3) any firearm muffler or firearm silencer; or (4) any destructive device. Such term does not include an antique firearm.
- J. "Illegal narcotic drug" shall mean the illegal substances as defined by Neb. Rev. Stat. §28-401(15).
- K. "Ineligibility period" shall mean that period of time that a district student is prohibited from participating in and/or attending any district extracurricular activities.
- L. "Injury" shall mean damage to a person that results in a specific wound or wounds that requires first aid treatment or a physician's care.
- M. "Long-term suspension" shall mean exclusion from all schools in the District for more than five (5) school days but less than twenty (20) school days.
- N. "Look-a-like substance" (also known as imitation controlled substance) shall mean any substance which is not a controlled substance, but which by its appearance (including, but not limited to, color, shape, size, markings, or packaging) or by representations made, induce or are intended to induce, persons to believe that the substance is a controlled substance. "Look-a-like substance" shall include any beverage containing alcohol or a beverage that is represented to contain alcohol.
- O. "Medication" shall be broadly defined and shall mean all prescribed medications, over the counter and other non-prescribed medications, and all chemical substances, compounds, homeopathic substances, herbs, vitamins, and/or devices, which purport to aid in a person's health or well-being or are intended for use in the diagnoses, cure, mitigation, treatment, or prevention of diseases, or are intended to affect the structure or any function of the body; and any device, instrument, apparatus, implement, machine, contrivance, implant, or other similar or related article, including

any component part or accessory, which is prescribed by a physician, physician assistant, or advanced practice registered nurse, and dispensed by a pharmacist or other person authorized by law.

- P. "Non-prescribed medication" shall mean all medications which are available without a prescription or order from a person who is licensed under the laws of Nebraska to prescribe medications.
- Q. "On school grounds" shall mean on District property, in a vehicle owned, leased, or contracted by the District being used for a school purpose or in a vehicle being driven for a school purpose by a school employee or his or her designee, or at a school-sponsored activity or athletic event.
- R. "One year" shall mean the three hundred sixty-five (365) days that follow the acts at issue.
- S. "Prescribed medication" shall mean all medications which are available only with a prescription or order from a person who is licensed under the laws of Nebraska to prescribe medications.
- T. "Public indecency" shall mean performing, procuring, or assisting any other person to perform, in a public place and where the conduct may reasonably be expected to be publicly viewed: (1) An act of sexual penetration; (2) An exposure of the genitals, female breasts or buttocks of the body done with intent to affront or alarm any person; or (3) A lewd fondling or caressing of the body of another person of the same or opposite sex.
- U. "School day" shall mean any day that school is in session and students are attending academic courses. It does not include practices for extracurricular activities held during the summer, or weekends and vacations that occur during the academic school year.
- V. "School jurisdiction" shall mean on District property, in a vehicle owned, leased, or contracted by the District being used for a school purpose or in a vehicle being driven for a school purpose by a school employee or his or her designee, or at a school-sponsored activity or athletic event, or any other place where the governing law permits the District to discipline students for prohibited conduct.
- W. "Sexual assault" shall mean sexual assault in the first degree as defined in Neb. Rev. Stat. §\$28-319, sexual assault in the second degree as defined in Neb. Rev. Stat. §28-320, sexual assault of a child in the second or third degree as defined in Neb. Rev. Stat. §28-320.01, or sexual assault of a child in the first degree as defined in Neb Rev. Stat. §28-319.01, as such statutes now provide or may hereafter be amended.
- X. "Sexual or intimate parts" shall mean the genital area, groin, inner thighs, buttocks or breasts.
- Y. "Short-term suspension" shall mean exclusion from all schools in the District not to exceed five (5) school days.
- Z. "Under the influence" shall mean the manifestation of physical and physiological symptoms or reactions caused by the use of any illegal narcotic drug, controlled substance, mood-altering or behavior-affecting substance, prescribed medication by a student for whom the prescribed medication was not prescribed, or alcohol.





This year, in addition to looking at traditional insurance sources, they studied the possibility of a self-insurance program for our liability coverage (similar to what we are doing with health insurance).
	Representatives of HAKCO will be at the meeting and will present information on the use of self-insurance for liability coverage. (See their presentation materials attached.)
	So far, we find the proposal to be encouraging. And, unless there is something significant that has not yet surfaced, we will be recommending this proposal to the board. The final decision must be made in time so that arrangements can be made to switch to the self-funded retention program by June 1 st when our present policies expire.
	[Note: At the board meeting, we will be listening closely to board comments. If there are no opposing comments, we plan to proceed further with the project and seek proposals from third-party administrators (TPAs). After getting specific dollar information for TPAs, we will be in a position to make a final recommendation to the board.]

Legislative Update April 4, 2011

K-12 Funding

LB 235 is set for debate soon. The number for state aid is up 12 million so we are looking at 822 Million. The Governor's proposal was 810 million.

Commission of Industrial Relations

This bill should be out soon. The NASB does not yet support the changes. The NCSA has indicated some support. I think all the other groups involved are supportive. I should have the details of the agreement soon.

Bills of Interest

LB 558 was moved to final reading. This bill allows joint entities to operate focus schools and if they support the diversity plan they will be entitled to an increase in state aid.

There are several bills that change the school aid formula to reflect the reductions they intend to make.

LB 235 reduces state aid with a goal of reaching 838 million in funding.

LB 364 reduces allowances for student growth, instructional time and advanced teaching degrees. We oppose this bill.

Learning Community Bills

LB 463 changes provisions relating to truancy

LB 558 changes the provisions relating to focus schools

These following two bills are not out of committee.

LB 615 changes provisions relating to access to student records

LB 636 changes provisions relating to access to student records

National News and Advocacy Issues

President Barack Obama said Monday that he envisions a new federal education law that relies less on standardized tests to measure achievement. "Too often what we have been doing is using these tests to punish students or to, in some cases, punish schools," he said during a town hall event. Obama also pointed out that over-testing can take the fun out of learning for students. He said standardized tests should not be the only measure of student --

and school -- achievement, and that perhaps tests should not be administered annually, but rather every few years.

Federal Budget Cuts

Education advocates, schools and districts are awaiting word about the severity of K-12 cuts as Congress prepares to meet an April 8 deadline for crafting a new fiscal 2011 budget plan. A series of short-term fixes has eliminated funding for high-profile programs such as Head Start and the Striving Readers Program. However, while Republican leaders are calling for deeper, long-term cuts to education this year, President Barack Obama has said he will oppose any additional reductions for schools.

Millard Public Schools Foundation 2011-2012 Site Plan Grant Recipients

Grace Abbott Elementary Scholastic Reading Inventory \$2,475.00

Scholastic Reading Inventory (SRI) is a computer-based reading assessment program that will be given a few times a year to gauge a student's progress in reading. It supports the Leveled Literacy Inventory and will allow teachers to better make educational decisions for each of their students.

Ackerman Elementary Family Night @ Your Library \$3,903.00

The purpose of Family Nights @ Your Library is to give parents and students the opportunity to enhance their love of reading. Families will be invited to the library to learn about interesting topics via presentations and hands-on activities. While at the library, families will be encouraged to check out books, read together, listen to stories, and use the computers,

Black Elk Elementary Developing Assets through Learning and Literature \$4.735.00

Building assets directly correlates to student success in both the academic school setting and in life outside of school. Our intent is to build on the 40 Developmental Assets by focusing on service to others (Asset #9) and establishing meaningful relationships with adult role models (Asset #14). This will be done by becoming active participants in a service learning project. Our second focus will be to develop achievement motivation (Asset #21) through offering a variety of literacy learning opportunities during the summer months. These differentiated experiences will increase academic achievement among all participants.

Bryan Elementary Reading Together & the Kindness and Honor Retreats \$9,947.50

Reading Together is a year-long, research-based, and structured after-school tutoring program designed to improve reading motivation, reading fluency, and reading comprehension in second and third grade students as well as in their fourth and fifth grade tutors.

The Kindness Retreat will help create a more caring school community by engaging Gr. 4 and Gr. 5 students in a full day of activities that demonstrate the negative effects of bullying and emphasize the value of kindness. The Honor Retreat is designed to, through a half day of activities, transform building staff into a cohesive team that is focused in a common direction.

Cather Elementary Soaring High with Students and Parents \$8,180.00

This project will involve a variety of learning styles in formats for students' involvement to increase their learning environment. Workshops provided to students and parents will support and extend learning in the areas of reading, writing, math, science, and music which are critical at the elementary level. Four different workshop formats will involve students at various grade levels with additional opportunities to learn and enrich reading, writing, math, science, and music skills that will help them reach their highest potential.

Cody Elementary Cody Site Plan Grant \$12,834.13

programs will support our mission to "guarantee each student the foundation for current and future academic success." The first, an after school intermediate study center, has been operating since 1994. The second, Cody's Leadership Development Project, implements the philosophies of the Nebraska Human Resources Institute.

Disney Elementary Parents and Students Together time (PASTime) \$15.219.13

Our grant proposal is designed to bring families together at home and at school through a variety of learning activities. These activities will include a "One School~One Book" project and Family Night Celebration, quarterly clubs offered outside the school day, asset development activities, evening parent education classes and literacy information for pre-kindergarten parents. All activities are designed to strengthen the learning partnership between home and school. A pastime is a diversion that occupies one's time and thoughts, usually pleasantly. That's what we hope our families will find with PASTtime.

Ezra Millard Elementary Ezra Millard Soaring into Excellence \$23,915

The intent of this project is to develop time outside of the school day where students, parents and teachers can collaborate to increase student learning. Outlined in this grant are plans that will help support Ezra students and families.

Through these projects we will address academic areas and social emotional needs of students. By providing specific information and activities, we hope to further engage our parent community more, which could result in higher achievement scores.

Harvey Oaks Elementary Animal Antics Adventures \$16.510.27

To support Harvey Oaks Elementary Animal Antic Adventures, we are asking for funding to meet the target of our site plan's educational goals. The activities and programs will use 21s Century Skills, small group learning experiences, and summer school (Leapfrog into the School Year) for invited 2nd and 3rd grade students. To achieve this goal, we will use educational and technological literacy and teach students how to access information efficiently and effectively to help them thrive in a global economic world.

Holling Heights Elementary Stretch the Leaning \$24,264.30

The grant is focused on stretching students' learning opportunities. Some of these opportunities are related to re-organizing and supporting students during the traditional instructional day. Others are related to stretching the students' day by extending the leaning opportunities to before and after school. The plan is focused on extending learning opportunities for all students and to increase parent and community involvement.

Neihardt Elementary Building Students – One Asset at a Time \$4,250.00

In order to guarantee that students achieve personal excellence and responsible citizenship we must ensure that our entire school community is inspired and engaged. This grant would provide the resources needed to strengthen the positive relationships necessary for building a thriving school climate and culture. Our intent is to implement plans that embed the 40 Developmental Assets into the Neihardt culture.

Norris Elementary Developing Our Whole School Community \$3,100.00

Staff, student, and parental engagement is vital to ensuring the academic, social, and emotional success of all students in a school community. As a school grows and changes, so must its members. The school improvement team at Norris will provide our students, staff members, and parents opportunities to engage in activities that will grow us as a unified collaborative community. We will increase student achievement by developing our students understanding of the 40 Developmental Assets, by providing our parents opportunities to increase their presence at school, and by enhancing professional relationships in order to communicate effectively when discussing student learning.

Ronald W. Reagan Elementary Coming Together: Engaging Our School and Community through Service Learning \$21,630.00

What could be better than to combine the energy and excitement of learning with the task of providing community service to those in need? By 'coming together' we will engage our school and community through service learning projects. Based on the structure developed by the Search Institute (Developmental Assets), our school will provide staff development followed by the planning and implementation of meaningful service that is linked to the Millard curriculum. Through this grant, we will engage our students, parents, and community helping each to gain mutual respect while strengthening the citizenship of each entity.

Sandoz Elementary STRIPE Club and Jumpstart for out Tiger Cubs \$9,824.25

The intent of this grant is to promote achievement at Mari Sandoz Elementary School by fostering a culture of high expectations for all students by supporting learning beyond the school day by:

- · Offering a primary study center for first and second graders hosted two nights a week
- Offering a week long jumpstart program to introduce incoming kindergartners to our school and their new learning environment

Upchurch Elementary LEAP (L-eaper E-nrichment A-sset P-rogram) \$7,450.00

The intent of this grant is to promote achievement and build a community of learners at Wilma Upchurch Elementary School by fostering a culture of high expectations for all students by supporting opportunities to learn beyond the school day and throughout the year.

Wheeler Elementary RTI+I \$12,180.00

RTI+I supports Wheeler in collaboratively targeting and meeting the individual needs of all learners, specifically in the area of literacy. Reaching Learners' Literacy Needs in Summer, Teacher Development in Literacy, Individual Literacy Assessment, and Involving all Stakeholders are each projects that support Wheeler reaching a new level of excellence. This grant allows us to fully optimize the RTI+I model as defined by MPS and attain Wheeler's mission.

BIST Program for Elementary Schools Abbott, Ackerman, Black Elk, Bryan, Disney, Ezra Millard, Harvey oaks, Hitchcock, Holling Heights, Morton, Neihardt, Reeder, Rockwell, Rohwer, Sandoz \$37,000

Fifteen elementary schools are seeking funding to guarantee that each student develops the character traits and masters the knowledge and skills necessary for personal excellence and responsible citizenship. This is the mission of our school district that is supported by the District Strategic Plan, as well as individual building Site Plans. This grant would provide a funding source for the implementation of B.I.S.T. (Behavior Intervention Support Team) at fifteen elementary schools. After researching many programs and implementing B.I.S.T. in several buildings, these schools are committed to B.I.S.T. implementation as a vehicle to systematically and consistently support our students to learn the life skills necessary for positive social behavior and responsible citizenship.

Beadle Middle School Shared Decision Making to Enhance Engagement of All Stakeholders \$14,970.06

Our building wrote a new site plan in the 2010 / 2011 school year. The overall intent of our new plan is to increase engagement for all stakeholders; students, parents, staff. We use Gallup's concept of Engagement and Search Institute's 40 Developmental Assets as frameworks to guide our efforts.

In an effort to increase engagement, our school has created shared decision making teams. Each team has a unique focus; instruction, technology, and wellness. Our fourth shared decision making team is the School Improvement Team as defined in Policy 10,000. Each team is submitting a grant request.

Central Middle School Every Child, Every Promise: Helping All Students Reach Their Highest Potential \$25,420

It is our goal at CMS to ensure that *all* of our students are engaged in school and reaching their highest potential. The average number of assets experienced by young people drops from 6th grade through 11th grade, with a slight rebound beginning in 12th grade, and this has important implications for young adolescents during their formative middle school years (Scales et al., 2005). Through a school-wide emphasis on the intentional building of Developmental Assets, as well as through after-hour and summer programs, we are focused on reversing this trend.

Kiewit Middle School Making Learning Irresistible – Thriving in Challenging Times \$17.945.00

This proposal will blend current deeply rooted successful practices unique to our school with new and exciting learning opportunities. It will integrate preteaching/reteaching opportunities in the core academic areas, offer specific and efficient academic instructional remediation (RTI+I) within and beyond the traditional school day, continue extended Media Information Center and Learning Center hours, enhance life skills, and implement diverse systems of support and intervention to increase student achievement with a focus on 40 Developmental Assets, literacy, positive discipline, 21st Century technology, and parent/community involvement for an improvement in the overall culture of our school.

Millard North Middle School Service Learning at NMS: Making a difference for our community. Meeting Means Success \$10,639.73

Community service has been a part of Millard North Middle School for a number of years. IB MYP requires students to participate in community services hours each year. We have discovered that these experiences have taught students lessons above and beyond than what could have occurred in the classroom. With support from this grant we aspire to create a service learning approach for ALL students at our school.

Service learning will make a strong connection the curriculum, involve research and student choice. These elements will help make the process and products of service learning more meaningful for those involved. Service learning will help our students build up many of the developmental assets for themselves while making a difference in our community. This program has the potential to have a positive effect on all students and staff at North Middle School for many years to come. We intend to use the grant money to help support the planning, organization, transportation and material needs that arise.

Intent of requested grant: Assistance to develop a more full and rich educational experience for our high ability students in the classroom. Very often, time and energy is spent on students are struggling; while the students that have a stronger understanding of the material are left to wait, not engaged or challenged. We strongly desire to research, plan and organize learning opportunities that will challenge students at all levels; and this grant would give us the opportunity to focus on the high ability learner.

Millard Middle School Alternative Program How was Your Day at MSAP? \$8,220.00

The Millard Middle School Alternative Program provides unique learning experiences for students at risk of school failure or drop-out. Student success in our program is largely due to extensive one-on-one attention, a comprehensive behavior management system, a Developmental Asset focus, and most importantly, the relationships our staff members have with the students. Because of this, transitioning our students to other middle schools for after school opportunities has not proven successful. Through our project, we will provide extension opportunities for our students in an environment that sets them up for success.

Millard North High School Mustang Mentoring Program \$24,750.00

Our intent is to continue to train approximately 100 juniors and seniors in leadership development skills over the course of the school year while in turn they mentor the entire freshman class. Our goal is to make the transition to high school and their entire first year a positive and successful one. The freshmen class will be broken down into groups of roughly 13 students with two mentors. Each week the mentors will meet with their group to host activities and conversations centered on building habits and assets in their lives for success.

Millard West High School Fostering Coping and Resiliency Skills PSAT \$13,000.00

The 40 Developmental Assets provide a research based framework of building strengths in our young people. We are currently facing increasing numbers of young people who are lacking the coping skills and resiliency skills needed to work through difficult situations. At the same time, many young people are not recognizing the impact of their poor choices or negative behavior on others, and we are concerned about incidences of bullying and callous behavior sometimes exhibited by students. This grant is being written to provide a series of experiences which will increase caring, kindness, and tolerance while at the same time helping students improve their coping skills. It is also designed to increase relationship building between adult staff members and students through the idea of cultivating and recognizing student SPARKS.

This project will help to maximize our students' performance on the PSAT. A result will be to increase the number of students from our school who qualify for the National Merit Scholarship program by providing additional study and preparation. Student who take the PSAT/NMSQT during their junior year are considered for the National Merit Scholarship program. This is an annual academic competition for recognition and scholarships which is open to all high school juniors who meet published entry requirements. Qualifying students typically show exceptional academic academic ability and potential for success in rigorous post-secondary programs. As students improve their performance on the PSAT, our reputation as a highly academically rigorous high school will increase opportunities for students to attend highly selective colleges.

Millard South High School Building a Foundation to Provide Academic Success Patriot mentoring Program \$5,513.00

At our school our overall goal is to raise student engagement each year we have a student. In doing so we want to ensure that no student falls between the cracks. All of these programs help increase connectedness to school. Research indicates that the more connected or engaged a student feels to his/her school, the more academic success he or she will obtain. The programs proposed truly fill-in those gaps to provide students and family with resources to achieve.

At our school our overall goal is to raise student engagement each year we have a student. In doing so we want to ensure that no student falls between the cracks. All of these programs help increase connectedness to school. Research indicates that the more connected or engaged a student feels to his/her school, the more academic success he or she will obtain. The programs proposed truly fill-in those gaps to provide students and family with resources to achieve.

The intent of the mentoring program is two-fold. First, and foremost, our goal is to help our 9th grade students transition to high school. This can be a difficult process for some students. Students worry about a number of things: Where is my locker? Will I find my classrooms? Will I know anyone? Am I going to be picked on? With the mentoring program, our freshmen students have the benefit of two upperclassmen who serve as student mentors, and role models, throughout the year in their homeroom/advisement. The second intent of our program is to provide opportunities to develop leadership with our upperclassmen.

Special Education Department Interactive Social Education Experiences (iSEE) \$21,352.39

Autism Spectrum Disorders are the second most common serious developmental disability. Since 1994, the number of students with an educational verification of Autism has increased in Millard by 65%, and Special Education teachers have noted an increase number of students with Asperger's Syndrome (AS) and High Functioning Autism (HFA). While each student is unique, shared traits include difficulty understanding nonverbal communication, feeling empathy, initiating and terminating conversations and recognizing the need for social reciprocity. This frequently results in a life of unemployment, social isolation, and loneliness. This program will enable Special Education teachers to hold weekly after-school social communication classes. There will also be monthly outings in the general community for selected students with AS and HFA with peers they have been paired with to help them improve their social skills and quality of life.
