I. Good evening and welcome to the special meeting of the Millard Public Schools' Board of Education.

Section 79-2,132 of the Public Elementary and Secondary Student Fee Authorization Act requires that annually each school board hold a public hearing at a regular or special meeting for the purpose of addressing the proposed Student Fees Policy.

Prior to holding the public hearing the Act requires the Board of Education to review the amount of money collected from the students and the use of waivers pursuant to the Student Fees Policy for the prior year.

I would like to introduce the Board members who are present and will participate in this public hearing. They are:
As I understand, the Superintendent and the District's administration are recommending this Policy and th accompanying Rule for adoption and are available to answer questions from the Board members. I also understand that the administration is not going to make a presentation as such.

If there is a group of people who collectively would like to address the Board on this issue it might be helpful if you would sele one, two or three individuals to speak on behalf of the entire group. Of course, we will allow each of you who wish to address the Board on this subject to do so at this time.
The official Board action on the Policy and accompanying Rule will be acted on during the regular meetin which is scheduled to follow immediately after this public hearing.
I have received (numerous) () requests to address the Board and I will attempt to call you in the order in which the requests were turned in prior to the opening of this public hearing. After everyone has had an opportunity to address the Board on this issue, I will close the public hearing and adjourn the specimeeting. The first speaker that has requested an opportunity to address the Board is(continue calling the individuals until you have gone through all of them).
Thank you very much for your participation in this public hearing. You have offered valuable information and insight to all of the Board members as well as to the Superintendent and his administrative staff. If

there is no other person wishing to address the Board I will now close the public hearing.



The City of Omaha has submitted a written offer to purchase 8,751 sq. ft. of District property for the 144th Street and Blondo project in the amount of \$35,025.00. This computes to \$4.00 per sq. ft., and is based upon a Certified Appraisal Report submitted by John Moran, a certified appraiser. Additionally, the City of Omaha is requesting a Temporary Construction Easement on 73,346 sq. ft. to be used in conjunction with the construction project. The Temporary Construction Easement will cease to exist when the project is completed. The compensation for the easement is calculated based upon a two year easement, which exceeds the anticipated construction time. The temporary easement is calculated again, based on \$4.00 a sq. ft., and both purchase price and the easement appear to be consistent with the appraisal.

I've reviewed the Real Estate Purchase Agreement, the Temporary Construction Easement and the Warranty Deed submitted by the City of Omaha. Those agreements are acceptable and should be submitted to the Board at its next meeting for approval. The District currently has policy in place regarding foreign travel by students. Travel is not sponsored by the District if such travel occurs outside the United States or Canada. What the current policy does not address are trips not sponsored by the District if such travel is not foreign travel.

The new policy and its accompanying rule attempts to address all private travel when such travel is not foreign travel. The same guidelines in place for foreign travel are used in the new policy and its accompanying rule. The accompanying rule also states the guidelines for facility use by non-District organizations involved with private travel, as well as what announcements need to be made by these private organizations regarding District non-sponsorship during the meeting if that meeting takes place on District property.

ACTION DESIRED: Approval __X_

BACKGROUND:

OPTIONS/ALTERNATIVE CONSIDERATIONS: The current policy and rule, as stated above, does not truly address non-foreign private travel, yet there are trips that occur within the country that are not school-sponsored activities. Without this new policy and rule, District officials are left to interpret the District's position on such travel (and potential facility usage for such travel) without the support of current policy. Without the approval of this policy and rule, the District may continue to interpret how such travel will be addressed, but such interpretations are open to challenge. The approval of the new

policy and rule seeks to eliminate a challenge to the current District interpretations of such travel.

.RECOMMENDATIONS: It is recommended that the board policy 3923 and board rule 3923.1 be approved and that the Superintendent or designee be authorized and directed to execute the application of the policy and rule.

Pursuant to Policy 3923, the District does not sponsor nor endorse any student travel when such travel is not a school-sponsored and/or District-sponsored activity. In furtherance of such policy, the following rules are established:

- I. If a private (non-school-related) organization desires to arrange private travel, the organizational meetings for such travel should be held at non-school locations. However, if the private organization submits a request to use District facilities for such purposes, the request shall comply with the District's facility use policies and procedures and the organization shall be treated as a for-profit organization. Further, within the first ten minutes and again during the last ten minutes of any meeting held on District property, the individual in charge of such meeting shall inform those in attendance that the travel is in no way sponsored or endorsed by the District.
- II. No money for such private travel shall be deposited into a District account nor shall any expenses for such private travel be paid out of District funds.
- III. No private travel fundraising activities shall be conducted on District grounds or as part of any school activity.
- IV. No teacher, administrator, or other employee of the District shall, in his/her capacity as a District employee, promote private travel plans in his/her classroom, at school activities, or during any other time when the teacher is on duty with the District. Notwithstanding the foregoing, a teacher may, during the summer months when he/she is not under contract with the District, provide services to a private organization conducting private travel tours.


Millard Intervention Team Procedures

6660.1

- I. Millard Intervention Teams (MIT) will be composed of district staff members in each building who are trained to assist teachers in evaluating and implementing problem solving and intervention strategies which address learning and/or behavioral difficulties manifested by the academic, social, or emotional needs of students. In addition to serving as a support for general education staff, it will function as the general education pre referral process as required by Title 92, Nebraska Administrative Code, Chapter 51.
- II. MIT procedures at all grade levels will contain the following components:
 - A. Standardization of MIT procedures and documentation.
 - The MIT manual will provide standardized procedures and forms for documentation to be used across the District.
 - The District MIT Procedures Manual will be reviewed annually by a district committee
 composed of the Director of Pupil Services and representatives from the school
 psychologists, the special education administration, and the elementary and secondary
 principals groups.

B. MIT membership.

- 1. There will be a minimum of six (6) consultants per building
 - a. Each elementary school will have a minimum of one (1) MIT team leader.
 - b. Each middle school will have a minimum of three (3) MIT team leaders.
 - c. Each high school will have a minimum of four (4) MIT team leaders.
- 2. Training for MIT members.
 - a. Every MIT member will receive initial training in the MIT process.
 - b. All new MIT consultants and MIT leaders will receive initial training prior to taking cases. Follow up training will be provided within a year.
 - e. A one (1) day follow up training for MIT leaders and MIT consultants will occur every two (2) years.
 - d. Building administrators should participate in MIT training.
- 3. Evaluation of the MIT process.
 - a. The building principal or designee will be responsible for insuring that the MIT process is evaluated for consistency with district procedures and that MIT problem solving and intervention strategies assist teachers in the provision of general education so that students succeed in school.
 - b. The Director of Pupil Services will evaluate and monitor building MIT procedures to assure consistency of the MIT process across the District.



- e. New strategies are implemented as assigned and data are gathered. The MIT consultant monitors progress.
- 9. If acceptable progress is made, strategies are continued as needed. If the problem is solved, the case is terminated.
- 10. If acceptable progress is not made, the MIT is reconvened and the team brainstorms new strategies. The team will decide to implement the new strategies or if all viable options have been considered, the team will refer the student to the Multidisciplinary Team for evaluation.

BACKGROUND: Policy 6750 and Rule 6750.1 was last revised on July

11, 2011, after the public meeting on the District's

student fee policy.

Review of changes:

1. Elementary School Fees

a. Elementary schools may charge club members up to \$15 for the cost of screen-printed t-shirts indicating club membership. This fee is new.

- b. Elementary schools may charge choir students up to \$15 for the cost of screen-printed t-shirts. Wording revision to include the term "up to" in the phrasing. The phrasing provides some latitude to the elementary schools.
- Elementary lunch prices increase 10 cents from \$2.05 to \$2.15 (approved during March 19th board meeting).
- 2. Middle School Fees
 - All middle schools may charge a fee of up to \$50 for the Sixth Grade Outdoor Education Program. This is no longer limited to North Middle School.
 - b. Students pay \$45 to participate in interscholastic football. Cover the increased cost of equipment, including the replacement of numerous helmets, because the helmet inventory at all schools had an overabundance of helmets (10 years old or older) that can no longer be used by players. Companies that recondition helmets are no longer permitted to recondition those helmets older than 10 years; therefore, these helmets will not be NOCSAE (National Operating Committee for Standards in Athletic Equipment) approved.

- c. Middle school summer school: elimination of the \$60 fee for 3 instructional hours per day for four day statement as this statement is no longer applicable. Students pay \$95 for the Babysitting Basics course offered in summer school. Inclusion of the fee is new to the student fees policy.
- d. Middle school lunch prices increase 10 cents from \$2.25 to \$2.35 (approved during March 19th board meeting).
- 3. High School Fees
 - a. Students may be charged the cost of advanced placement tests.
 - b. Night School Fee of up to \$135 for credit recovery offering. Wording revision to include the term "up to" in the phrasing. Educational Services plans to charge the above fee for the 2012-2013 school year; however, the phrasing provides some latitude to the District.
 - c. Parking permit fee increased to \$35 rather than \$30. This increase will help to cover the security costs to patrol the parking lots.
 - d. High school lunch prices increase 10 cents from \$2.50 to \$2.60 and \$3.00 to \$3.10 (approved during March 19th board meeting)

Pursuant to Policy 6750 and Neb. Rev. Stat. §79-2,135 *et seq.*, the District may, and hereby does, require and collect fees or other funds from or on behalf of District students or require District students to furnish or provide, supplies, equipment, or attire as provided for herein below.

I. Elementary School Fees:

- A. Extracurricular Activities *
 - 1. Field Trips: Students pay a fee of up to \$20 (but not to exceed actual cost) per field trip.
 - 2. All Clubs: Students pay a fee of up to \$30 (but not to exceed actual cost of conducting the club activities) for membership and activities in each club.
 - 3. All Clubs: Students pay a fee of up to \$15 (but not to exceed actual cost) for screen-printed club t-shirt.
 - 4. School will not fund competition beyond the state level.
 - 5. Optional High Ability Learner (HAL) Field Trips: Students pay up to \$22 (but not to exceed actual cost) per trip.

 - 3. Summer Opportunities instruction for students no more than \$40 (per opportunity per student).
 - 4. Night School: Students pay up to \$135 for 5 credit semester offering for credit recovery courses only.

H. Breakfast/Lunch Programs *

- 1. Students pay for breakfast (i.e., current cost of breakfast \$1.80)
- 2. Students pay for lunch (i.e., current cost of lunch \$2.50-\$2.60, or \$3.00-\$3.10). A la carte selections vary in price.

- I. Parking Permit
 - 1. Students wishing to park in school lots during the school day must obtain a parking permit for \$30 \$35.
- J. Non-Specialized Attire
 - 1. PE: Students provide athletic shoes, socks, swimsuit, towel, elastic-waist shorts, t-shirt, and cold weather attire as needed.
 - 2. Lifeguarding: Students provide a CPR mouth guard.
- K. Musical Instruments (Optional, Non-Extracurricular) *
 - 1. Band & Strings: Students provide their own instruments.
- L. Music Items (Extracurricular) *
 - 1. Pep Band: Students provide a colored polo shirt (general description by band instructor).
 - 2. Band: Students may provide black or white leather shoes as generally described by band instructor.
- * The requirements marked with an asterisk (*) may be waived for students who qualify for free or and reduced-price lunches.

IV. Student Fee Fund:

- A. The District shall establish a Student Fee Fund, which shall be a separate fund not funded by tax revenue.
- B. All money collected from students pursuant to §79-2,127(1) (related to extracurricular activities), §79-2,127(3) (related to post secondary education costs), and §79-2,127(8) (related to summer school and night school) shall be deposited into the Student Fee Fund. Money expended from such fund shall be for the purposes for which it was collected from students.

V. Waiver of Fees and/or Requirements:

- A. Students who qualify for free or reduced-priced lunches under the USDA child nutrition programs may have fees and requirements waived for the following:
 - 1. §79-2,133(1) Related to participation in extracurricular activities.
 - 2. §79-2,133(1) Related to participation in extracurricular activities.
 - 3. 2. §79-2,131 Related to optional music courses and extracurricular music activities.
- B. Participating in a free-lunch program or a reduced-price lunch program shall not be required for students to qualify for a waiver of fees and/or requirements.
- C. Any qualified student desiring a waiver of fees and/or requirements shall complete and submit a Request for Waiver of Fees and/or Requirements form to the building principal (or his/her designee). Once the Request is processed, the principal (or his/her designee) shall inform the student as to whether the Request was approved or denied.

The District may require and collect fees or other funds from or on behalf of students or require students to furnish or provide materials, supplies, equipment, or attire consistent with the Public Elementary and Secondary Student Fee Authorization Act.

The Superintendent (or designee) shall promulgate the rules and/or procedures necessary for implementation of this policy. For purposes of Neb. Rev. Stat. § 79-2,133 and § 79-2,134, such rules and/or procedures, when adopted or approved, shall be incorporated in their entirety into this policy by this reference.

Annually, the school board shall hold a public hearing at a regular or special meeting of the Board on a proposed student fee policy, following a review of the amount of money collected from students pursuant to, and the use of waivers provided in, the student fee policy for the prior school year. The student fee policy shall be adopted by a majority vote of the school board and shall be published in the student handbook. The Board shall provide a copy of the student handbook to every student at no cost to the student.

7310.1

I. **Internet Technology Protection**. The District will provide for or contract for services that provide for the technology protection measure as required by law. The technology protection measure will filter sites containing visual depictions that are obscene, child pornography, and with respect to computer use by minors, harmful to minors.

II. Definitions.

- A. The term "technology protection measure" means a specific technology that blocks or filters Internet access to visual depictions that are:
 - 1. Obscene, as that term is defined in 18 U.S.C. § 1460;
 - 2. Child pornography, as that term is defined in 18 U.S.C. § 2256; or
 - 3. Harmful to minors.
- B. The term "harmful to minors" means any picture, image or graphic image file, or other visual depiction that:
 - 1. Taken as a whole and with respect to minors, appeals to a prurient interest in nudity, sex, or excretion;
 - 2. Depicts, describes, or represents, in a patently offensive way with respect to what is suitable for minors, an actual or simulated sexual act or sexual contact, actual or simulated normal or perverted sexual acts, or a lewd exhibition of the genitals; and
 - 3. Taken as a whole, lacks serious literary, artistic, political, or scientific values as to minors.
- C. The term "minor" means an individual who has not attained the age of 17.
- D. The term "sexual act" or "sexual contact" have the meanings given such terms in 18 U.S.C. § 2246.
- III. Monitoring Student Use. The building principal, principal's designee, or appropriate supervisor or teacher will be responsible for monitoring student usage of the Internet to ensure compliance with this and related District policies and rules.

III. Disabling Internet Filtering.

- A. Requests to disable the technology protection measure shall be made to the Executive Director for Technology who shall review said requests and Internet sites to ensure that the content is not a violation of the Children's Internet Protection Act.
- B. The Superintendent or designee is authorized to disable the technology protection measure so as to enable access for bona fide research or other lawful purposes.
- IV. Internet Safety and Prevention of Inappropriate Use. The District shall take all necessary and practical measures to prevent students from accessing inappropriate material online, to prevent unlawful and/or inappropriate use of the Internet and to promote safety and security while using the District's online network
 - A. The inappropriate use of the District's online network is prohibited.
 - Inappropriate use includes: (a) unauthorized access by minors to inappropriate matter on the Internet and World Wide Web; (b) unauthorized access, including so-called hacking and other unlawful activities; (c) the unauthorized disclosure, use, and dissemination of personal identification information regarding minors; and (d) any activity that is prohibited by State or Federal law and by District policies.

- B. To the extent practical, the District shall promote the safety and security of users of the District's online computer network when using electronic mail, chat rooms, and other forms of direct electronic communications.
- C. The building principal, principal's designee, or appropriate supervisor or teacher will be responsible for monitoring student usage of the Internet to ensure compliance with this and related District rules and policies.
- D. The District will provide age-appropriate training for students who use the District's online computer network. The training will be designed to promote the District's commitment to:
 - 1. The standards and acceptable use of Internet services as set forth in this and related District rules and policies; and
 - 2. Student safety with regard to safety on the Internet, appropriate behavior while online, on social networking sites and in chat rooms; and cyberbullying awareness and response.
- V. Privacy. While complying with the provisions of the Children's Internet Protection Act, all reasonable steps shall be taken to ensure that the use of the Internet shall not abridge the right of privacy of students or staff as provided by law including, but not limited to, the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA).

Background:

Millard South High School has participated in the Avenue Scholars Program provided by the Avenue Scholars Foundation since the 2010-2011 school year. Avenue Scholars currently provides a Talent Advisor for 20-25 selected juniors and 20-25 seniors at Millard South. Students meet with the Talent Advisor for one block on alternating days and earn 5 credits per semester. The goal of the program is to ensure careers for students with hope and need through education and supportive relationships. An Avenue Scholar Plan is developed for each student with a focus on academic, career, and financial plans. Students receive a wide range of academic, social, and financial planning services. Following high school, students enter MCC with the support of a College Talent Advisor.

The Avenue Scholars Foundation will expand opportunities for participating seniors for the 2012-2013 school year. The program will include the following opportunities for dual enrollment and career internships:

- Seniors will participate in the Avenue Scholars Program from 1:00-3:15 every afternoon.
 - Seniors will meet with the Talent Advisor for Avenue Scholars Class every Monday.
 - Two days per week seniors will travel to a Metropolitan Community College campus to complete a career specific course for dual credit.
 - Two days per week seniors will travel to a Metropolitan Community College campus to complete a Math or English course for dual credit **OR** travel to a work site to participate in an internship experience.
- The dual credit courses will be for elective credit only, not to be confused with Math elective credit or English elective credit.
- Dual enrollment instructors will be provided through an agreement between Metropolitan Community College and Avenue Scholars Foundation.
- Avenue Scholars Foundation will: continue to fund the dedicated FTE for the Talent Advisor; provide transportation to Metropolitan Community College and the work site; provide tuition for the dual enrollment credit.

Recommendations: Approve continued participation with Avenue Scholars Foundation including the adoption of the recommended changes to the program for seniors to earn additional elective credit for Avenue Scholars courses.

The Avenue Scholars Foundation is revising Year 2 of the Avenue Scholars Program for the 2012-2013 school year to provide dual enrollment and/or internship opportunities through Metropolitan Community College (MCC). Year 2 Avenue Scholars participants would attend Millard South High School in the morning and participate in the Avenue Scholars Program from 1:00-3:15 every afternoon.

Students would earn 25 elective credits per year by attending the Avenue Scholars seminar course every Monday and participating in dual enrollment and/or internship opportunities on an MCC campus and/or a worksite Tuesday-Friday afternoons. 


