Availability of the agenda was communicated in advance notice and in the notice of the Board of Education of this meeting. All proceedings hereafter shown were taken while the convened meeting was open to the attendance of the public.

At 6:00 p.m. Dave Anderson called the meeting to order and announced the Public Meeting Act is posted on the wall and available for public inspection. Mr. Anderson asked everyone to say the Pledge of Allegiance

Roll call was taken and all members were present.

Superintendent's Comments:

- 1. No students or staff today because of President's Day.
- 2. The next Committee meeting will be next Monday, February 27, 2012 with a demonstration for student identification on buses. Also, a representative from the Wiese Corporation will be here to go over the post bond survey they conducted.
- 3. A week ago an estimate of State Aid was made and the District would receive a lesser amount than anticipated, but by lengthening the school day the District will see an increase in State Aid.

Board Comments:

Mike Pate said the Learning Community met last Thursday. Mr. Pate reported there was approval of funding for the various Elementary Learning Center for each Sub-Council. Millard is in Subcouncil #4 and will receive \$131,274.30.

Mr. Pate said there were a lot of congratulations going around among some Learning Community members due to the outcome of the State Supreme Court ruling on the common levy lawsuit. Mr. Pate still questions why the Learning Community was involved in the lawsuit in the first place.

Patrick Ricketts announced he will be at Millard West participating in their speech interviews. He also will be attending some of the elementary buildings to read.

Mr. Ricketts advised the board members he will not be at the March 12, 2012 Committee meeting.

Dave Anderson highlighted his trip to Washington, D. C. in his participation in the Federal Relation Network Conference. The members of the Board of Education met as a committee of the whole on Monday, February 27, 2012 at 6:00 p.m. at the Don Stroh Administration Center, 5606 South 147th Street. The topics included a demonstration for identification of bus students, and the post bond issue survey.

Also in attendance were Keith Lutz, Ken Fossen, and other administrators.

A representative from "Kids Ride the Bus" provided a demonstration regarding a unique system for identifying students as they get on and off buses or vans. The system identifies students via recognition of the iris of their eyes.

The cost of the system is substantial, but a local bank has offered to provide the funds for the system in exchange for including its logo and short message on the email notices that would be sent to parents whenever a student get on or off a bus or van. The district is not ready to make any decisions on this request.

Julie Smith, representative from Wiese Research Association, reviewed the survey and highlighted several reasons the community gave as to why they did or didn't vote for the bond issue. One of the major conclusions of the survey was that parent household who have children in school may have been underrepresented.

Even with the defeat of the bond issue the community was still positive by giving the District high marks in providing students with a quality education.

Board members agree there will be continued needs of the district and that there will be another bond issue, but they will continue to talk with the administration about when it will be the best time to bring another bond issue forward. The Board could always use their budget authority to provide additional funds, which they have not had to do in many years.

Board Officers 9111.1

The officers of the Board of Education shall be President, Vice-President, Secretary and Treasurer. The duties of the officers shall be:

President:

- 1. Preside at all regular and special meetings of the board.
- 2. Call special meetings of the Board when conditions required for special meetings have been met.
- 3. Be responsible for the orderly conduct of Board meetings.
- 4. Consult with the superintendent in planning agendas.
- 5. Represent the school district in all legal action.
- 6. Appoint all special committees, subject to the approval of the Board.
- 7. Sign any written contracts to which the school district may be a party.
- 8. Countersign all orders on the treasurer for claims allowed by the Board.
- 9. Countersign all orders on the county treasurer for the transfer of funds.
- 10. Participate in and vote on all actions of the Board.

Vice President:

- 1. Assume duties of the president in his/her absence.
- 2. Serve as the chairperson of the Board Committee of the Whole.
- 3. Organize the procedure for the Board to consider and issue the Superintendent's evaluation.
- 4. Perform any other duties as designated by the president.

Secretary:

- 1. Keep an accurate record of all meetings.
- 2. Send out legal notices of meetings.
- 3. Notify all persons elected as members of the Board.
- 4. Handle official correspondence of the School Board.
- 5. Make required reports to county and state officials.
- 6. Make the annual school census unless the board provides otherwise.

- 7. Draw and sign orders on the school district treasurer for the payment of authorized claims.
- 8. Draw and sign orders on the county treasurer transferring funds to the school district treasurer.
- 9. Maintain classified accounts of receipts and disbursements of the general and building funds, and of such other funds as the Board may require.
- 10. Compute withholding and social security taxes and retirement payments from salaries of teachers.
- 11. Act as custodian of all school district securities, documents, title papers, and other records of the Board.
- 12. Make available to the Superintendent all records and other information requested.
- 13. Publish the budget.
- 14. Keep a record of all written disclosures made by Board members pursuant to Board Policy 8250. The disclosure shall be kept on a ledger for a period of five years from the date of the Secretary's last day in office and kept separately from the Secretary's other records.
- Maintain all records required by the Accountability and Disclosure statutes of the State of Nebraska.

Treasurer:

- 1. Receive and be responsible for all school district money.
- 2. Place funds in depositories approved by the Board.
- 3. Disburse funds on orders signed by the president and secretary.



A total of three (3) bids were received for this work. **The low bid received was from Boone Bros. Roofing of Omaha, NE in the amount of \$360,000.00** This bid is above the original estimated construction cost of \$295,000.00. Legislative Update March 5, 2012

The Education Lobby was told by Senators Adams that it is unlikely that additional funds will be appropriated above the current 852 million. The 60 million in funding that is being talked about will likely be used for HHS. It also appears that the Governor's tax cut is unsustainable.

Bills of special interest

LB 446 introduced by Senator Adams was advanced. This bill restores ESU 18 and 19 for Lincoln and Omaha.

LB 996 introduced by Senator Wightman eliminates the option of dropping out at age 16 advanced on General File.

LB 933 introduced by Senator Ashford also appears on the General File agenda. This bill changes the rules for truancy.

I attached all of the bills we are tracking this session.

National News

Obama encourages states to stop cutting education funds

Some states have gone too far in cutting funds for education, President Barack Obama told governors attending a luncheon on Monday. While he acknowledged the states' financial difficulties, he encouraged them to stop cutting funds for education while continuing to enact reforms. "Nothing more clearly signals what you value as a state than the decisions you make about where to invest," Obama said. "Budgets are about choices, so today I'm calling on all of you: Invest more in education, invest more in our children and in our future."

Teacher-evaluation reform is problematic in some states:

About a dozen states have agreed to evaluate teachers in new ways in an effort to receive federal Race to the Top funds. However, some states have encountered problems with the evaluations, which include more classroom observations and emphasis on standardized testing. In Tennessee, principals say the evaluations are burdensome and, in some cases, do not reflect teachers' effectiveness. Delaware was unable to adopt a system based on student growth because of a lack of data, and Maryland has postponed a similar requirement.
