A meeting was held of the Board of Education of the School District No. 17, in the County of Douglas in the State of Nebraska. The meeting was convened in open and public session at 6:30 p.m., Monday, April 18, 2011, at the Don Stroh Administration Center, 5606 South 147th Street.

Present: Dave Anderson, Mike Pate, Linda Poole, Mike Kennedy, and Patrick Ricketts

Notice of this meeting was given in advance thereof by publication in the Daily Record on Friday, April 15, 2011; a copy of the publication is being attached to these minutes. Notice of this meeting was given to all members of the Board of Education and a copy of their Acknowledgment of Receipt of Notice and the agenda are attached to these minutes. Availability of the agenda was communicated in advance notice and in the notice of the Board of Education of this meeting. All proceedings hereafter shown were taken while the convened meeting was open to the attendance of the public.

At 6:30 p.m. Dave Anderson called the meeting to order and announced the public meeting Act is posted on the wall and available for public inspection. Mr. Anderson asked everyone to say the Pledge of Allegiance.

Roll call was taken and all members were present.

Motion by Mike Kennedy seconded by Linda Poole, to approve the Board of Education Minutes from April 4, 2011, to approve the bills, and receive the treasurer's report and place on file, upon roll call vote, all members voted aye. Motion carried.

Linda Poole summarized the Committee of the Whole meeting from Thursday, April 14, 2011. The topic of discussion was on safety and security.

Showcase highlighted students from Millard West and Millard South in swimming.

Employees of the Month were Renee Kaspar, paraprofessional at Kiewit Middle School and Julia Kolander, Latin teacher at Millard North High School.

Superintendent's Comments:

1. Reminder that Dr. Lutz will be absent for the next couple of weeks. Plans are to be back around May 16th.
2. Board members were encouraged to review their calendar in regards to all of the upcoming events in April and May.
3. There are tickets available if Board members would like to attend the Millard Business Association Gala.
4. Dr. Lutz reviewed the timeline for submission of applications for the board vacancy. He also talked about the procedure for interviews, and on the voting process for the candidates at a board meeting.
5. A reminder that graduation is set for Saturday, May 28, 2011 with Millard North at 10 a.m., Millard South at 1 p.m. and Millard West for 4 p.m.

Board Comments:

Mike Kennedy expressed his frustration about the comments made by Rick Kolowski from the Learning Community, because it was an attack on board members. They were very offensive comments.

Mr. Kennedy said the National School Boards Association Conference was a collaborative opportunity, and was a beneficial conference to attend.

Mike Pate corrected a comment by Mr. Kennedy that Rick Kolowski is not a school board member, but a member of the Learning Community board.

Mr. Pate said he attended several sessions at the National School Boards Association Conference. One was on using the iTouch in the classroom, and another was the Blue Valley, KS presentation on their business partnership program. Their students actually are involved in the day to day operations at a business and get real life working skills along with receiving dual credit. He had information to share with the district.

Linda Poole wished Dr. Lutz well in the next few weeks, and that things will run just fine.

Mrs. Poole expressed interest in attending the Millard Business Association dinner.

Mrs. Poole stated that she too was offended by the comments made by Rick Kolowski. She said this board has an educator, a banker, a financial planner, a chief financial officer of a company, and an attorney which makes for the best well rounded board of education.

Mrs. Poole reported that she is on spring break from her teaching, so she took her student teacher and visited Aldrich Elementary and Montclair Elementary to observe classes.

Mrs. Poole provided information about two of the speakers at the National School Boards Conference, which were Condoleezza Rice and Daniel Pink. She also attended the presentation by the Teacher of the Year, who is from Iowa, and went to the exhibition hall to see what other districts are using. BACKGROUND: Outside consultants were recently engaged to conduct a study of the District’s purchasing processes and procedures. One of the recommendations made by the consultants was that the District use procurement cards to reduce the cost of processing payments for small transactions and to facilitate purchases where traditional purchase orders are not accepted.

Proposed Policy 3122 authorizes the use of procurement cards in the District with the issuance and use of such cards subject to procedures promulgated by the superintendent (or designee).

The procurement card procedures have been drafted and are attached for your review. You will also note that training is required for all cardholders. Each card holder must receive a perfect score on the assessment contained in the training before he/she is issued a card.



**Procedures for
Procurement Cards
(P-Card)**

- 1.0 Definitions
 - 1.1 “Credit card” shall mean a bank card that permits the named holder to purchase goods on account.
 - 1.2 “Procurement card” (a/k/a “P-Card) shall mean a credit card that may have programmed limitations with regard to the total dollar amount or with regard to approved vendors or merchandise that may be purchased on account.
- 2.0 Persons Authorized
 - 2.1 The superintendent shall be the only person authorized to have a District credit card that does not have the limitation capabilities of a procurement card.
 - 2.2 The following personnel may be authorized to use a District procurement card:
 - 2.2.1 Members of the Superintendent’s Executive Committee
 - 2.2.2 Building Principals
 - 2.2.3 Athletic Directors
 - 2.2.4 Others as approved by the Superintendent (or Designee).
- 3.0 Authorization Process
 - 3.1 Any request to be authorized to carry and use a District procurement card shall be submitted on the Cardholder Application Form found on the intranet under Business Office > Documents > Accounts Payable > Procurement Cards. The request for authorization shall be signed by both the requestor and his/her supervisor.
 - 3.2 Any person authorized to carry and use a District procurement card must satisfactorily completed the Business Office required training before being issued such card. Additionally, any administrator who intends to have a secretary or other person designated to assist him/her with the requirements related to p-cards must have his/her secretary satisfactorily complete the training as well.
- 4.0 P-Card vs. Purchase Order

- 4.1 All purchases of \$200 or less should be made on a p-card. (This may not always be possible, especially in cases where the vendor does not accept credit cards.)
- 4.2 “Blanket Purchase Orders” will no longer be used in the District.
- 5.0 Documentation and Submission
 - 5.1 All purchases on a District procurement card must be properly documented as follows: *[Note: More specific information, including screen shots, related to this section can be accessed on the intranet at Business Office > Documents > Accounts Payable > Procurement Cards > P-Card Documentation]*
 - 5.1.1 Complete Online Statement: The P-card statement is available online on the 28th day of each month. Access the statement online and enter the required information for the description and budget code.
 - 5.1.2 Print Online Statement: The card holder (or designee) shall print the online statement after entering the budget code and transaction description.
 - 5.1.3 Attach Documentation to Statement: Each card holder shall attach original receipts (or confirmation sheets for online purchases) for all charges. If a packing slip, shipping confirmation, or other such document is received with the order, attach such documentation as well.
 - 5.1.4 Submit Statement and Documentation: The above documentation shall be submitted to the Business Office on or before the 5th day of each month. Such documentation shall carry the approval signatures of both the cardholder and his/her supervisor.
 - 5.2 Any issues related to the purchase (e.g., damaged goods, back orders, delivery, etc.) must be addressed by the cardholder – not the District’s purchasing and receiving departments or the Business Office.
 - 5.2.1 P-card purchases must be delivered to the cardholder’s building. If it is desired that a delivery be made to the warehouse, the purchase needs to be made on a purchase order rather than a p-card.
 - 5.3 The cardholder should verify that the vendor is not charging Nebraska sales tax on the purchase.
 - 5.3.1 Note: The p-card will have the District’s state tax exempt number displayed on its face. Occasionally, the vendor resists granting the exemption. If this occurs, continue with the purchase but notify the Business Office of such. The Business Office will work with the vendor to ensure that future purchases are not subjected to the tax.

5.3.2 Note: Nebraska schools are NOT exempt from sales tax in other states. Therefore, a purchase in Council Bluffs will be subject to Iowa sales tax.

5.3.3 Note: Internet purchases are exempt from sales tax at this time.

6.0 Unauthorized Charges:

6.1 The following charges to a procurement card are prohibited (this is not an all-inclusive list):

6.1.1 Any expenses that are not for school business purposes or are not reasonable or necessary

6.1.2 Gift certificates, gift cards, or cash advances

6.1.3 Alcoholic beverages, tobacco products, or lottery tickets

6.1.4 Fuel

6.1.5 Meals

6.1.6 Purchases that the cardholder wants charged to a future budget year (e.g., a p-card purchase prior to July 28, 2011 cannot be charged to the 2011-12 budget year because the p-card bill will be paid in August (i.e., the last month of the 2010-11 budget year).

6.1.7 Personal services provided by individuals or Limited Liability Corporations (LLC)

6.1.8 Purchases of computers, monitors, printers, or other devices that will be connected to the District's network unless prior approval has been received from the technology division.

6.1.9 Purchases of appliances, furniture, file cabinets, book shelves, storage units, etc. unless prior approval has been received from the purchasing department.

6.1.10 Purchases of office equipment and/or supplies other than through the District's approved single-source vendor unless prior approval has been received from the purchasing department. [Note: As of May 1, 2011, the District does not have a single-source vendor, so this section is not active at this time. When such single-source arrangements are made, all cardholders will be notified.]

6.2 Using a P-card for unauthorized purchases may result in any or all of the following:

6.2.1 Revocation of the cardholder's privileges

6.2.2 Reimbursement of the expense of the purchase to the District

6.2.3 Disciplinary action up to and including termination of employment

7.0 Termination of Privileges

- 7.1 Failure to submit appropriate documentation for monthly charges on a procurement card within the time constraints noted herein above shall result in a temporary or permanent termination of card privileges.
 - 7.2 Notwithstanding the above, the authorization to use a procurement card may be rescinded at anytime for any reason or no reason at all by the Superintendent (or designee).
- 8.0 Exceptions
- 8.1 Any exceptions to the provisions in these procedures may only be granted in writing by the superintendent (or designee).
- 9.0 Lost & Stolen Cards
- 9.1 If a p-card is lost or stolen, the cardholder shall call the Business Office as soon as possible to report such. On nights and/or weekends when the Business Office is not open, the cardholder should call his/her supervisor or Ken Fossen (Associate Superintendent for General Administration).
- 10.0 Termination of Employment
- 10.1 When a cardholder retires, resigns, or otherwise terminates employment with the District, the supervisor shall secure the employees card and submit it to the Business Office.

- I. The District shall provide the following student transportation services to students at the elementary school level:
- A. Any elementary students who live more than two miles from their assigned schools shall be provided free transportation services to such schools. ~~There shall be no charge for such services.~~
 - B. The board of education may, in its sole discretion, approve additional free transportation services for students who reside within two miles of their assigned school, however, there shall be no bus stops located within a one-mile radius of the main entrance of such elementary school. Students residing within such one-mile radius may, if they so choose, walk to a regularly scheduled bus stop (beyond one mile) to board and ride such bus.
 - C. The location and spacing of bus stops (consistent with the foregoing) shall be determined by the superintendent (or designee).
 - D. In areas where there is no district-provided transportation service, parents may, at their expense, seek to contract for such services directly with the District's contracted transportation service provider (or any other transportation provider).
 - ~~B. Any elementary student who lives in a subdivision that was assigned to a school other than its neighborhood school shall be provided transportation services to his/her assigned school provided that such services were approved by the Board of Education at the time of such reassignment.~~
 - ~~C. Any student who, in his/her walks to school, encounters at least three of the following five circumstances shall be provided transportation services at no charge:

 - ~~1. The student must cross a road with a speed limit of 45 mph or greater.~~
 - ~~2. The student must, due to lack of sidewalks, walk in a nonresidential street (or the unimproved area immediately adjacent thereto).~~
 - ~~3. The student must cross a four lane (or more) state or federal highway or interstate highway.~~
 - ~~4. The student must cross one or more non residential intersections that (a) do not have pedestrian crossing signs, markings, or signals, or (b) do not have sufficient visual range for safe pedestrian crossing.~~
 - ~~5. The student must traverse consistently high volume roadways where temporary road conditions present limited walking space.~~~~
- II. The District shall provide the following student transportation services to students at the Middle School level:
- A. The District shall arrange transportation services for all middle school students who live more than two miles from their assigned schools. There shall be a charge for such transportation. The charge for such services shall be determined annually by the District. The charge may (but need not be) sufficient to recover the full cost for such services.
 - B. No transportation services shall be arranged by the District for students living within two miles of their assigned schools, however, the parents of such student may, at their expense, seek to contract for such services with the District's contracted transportation service provider (or any other transportation provider).

- C. Any middle school student who lives in a subdivision that was reassigned to another middle school further from the subdivision than its original school shall be provided transportation services to his/her assigned school provided that such services were approved by the Board of Education at the time of such reassignment
- III. The District shall provide the following student transportation services to students at the high school level:
- A. The District shall provide transportation services free of charge to any student who lives more than four miles from his/her assigned school. However, the District may, at its sole discretion, elect to provide mileage reimbursement to any or all such qualifying students in lieu of transportation. The mileage reimbursement rate for such shall be as prescribed by state law.
 - B. No transportation services shall be provided by the District for students living within four miles of their assigned high schools, however, the parents of such students may, at their expense, seek to contract for such services with the District's contracted transportation service provider (or any other transportation provider).
- IV. Unless otherwise required by law, the District shall not provide transportation services to in-district transfer students (i.e., those students who, at their request, are permitted to attend a school other than the school to which they would have been assigned based upon the location of their residence).

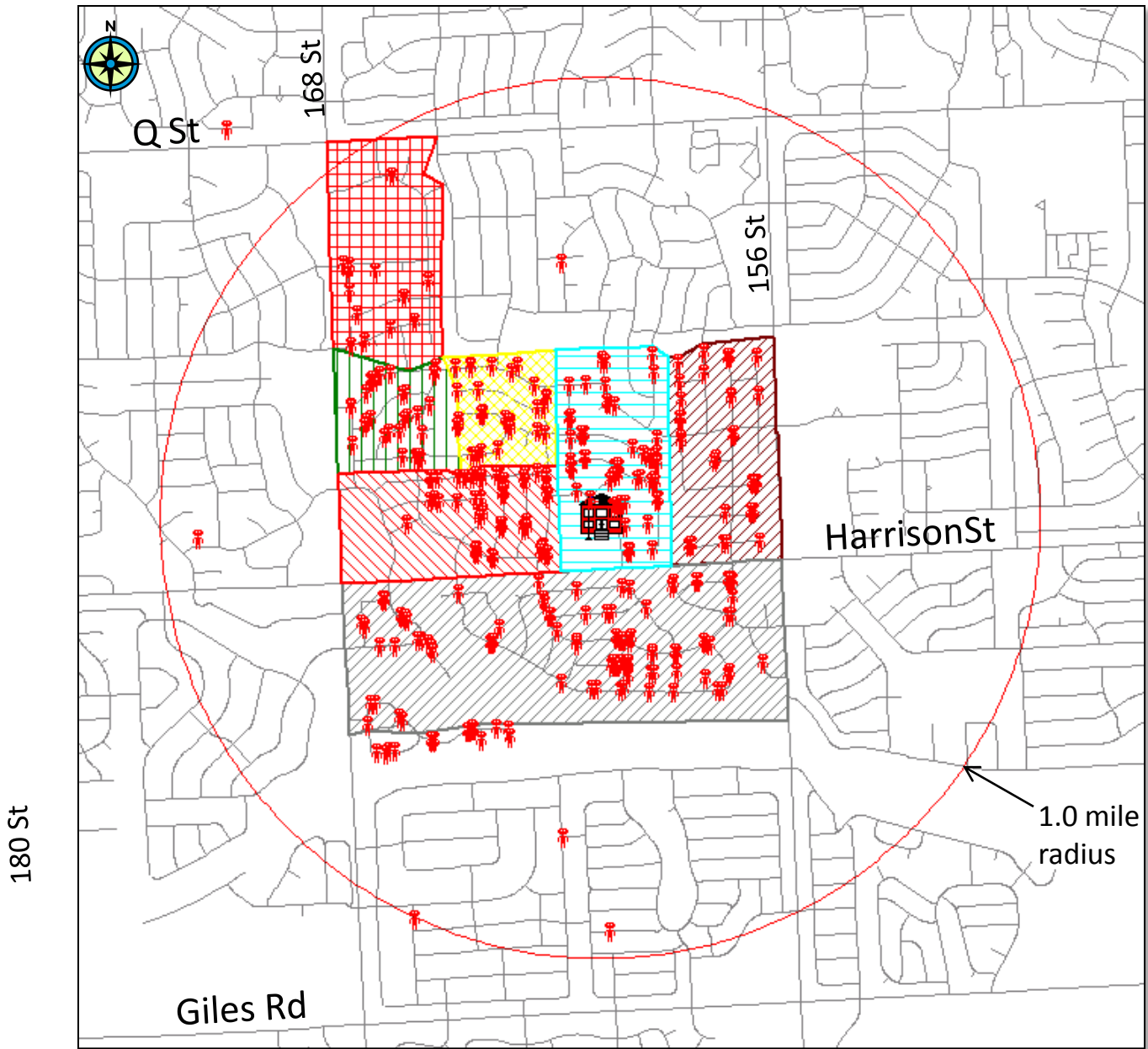
Aldrich Elementary 1.0 Mile Radius Scenario

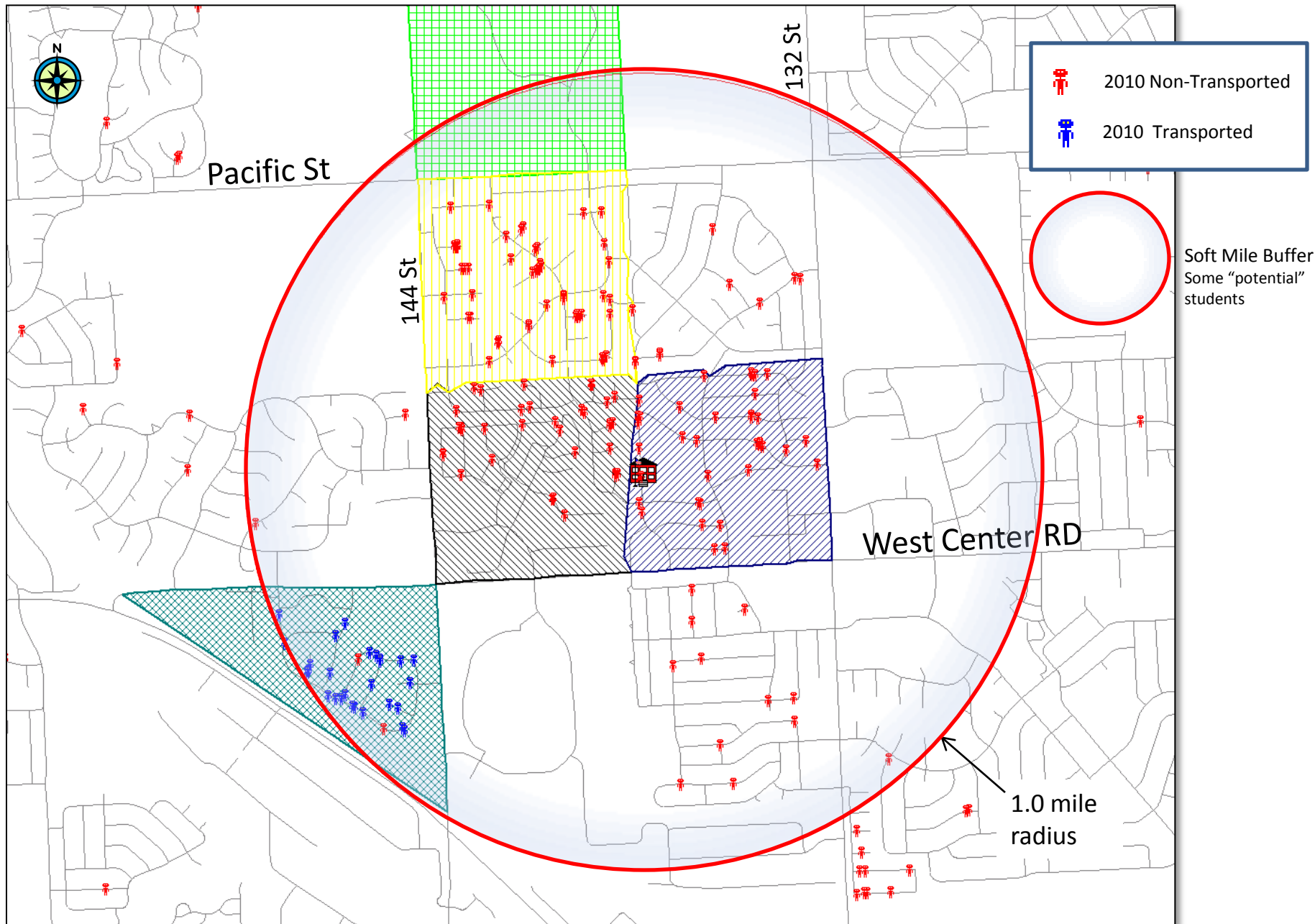
Holling Heights Elementary 1.0 Mile Radius Scenario

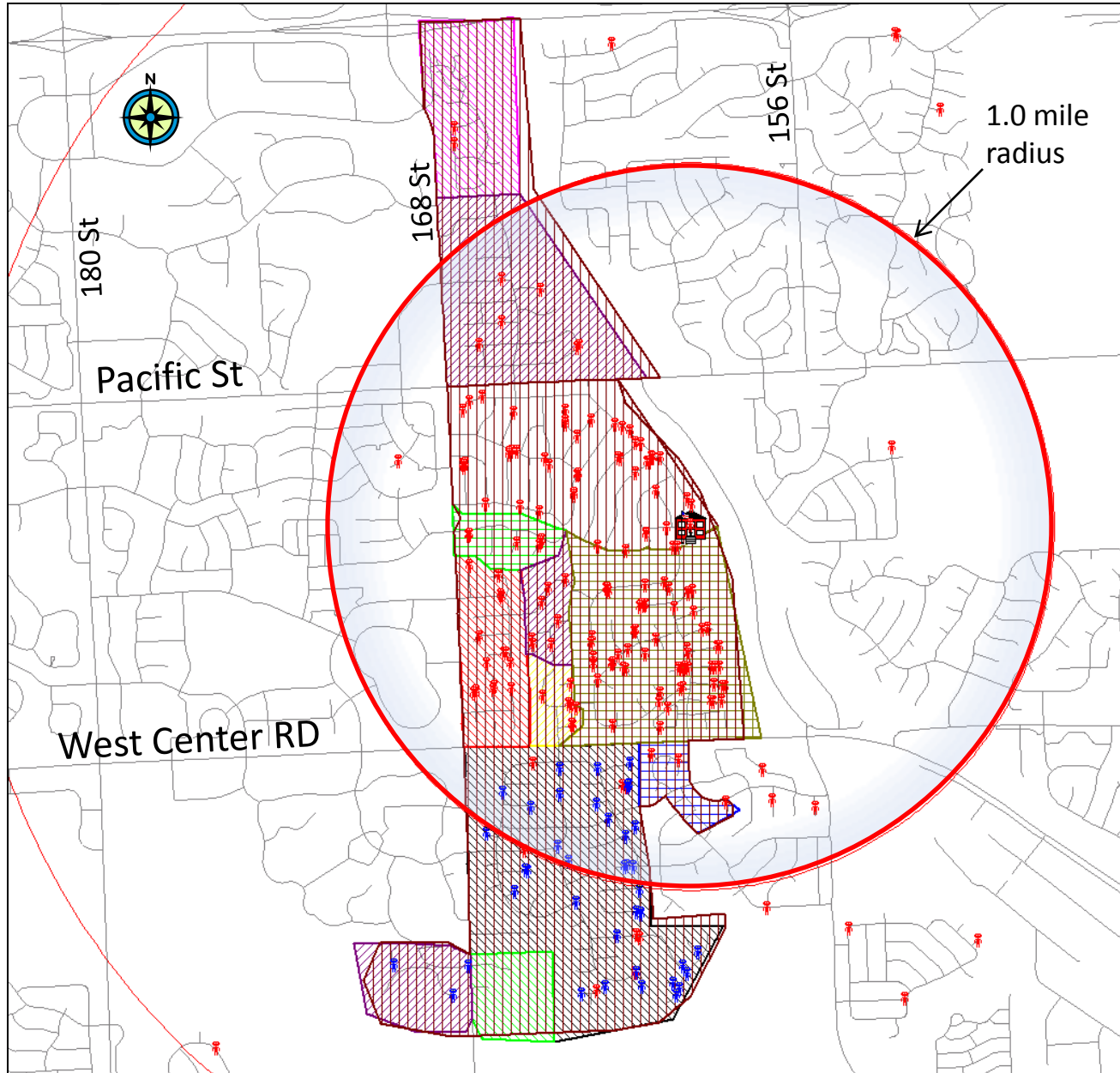
Montclair Elementary 1.0 Mile Radius Scenario

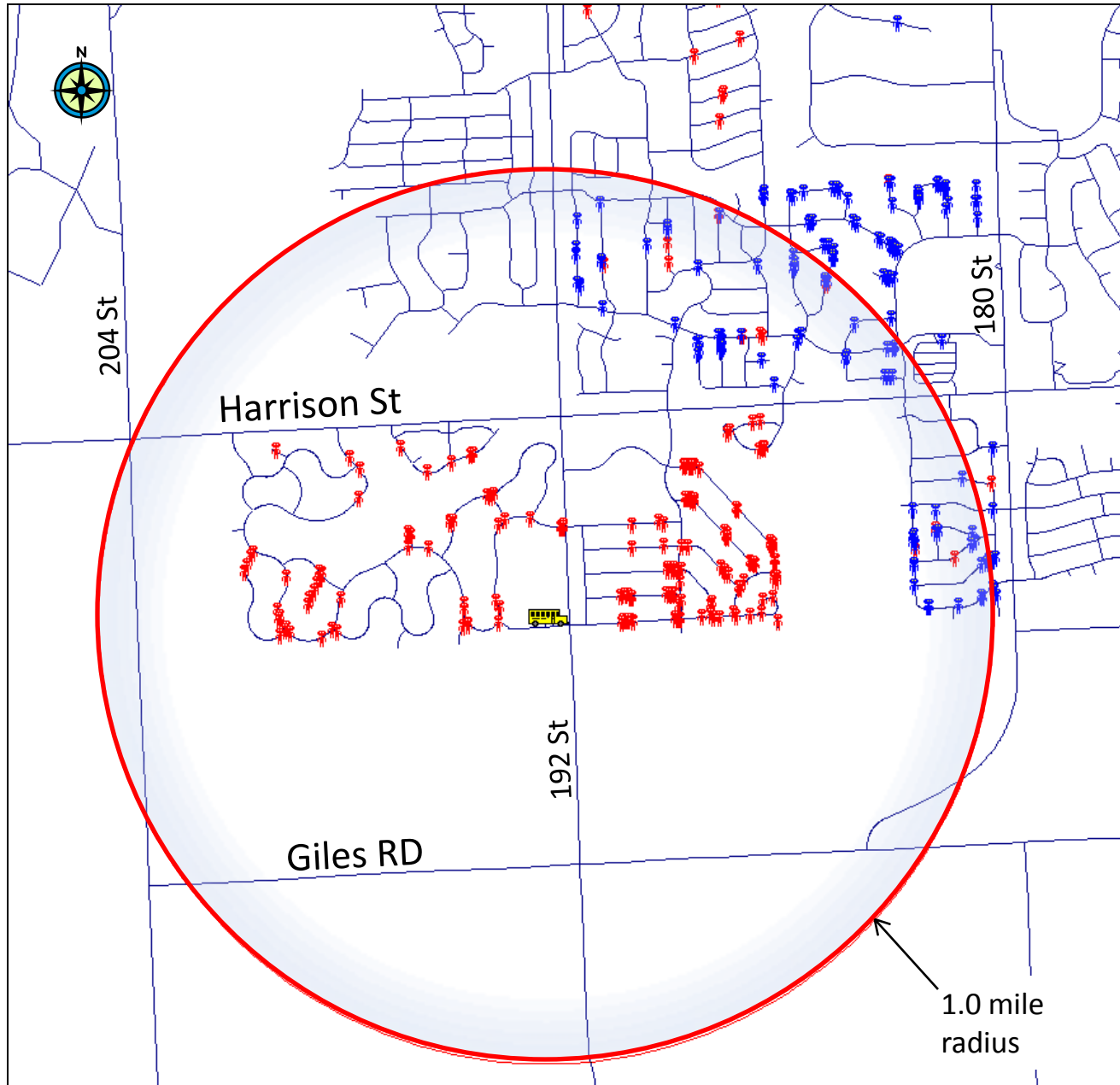
Reagan Elementary 1.0 Mile Radius Scenario




Reeder Elementary 1.0 Mile Radius Scenario

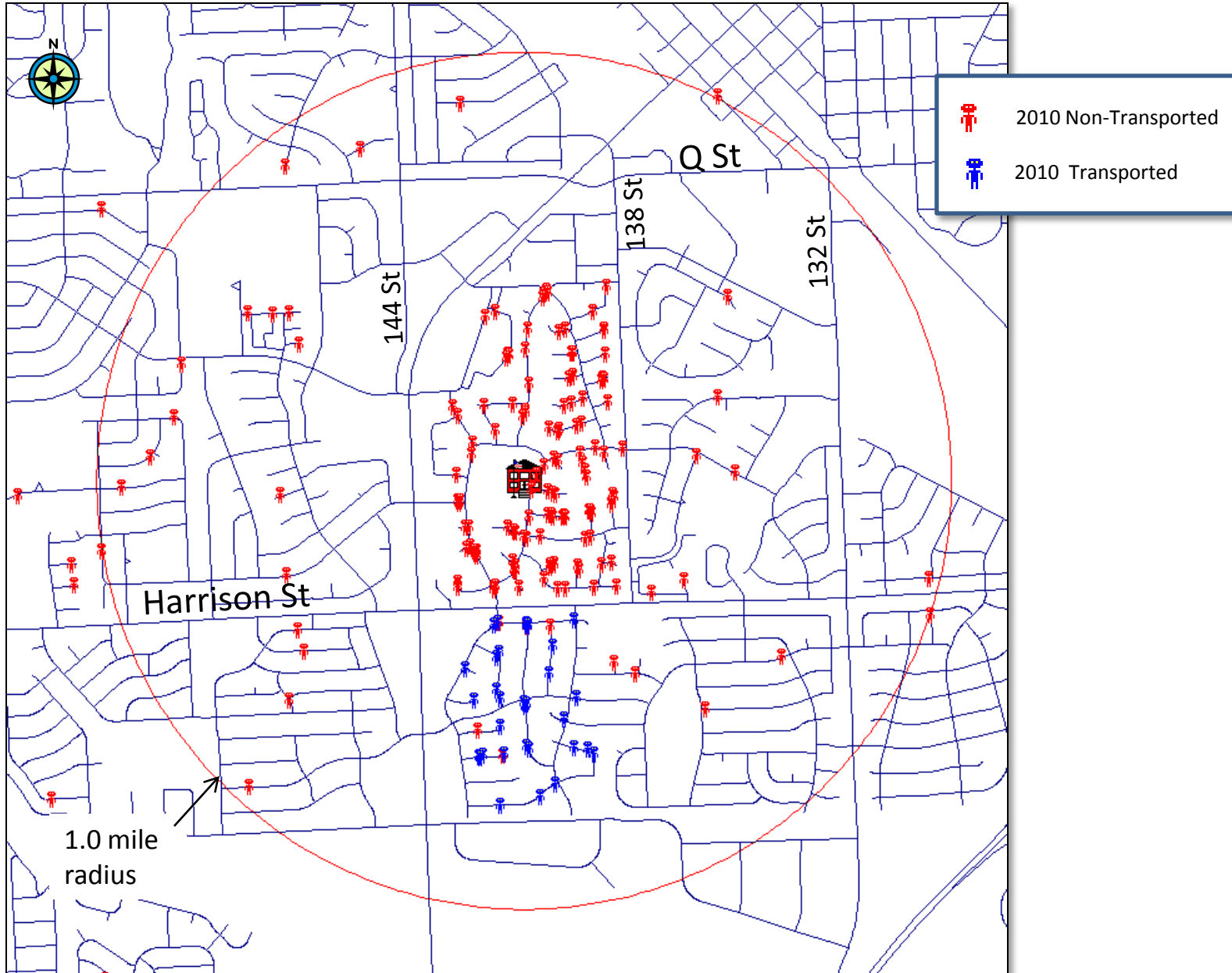

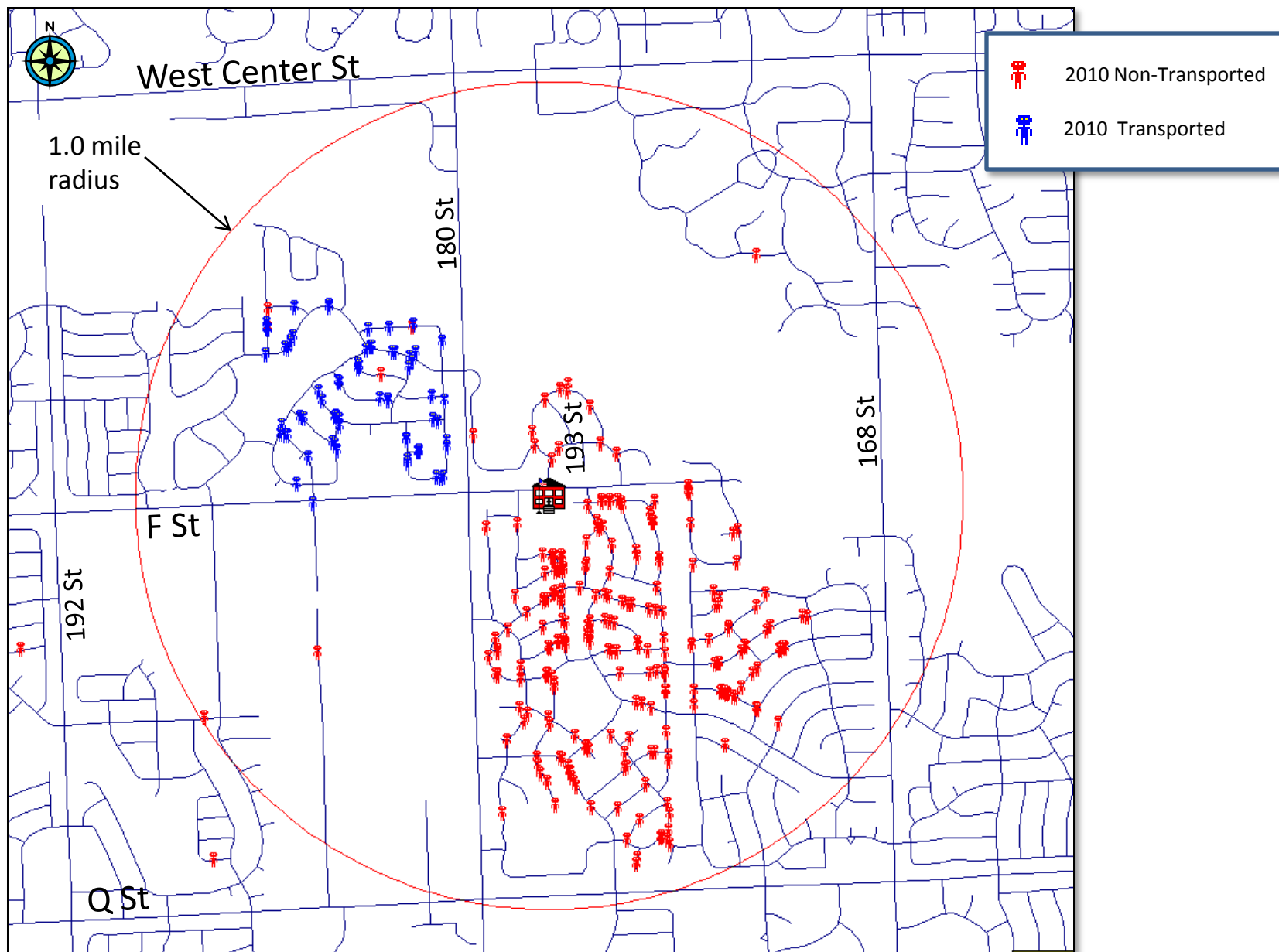
Rockwell Elementary 1.0 Mile Radius Scenario




Upchurch Elementary 1.0 Mile Radius Scenario

In order to ensure the highest possible standards of learning as well as the safety, health, and well-being of students, the District endorses a substance abuse policy which will aid students to abstain from the use of illegal drugs, intervene early when student use is detected, take corrective disciplinary action when necessary, and provide aftercare support for students.

As used in this Policy "drugs" shall include tobacco, alcohol, controlled substances as defined by state law, other mood or behavior-affecting substances which are not taken for medical purposes, and "look-alike" drugs.

I. PREVENTION

The District will adopt an age appropriate developmentally based drug, tobacco and alcohol education and prevention program, which includes in its scope the legal, social, and health consequences of drug, tobacco and alcohol use and provides information and techniques for the resistance of peer pressure for use of illicit drugs, tobacco or alcohol. The program shall be for all students in all grades of the schools operated and served by the District from the early childhood level through grade twelve (12).

The District will provide students with information and activities focused on preventing students from using drugs. Prevention activities will be centered around the instructional program, guidance and counseling, school climate, and family and community involvement.

II. INTERVENTION

The District shall make available to students, information about any drug, tobacco or alcohol counseling, or rehabilitation, or re-entry programs available to students.

The District shall establish and maintain an assistance program, through a team approach, to aid students who are chemically involved to successfully address their harmful involvement with chemicals and to continue in a school program.

III. DISCIPLINE

The District shall notify all students that the use of illicit drugs and the unlawful possession and use of tobacco and alcohol are wrong and harmful.

The rules established by the District shall clearly prohibit the unlawful possession and use or distribution of illicit drugs, tobacco and alcohol by students on school premises or as a part of any District activities and it shall be applicable to students in all of the schools in the District.

The District shall adopt disciplinary sanctions consistent with local, state and federal laws up to and including expulsion and referral for prosecution of students who violate the District's Standards of Student Conduct and a description of sanctions as described by the rules of the District including sanctions which require the completion of an appropriate rehabilitation program.

Students have the right to attend school in an environment free of drugs. Possession or use of tobacco, or possession, distribution or use of mood or behavior-affecting substances, alcohol, "look-a-likes" or drug paraphernalia, are prohibited on school grounds and at school-sponsored or school-related activities.

The consequences for possession, distribution, or use of drugs, abusive chemicals, mood altering drugs, unauthorized medication, or possession of drug-related paraphernalia will result in disciplinary action.

It is the policy of the District to take positive action through education, counseling, parental involvement, medical referral, and police referral where appropriate in the handling of incidents in the schools involving mood or behavior-affecting substances or alcohol.

School property and student property may be searched by school authorities in the interest of the maintenance of the health and safety of students and staff, the educational process, and to further school purposes.

IV. TREATMENT

The District will work cooperatively with community treatment personnel to facilitate the educational program of students in treatment.

V. COOPERATION PROGRAMS

The District will work cooperatively with the students, parents, guardians and community treatment personnel, to support aftercare and post-treatment plans for students returning from treatment.

VI. NOTICES

The District shall provide, distribute and shall give to all students, parents and guardians a copy of the Standards of Student Conduct and the statement of disciplinary sanctions enacted pursuant to this Policy and shall notify parents, guardians and students that compliance with the Standards of Student Conduct are mandatory for all the students in the District.



Certificated staff members are permitted to search students or students' possessions whenever there is a reasonable suspicion that the student has in the student's possession illegal, dangerous or any other object the possession of which is contrary to District **P**olicy, governing law, or when necessary for the welfare and well-being of students, the protection of District property, or the administration of District **P**olicy.

School lockers are the exclusive property of the District and may be opened or searched by certificated staff members without notice and without student consent.

Certificated staff members may seize and take custody of any objects or substances found during a search whenever such objects or substances are dangerous, contrary to law or school policy, or which may threaten the welfare of students, school personnel, or District property.

Students may be subjected to alcohol and other drug screening and testing technology pursuant to District Policy 5490 and Rule 5490.1.

The refusal of a student to consent or submit to a reasonable search and/or to surrender objects or substances found as a result of such search may be grounds for discipline.

5480.1

- I. General Statement. Certificated staff are authorized to conduct searches of a student's person, clothing, automobile, and property under a student's control including, but not limited to, purses, handbags, book bags, and briefcases. Certificated staff are also authorized to search student lockers. Certificated staff may take into custody any objects or substances that are illegal under federal or state law, or in violation of District Policy or Rule.

- II. Procedures for Non-District Property. The following procedures shall be followed with respect to searches and seizures under this Rule:
 - A. Reasonable Searches Permitted.
 1. Searches of non-District property are to be conducted at such times and places as are reasonable under the circumstances. The scope of the search shall likewise be reasonable.
 2. Searches can be made under this Rule at any place on District property, at a District event, or at a place under District control or sponsorship.
 - B. Person, Clothing, Automobiles, Personal Possessions, and Field Trips.
 1. A search of a student's person, clothing, automobile, personal property or possessions will only be made if there is reasonable cause to believe that the student has possession or control of an illegal object or substance that is illegal under federal or state law, or in violation of District Policy or Rule.
 2. A search of the person, clothing, automobile, personal property or possessions shall be made, whenever practicable, by two certificated staff members. When the search is made of the student's person, the search shall be conducted only by staff members of the same sex as the student being searched.
 3. Prior to leaving on a field trip or other off-campus activity sponsored or participated in by the District, the District may search any baggage, purses, or other containers in the possession of or under the control of a District student participating in the field trip or other off-campus activity. In addition, students may be subjected to alcohol and other drug screening and testing technology pursuant to District Policy 5490 and Rule 5490.1.

- III. District Property: Student Lockers. Student lockers are the exclusive property of the District and the District does not relinquish its control and ownership of lockers by making them available for students. Student lockers are provided to students only for student convenience, and this privilege may be withdrawn by the District at any time. The search and inspection of lockers and the taking into custody of objects or substances which are illegal or in violation of District Policy or Rule may be conducted at any time by certificated staff without notice and without student consent. Whenever practicable, two certificated staff members shall be present at the time locker searches are conducted.

- IV. Alcohol and other Drug Screening and Testing Technology. Students may be subjected to alcohol and other drug screening and testing technology pursuant to District Policy 5490 and Rule 5490.1.

- IV. Enforcement of this Rule. The refusal by a student to consent to or permit a search, or the refusal to surrender objects or substances which are illegal or violate District Policy or Rule, may subject such student to suspension, expulsion, or other disciplinary action.
- VI. Law Enforcement Authorities. Police officers and other law enforcement authorities shall be permitted to conduct a search of a student, the student's clothing, and the student's possessions and property on District property, at a District event, or at a place under District control whenever such officers or authorities:
- A. Possess a judicial order providing for the same;
 - B. Are otherwise authorized by law to make a search; or
 - C. Exigent circumstances exist.
 - D. Neither school officials nor staff members shall participate directly or indirectly in any search or actions relating thereto conducted by a police officer or law enforcement official.



The District will provide students with the opportunity to obtain an education and participate in school sponsored events and activities in a safe, healthy, and orderly environment free of alcohol and other drugs. Accordingly, the District may use alcohol and other drug screening and testing technology in order to ensure a safe environment at school and school sponsored events and activities.

The District may use such screening and testing technology with students before they may enter or exist a school sponsored event or activity, or prior to leaving on a field trip or other off-campus event or activity sponsored by the school.

When reasonable suspicion exists that a student has consumed or possesses alcohol or any other type of drug in violation of ~~e~~District policy, the student will be advised of the suspicion. As part of the investigation, ~~e~~District personnel may conduct field tests using technology available to them for the determination of whether or not a student has consumed is under the influence of, or in possession of alcohol or other drugs.

- I. **Procedures.** The following procedures govern the use of alcohol and other drug screening and testing technology by school administrators:
- A. The District may require all students to submit to alcohol screening before they may enter or exist a school sponsored event or activity, or prior to leaving on a field trip or other off-campus event or activity sponsored by the school. Such screening devices may be used to sample students' breath and any liquid-carrying containers. If such screening has positive results, then there shall be a second screening. If such second screening again has positive results, then there is a reasonable suspicion that the student has violated the District's alcohol policy and the student may be subjected to a field test.
 - ~~A.B.~~ Students suspected of violating the District's alcohol and other drugs policy may be subjected to a field test. Refusal to consent or submit to a field test may be grounds for discipline.
 - ~~B.C.~~ If ~~the student tests~~ a field test is positive for alcohol and/or other drugs, the positive results will be used as evidence in any disciplinary procedures against the student.
 - ~~C.D.~~ Results of field tests, refusal to consent or submit to a field test, and other evidence will be used by the administration in determining disciplinary action.
 - ~~D.E.~~ Student field test results for alcohol or other drugs will be made available to the student's parents or guardian. Screening results for students entering or existing school sponsored events or activities, or for students leaving on a field trip or other off-campus event, will not be shared with parents unless such results are positive.
 - ~~E.F.~~ ~~Regardless of the results of the field test, the~~ If a student screens or tests positive for alcohol or other drug use, they will be released from school or any school sponsored event or activity, only to the student's parents or guardian or an adult designated by the student's parents or guardian.
 - ~~F.G.~~ Staff, students, and parents will be notified annually of these procedures.
 - ~~G.H.~~ Field screening and testing devices will only be administered by school administrators appropriately trained as provided by the manufacturer of the field test devices.

H.I. Field screening and testing devices will be tested for accuracy and calibrated as necessary as provided by the manufacturer.

II. Annual Report to Board

A report summarizing all field screening and testing will be annually presented to the Board.

III. Definitions

A. Screening, field screening, and screening technology shall mean a passive alcohol detecting device which is a non-invasive high speed instrument which can be used as a sniffer for overt or covert alcohol detection, which is administered for students entering or existing school sponsored events or activities, or for students leaving on a field trip or other off-campus event or activity.

B. Testing, field testing, and testing technology shall mean an active alcohol or other drug detecting device which is administered when there is reasonable suspicion that a student has violated the District's alcohol or other drug policies.

Legislative Update

May 2, 2011

The Budget

The legislature will take up the budget from the Appropriations Committee on Monday and Tuesday. They are planning to work late on Tuesday to consider the proposed budget.

K-12 Funding

LB 235 passed and was presented to the Governor.. This bill reduces state aid from the previous year by about 6.5 million for Millard. The biggest reason for the decline is how instructional time is calculated. The rules for reporting instructional time have changed and are less favorable to MPS.

Commission of Industrial Relations

This bill is still being discussed. The rhetoric is intense. Many officials are pointing fingers. I have not heard that this bill is on the legislative schedule yet. Senator Lathrop has indicated that he is still open for good ideas to improve this bill.

Learning Community - Truancy

LB 463 changes provisions relating to truancy. This bill has been amended several times. We remain opposed to this bill although many of our objections have been addressed by several amendments. This bill as amended allows for medical exceptions from excessive absenteeism.

Learning Community – Student Records

LB 615 and 636 changes provisions relating to access to student records - These bills remain in committee and I haven't heard any word on their disposition.

LB 53 and 572 which deal with transportation are being held in committee. These bills are not likely to come out this year.

Duncan is asking lawmakers to amend FERPA to ensure that ED's implementation of the law "continues to protect the privacy of education records, as intended by Congress, while allowing for the effective use of data in statewide longitudinal data systems ... as envisioned in the America COMPETES Act and furthermore supported under the 2009 [stimulus]."

MEETING DATE: May 2, 2011

DEPARTMENT: Educational Services

TITLE AND BRIEF DESCRIPTION: Instructional Time Option

ACTION DESIRED: Discussion

BACKGROUND: The Board of Education’s comments at the April 18, 2011, meeting, indicated that there was a desire to increase instructional time to better address the District’s curriculum especially at the elementary level and to be more comparable to the instructional time provided in surrounding districts, retain the Professional Learning Community collaborative time (Elem. and H.S.), recapture the half day of school at the end of the year, and minimize the use of flexible scheduling at the high schools. This was to be done while minimizing added costs for transportation and other intangibles.

The attached spreadsheet estimates the state aid allowance for 2013-2014 that would be based upon the instructional time reported in October of 2012 for the 2011-2012 academic year. The estimate assumes that state parameters do not change and the following changes to District schedules are made for the 2011-2012 school year:

- Elementary student hours would be 8:30 – 3:45 thus adding 30 minutes/day on M, T, Th, F
- Wednesday Elementary early release would be at 2:15. This also adds 30 min to Elementary schedule on Wednesday
- Middle school student hours would be 7:45 – 3:00 adding 15 minutes/day
- High School hours would remain as is with the exception that the 20 hours of flex scheduling would be reduced from 20 to 10 hours
- Assumes the last day of school would be a full day
- Double routing of buses, with a 45 minute turnaround, is retained with no added costs for buses, SPED buses, or SPED vans

A final caveat is that if Millard gets more of the "state aid pot" through the Instructional Time Allowance, the amount to be distributed to all schools under other parts of the formula will need to be reduced. Since Millard receives over 8% of all state aid, the District should probably expect the Instructional Time Allowance impact to be only about 92% of the amount calculated -- the balance would be reductions in other parts of the formula.
