Topics discussed were Instructional Time and Teacher Education Allowances. There is a hearing in October and Senator Sullivan encouraged to group to bring the same information back to that meeting. They will do so.
- 3. The Parent Advisory Council met this last week with record attendance. Boundary issues were discussed.
- 4. The Boundary Committee had their first meeting. The Committee is made up entirely of community people with five meetings scheduled. Dr. Lutz explained this is an Administrative Committee and the names of the members will not be made public.

Next year this meeting will be hosted by Nebraska and they have already started putting things together for that meeting.

Mike Kennedy said he is comfortable with the boundary issues that Dr. Lutz has set up. Mr. Kennedy also commented on the recent drug incidences and noted that this is happening in all Districts. He stated that Millard needs to stay informed and be aware of what is happening.

The schools may fundraise for student activities, school projects, and non-profit charitable organizations provided that such fundraising does not restrict or impair the educational program and is consistent with the standards, criteria, and limitations of $\underline{\bullet}\underline{D}$ istrict $\underline{\bullet}\underline{R}$ ules 1115.1(I), 1340.1(II), 3921.1 (I)-(IV), 6700.1 (II)(A)(5)(a)-(i), 7305.1 (III) and (IV) which are incorporated herein.

Individual schools may not commence any fundraising activities to raise funds for any "special project" as that term is defined in District Rule 3614.1 until the special project has been pre-approved by the Superintendent (or designee).

The District does not by this policy create or establish an open or public forum and reserves the sole and absolute right to determine the acceptable fundraising activities conducted district-wide.

The only authorized district-wide campaigns for solicitation of funds from employees and students will be the United Way campaign and the Millard Public Schools Foundation campaign.

Individual schools may choose to participate in fundraising activities to benefit the school, the student activities of the school, school projects, and non-profit charitable organizations, provided that such participation does not restrict or impair the educational program and is consistent with the standards, criteria, and limitations of dDistrict Rules 1115.1(I), 1340.1(II), 3921.1 (I)-(IV), 6700.1(II)(A)(5)(a)-(i), 7305.1 (III) and (IV) which are incorporated herein. Permission to conduct these fundraising activities must be approved by the school principal prior to the commencement of the fundraising activities, except for fundraising for "special projects," which cannot commence until the special project is pre-approved by the Superintendent (or designee).

Gifts, Grants and Bequests Gifts, Donations and Grants

3235

Gifts and Donations. The District welcomes gifts and donations from individuals and organizations that will enhance the District's educational programs or extracurricular activities, that are consistent with the terms of the District's policies and rules and are permitted under any applicable state and federal laws. The District reserves the right to refuse, cancel or terminate any gift or donation that is deemed to be not appropriate for or contributing to the District's educational mission and goals, that would adversely effect the District, or for any reason set forth in the District's policies and rules. Once accepted, all gifts and donations become the property of the District. The acceptance or rejection of any gift or donation shall not be considered an endorsement of any kind by the District.

The Office of the Superintendent (or designee) or building principals may accept on behalf of and for the school district any bequest or gift or donation of money or property which enhances the District's educational programs or extracurricular activities, for a purpose deemed to be suitable, and to utilize such money or property so designated,. Provided however, that building principals shall not solicit or accept any gifts and donations nor approve any fundraising activities for "special projects" as defined by District Rule 3614.1 without the prior approval of the Superintendent (or designee).

The Office of the Superintendent shall set up criteria to be met in the acceptance of gifts, and the procedure for examining and evaluating offers of gifts to the District.

All gifts shall be given to the school district as a whole. At the discretion of the Office of the Superintendent, the gift may be accepted and used in a particular school. However, such action shall be reported to the Board of Education.

Grants. The District also welcomes the opportunity to solicit and apply for any grants that would contribute to the District's educational mission and goals. Administrators at the District or building level may apply for grant funding for projects or programs that are consistent with objectives of the District's strategic plan or the building's site plan. Any application that would (1) impact the data network or storage of data, (2) impact the HVAC or electrical systems, (3) increase the time of custodial or grounds personnel, (4) require the renovation or alteration of any of the District's facilities, grounds, or equipment, or (5) impact any other aspect of the District's programs and/or services shall require the approval of the appropriate administrator(s) for the division(s) impacted. Additionally, if the proposed application would require any commitments (financial, personnel, or otherwise) from the District, or require the District to engage in a "special project" as that term is defined in District Rule 3614.1, the application shall require approval from the Superintendent (or his/her designee).

Individual schools may choose to participate in fundraising activities to benefit the school, the student activities of the school, school projects, and non-profit charitable organizations, provided that such fundraising does not restrict or impair the educational program and is consistent with the standards, criteria, and limitations of dDistrict Rules 1115.1(I), 1340.1(II), 3921.1 (I)-(IV), 6700.1(II)(A)(B)(5)(a)-(i), 7305.1 (III) and (IV) which are incorporated herein. Permission to conduct these fundraising activities must be approved by the school principal prior to the commencement of the fundraising activity, except any fundraising activities for "special projects" as that term is defined in District Rule 3614.1, must be pre-approved by the Superintendent (or designee).

Individual schools may not commence or participate in any fundraising activities to raise funds for any "special project" as that term is defined in District Rule 3614.1 until the special project and fundraising activity has been preapproved by the Superintendent (or designee). If a school, parent or community group wishes to engage in fundraising for a "special project," building principals shall follow the procedures for submitting special projects to the Superintendent (or designee) set forth in District Rule 3614.1.

The schools may advertise fundraising events in the Activities Express newspaper, if such assistance is determined by the Superintendent or designee to be consistent with the standards, criteria, and limitations of <u>dDistrict FRules</u> 1115.1(I), 1340.1(II), 3921.1 (I)-(IV), 6700.1(II)(A)(5)(a)-(i), 7305.1 (III) and (IV) which are incorporated herein. Promotional material for fundraising activities taking place in individual schools may be distributed to students by school staff members only. Promotional material for fundraising activities taking place in individual schools may be distributed in the individual school newsletters and newspapers.

The only authorized district-wide campaigns for solicitation of funds from employees and students will be the United Way campaign and the Millard Public Schools Foundation campaign.

Participation in fundraising activities by students and staff must be voluntary.

Schools may not use class time to participate in fundraising activities, unless the fundraising activity is within the context of a curricular program.

Schools may not use door-to-door solicitations in their fundraising activities.

Schools may not exclude any students from attending celebratory or recognition activities that occur as a result of fundraising activities.

Gifts, Grants and Bequests Gifts, Donations and Grants

3235.1

I. Gifts and Donations

A. Gifts and donations that satisfy the criteria below may be accepted by building principals although the Superintendent (or designee) has the ultimate authority with respect to any gift or donation. To be acceptable by a building principal, a gift or donation grant, or bequest must satisfy all of the following criteria:

- 1. <u>Shall Hh</u>ave a purpose consistent with those of the District;
- 2. <u>Shall Nnot bring undesirable or hidden costs to the District;</u>
- 3. <u>Shall not Pplace no restrictions on the school program;</u>
- 4. <u>Shall Nnot deter the best instructional practice of students;</u>
- 5. Shall Not imply endorsement of any business or product; and
- Shall Nnot be in conflict with any provision of the District rules or public law; and-
- 7. Shall not be intended for or to be used for a "special project" as defined in District Rule 3614.1 unless the special project has been previously approved by the Superintendent (or designee) as provided herein.
- B. Building principals are prohibited from conducting or approving any fundraising activities to solicit gifts or donations for a "special project" unless the special project has been approved by the Superintendent (or designee).
- C. Once accepted, any gift or donation shall become the property of the District. The Superintendent (or designee) shall have the right to cancel or terminate any gift or donation after acceptance if the Superintendent (or designee) determines that in his or her discretion, the gift or donation no longer serves the best interest of the District.
- D. The acceptance of any gift or donation shall not be construed as an endorsement of any particular individual, business enterprise or commercial product by the District. The District may, but is not required to publicly recognize donors as part of an acceptance of any gift or donation.

II. Grants.

- <u>A.</u> Approval for grant proposal/application submission must be obtained through the Grants Office at least eight weeks prior to the grant proposal/application deadline. If notification of a new grant opportunity is announced by the funding source allowing less than eight weeks, the administrator and/or teacher responsible for the proposed project or program may request a possible exception from the Grants Coordinator.
- <u>B.</u> To obtain approval, the administrator and/or teacher responsible for the proposed project or program must first submit an Executive Summary to the Grants office on the Major Grant Submission Approval form. The Grants Coordinator will work with the administrator and/or teacher in charge of the proposed project as necessary on obtaining the appropriate signature(s).
- C. If a grant proposal/application submission would provide funding for any "special project" as that term is defined in District Rule 3614.1, the special project must be pre-approved by the Superintendent (or designee) prior to submitting it to the Grants Office for review and approval.
- <u>D.</u> After submission approval has been obtained, the administrator and/or teacher of the proposed project must establish a committee to develop a project or program plan <u>consistent with all applicable District standards</u> and develop a draft narrative and budget, <u>which must be reviewed and approved by the Superintendent (or designee) if the submission involves a "special project."</u>

E. Grant funding shall be used by the school and/or the District only as specified in the proposal, funding award notification, and/or applicable state and federal law unless prior approval has been obtained in writing from the funding source.

F. The Superintendent (or designee) shall have the right to cancel or terminate any grant if the Superintendent (or designee) determines that in his or her discretion that the grant no longer serves the best interest of the District.

All gifts and bequests shall become school district property.

Political Activities - Public Office

4145.1

Personnel:

- I. District employees shall make it clear that their political <u>opinions</u>, statements and actions are his/hers as individuals activities represent their individual beliefs and that they do not represent the view <u>any opinions or viewpoints</u> of the District.
- II. Employees shall not engage in political activities or perform political responsibilities during school hours or when performing their duties as a district employee.
 - A. For purposes of this Rule, political activities includes seeking election or appointment to public office, campaigning for or against the nomination or election of a candidate or the qualification, passage, or defeat of a ballot question, or engaging in activity on behalf of a political party, elected official, candidate for office, or campaign committee.
- III. Employees engaged in political activities (such as seeking or holding public office) shall not use dDistrict resources, property, or funds at any time for their campaign or public office such political activities. Employees seeking or holding public office shall not seek advice or assistance on the for their campaign or public office activities from other dDistrict employees during school hours, or when performing their duties as a dDistrict employee. Employees shall not use the privileges gained through employment with the District to promote political candidates, public office holders, political issues, or partisan political activities.
- IV. Employees planning to seek an elected office or to accept a political appointment should be aware of all federal and state statutes regarding conflicts of interest and requirements for the position and shall be solely responsible for compliance with such statutes and requirements.
- V. Employees wishing to accept appointment to public office or seek election to public office which requires time away from or impact upon the performance of the employee's duties from the employee's District position shall abide by the following regulations:
 - A. A <u>written</u> notice of intent to accept an appointment or to announce and campaign for public office shall be submitted to the Board through the Superintendent's office. The notice shall disclose the office the employee is seeking and the time commitment required and whether the employee is requesting a leave of absence. Any requested leave related to an appointment to public office or to campaign for public office shall follow District Policies and Rules.
 - B. The notice of intent shall be submitted at least two calendar weeks prior to the next regular board meeting at which the employee desires consideration for his or her request for leave time. Leave time shall be without pay.
 - C. At the next regular board meeting following receipt of the notice, the Board will either approve or disapprove the request for leave without pay.
 - D. A specified period of leave without pay may be requested by the employee for active campaigning which will require activities on official working time.
 - E.B. In the event the employee wishes to accept re-appointment or to seek re-election to public office, he or she must re-submit his or her written intent and request for leave under the provision of this FRule.
- VI. Employees shall not interfere with the exercise of the political rights and responsibilities of students, colleagues, parents, school patrons, or school bBoard members, and shall protect the political rights of all individuals.

Distribution of Political Materials:

VII. Employees and employee groups are prohibited from distributing political materials intended to promote a person, candidate, public office holder, <u>ballot question</u> or political party to students, parents or other <u>dD</u>istrict employees on <u>dD</u>istrict property during working hours. All <u>dD</u>istrict communication systems including the District e-mail system may not be used to distribute <u>such</u> political materials. Informational material prepared by the District <u>that does not qualify, support or oppose a ballot question</u> may be distributed through all <u>dD</u>istrict communication systems including the District e-mail system, newsletters and other school publications to school employees and <u>the</u> community. <u>Public records demonstrating the consequences of the passage or defeat of a ballot question affecting the District may be posted on District websites.</u>

Classroom Discussion of Politics:

VIII. Political discussions in the classroom shall be allowed when the primary purpose is instructional as opposed to the advancement of a candidate, a public office holder, a ballot question, a political party, or a political belief. Open forums, bipartisan discussions, or classroom discussions by with candidates or public office holders will be deemed instructional, provided, however, that such discussions or presentations do not become partisan, one-sided, or result in the promotion of a particular political belief as opposed to providing the student with an opportunity to make up his or her own mind. Political materials relevant to and a part of the political discussion may be displayed when the purpose of the display is instructional.

Procedures - Contracts 3642

The District shall use the appropriate standard contract forms published by the American Institute of Architects (AIA) for its construction projects. Such forms may be amended in whole or in part upon recommendation of legal counsel.

Such contracts shall provide: (1) that the contractor provide a certificate of insurance with coverage determined appropriate by the District, (2) that no tobacco products may be used in <u>dDistrict</u> facilities or on grounds owned, leased, or operated by the District, and (3) that all workers will wear <u>dDistrict</u>-provided security badges as directed by the District.

Prior to the District issuing security badges to employees of contractors and any subcontractors who will be doing work at District facilities or on grounds owned, leased or operated by the District, such employees must receive security clearance, which includes passing a criminal background check conducted by a District-approved background check company. The contractor and/or subcontractor shall be responsible for compliance, which shall include submitting the names of employees to the background check company at least two weeks in advance of the anticipated start date of any work or project at a District facility or on grounds owned, leased or operated by the District, the payment of all costs for conducting the background check and permitting only those employees who receive proper security clearance to work at District facilities.

- I. All employees of contractors and/or subcontractors must receive proper security clearance prior to working at a District facility and to receive a District-issued security badge.
- II. At least two weeks prior to the anticipated start date of any work at a District facility or on grounds owned, leased or operated by the District, all contractors and subcontractors shall submit the names of all employees who will be working on the project to a District-approved background check company in order to receive proper security clearance for a District security badge. The District may, but is not required to, excuse the employees of any contractor or subcontractor from a criminal background check, if an employee has previously received security clearance to work at District facilities during a two-year period prior to the anticipated start date of the project. Any employee who does not pass the District's security requirements shall not receive a security badge and shall not be permitted to work at a District facility or on grounds owned, leased or operated by the District.
- III. To receive proper security clearance and be issued a District security badge, the criminal background check must show that the employee of a contractor or subcontractor has:
- 1. No felony convictions (where the court's jurisdiction is continuing or ended less than seven years ago) for a crime involving weapons, drugs, violence, theft, robbery, burglary, terroristic threats, or sexual offenses;
- 2. No felony charges pending court adjudication or disposition for a crime involving weapons, drugs, violence, theft, robbery, burglary, terroristic threats, or sexual offenses;
- 3. No misdemeanor convictions (where court jurisdiction is continuing or ended less than five years ago) for a crime involving weapons, drugs, violence, theft, robbery, burglary, terroristic threats, or sexual offenses;
- 4. No misdemeanor charges pending court adjudication or disposition for a crime involving weapons, drugs, violence, theft, robbery, burglary, terroristic threats, or sexual offenses.
- IV. Once the criminal background check is completed, the contractor and/or subcontractor is responsible for providing a list of employees who have passed the criminal background check to the District prior to the District issuing a Notice to Proceed with the project or prior to the District approving the commencement of any work at a District facility or on District property.
- V. After the commencement of the work or project at a District facility or on District property, all contractors and subcontractors shall self-report to the District and the District-approved background check company any subsequent criminal arrests and convictions, or any unknown prior criminal arrests or convictions that were not known prior commencement of the work or project, for any offense described in this rule, of an employee working at a District facility or on District property. Such obligation to self-report any subsequent criminal arrests or convictions is to ensure the safety and security of the Districts students, visitors, employees, property and equipment and such obligation shall continue throughout the term of the contractor's and/or subcontractor's contract.
- VI. The employees of a contractor and/or subcontractor shall comply with all District rules and policies. The District reserves the right to revoke a security badge and to remove any employee of a contractor or subcontractor from school property if an employee is not wearing the security badge, has violated any District policy or rule, is being disruptive to the educational environment, or is deemed to be a threat to the safety of the students or District employees in the District's sole discretion.
- VII. The District reserves the right to terminate the contract of any contractor or subcontractor if the contractors' or subcontractors' employees fail to wear security badges, are consistently disruptive while working on District property, or if such vendor or contractor refuses to abide by the District's directive to remove an employee from school property.

Contract Cancellation, Amendment, Renewal, Non-renewal

4165.2

Employment contracts between the school dDistrict and administrators or teachers shall be deemed renewed from year to year and shall be amended, canceled, not renewed or terminated as specified below.

L Renewal of Employment Contracts

- A. Each certificated staff member shall be notified of such an offer for renewal of his or her contract on or before April 15 of each year as provided by law. Upon receipt of such notice, each certificated staff member shall notify the District Human Resources Office, in writing, of the acceptance of the offer to continue the contract of employment for the ensuing school year. Failure to provide written acceptance of the offer of continued employment on or before May 1 the date designated shall be considered as a rejection of the offer of continued employment for the ensuing school year and shall operate as a request for resignation.
- B. Release from an employment contract after May 1 for the ensuing school year or during the school year may depend upon the availability of a suitable replacement and/or approval by the Board. Employees are discouraged from resigning during the school year due to the potential adverse effect upon students.

II. Cancellation or Amendment of Contracts During the School Year

- A. Contracts of any certificated employee, including probationary teachers, permanent (tenured) teachers, and administrators superintendents, associate or assistant superintendents, may be canceled or amended by a majority of the members of the school bBoard during the school year for any of the reasons provided by law which include:
 - F.1. Cancellation, termination, revocation or suspension of certification as provided by law. Revocation or suspension of a certificate by the State Board of Education of any employee whose duties require a certificate.
 - **H.**2. Breach of a material provision of the teacher's or administrator's contract.
 - **III.** 3. For any reasons set forth in the employment contract.
 - IV.4. Incompetency, neglect of duty, unprofessional conduct, insubordination, immorality or physical or mental incapacity.
- B. The procedure to be followed when it is determined that it is appropriate to consider cancellation or amendment of the contract during the school year is as follows:
 - **L**1. Notification, in writing, Written notice shall be given to the employee that the contract may be canceled and the alleged grounds for the cancellation.
 - <u>H.2.</u> Within seven <u>calendar</u> days of receipt of the notice, the certificated employee may make a written request in writing for a hearing to the secretary of the <u>School bB</u>oard, <u>sSuperintendent</u> or <u>sSuperintendent</u>'s designee, <u>that a hearing be held.</u>
 - HH.3. Prior to the hearing, if requested, a the notice of possible cancellation or amendment and the reasons therefore are deemed a confidential employment matter subject to sections Neb. Rev. Stat. §§ 79 539, 79 8, 109 and 84 1410 and 79 4156 to 79 Nebraska Law and shall not be disclosed to the public or news media.
 - **W.4.** During the pendency of a decision, a certificated employee may be suspended from duty with pay.

 \checkmark .5. A formal due process hearing as set forth hereafter in Section IV(C) of this Rule.

III. Probationary Certificated Employees, Probationary Period, Contract Amendment or Non-renewal

- A. During the first three years of <u>full-time</u> employment with the District or the part-time <u>equivalency</u> <u>equivalent</u>, a certificated employee shall be considered a probationary employee. His/her contract shall be deemed renewed and remain in full force and effect unless amended or not renewed as provided by law. The <u>school bB</u> oard may determine to amend or not renew the contract for any reason it deems sufficient as provided by law, but such non-renewal shall not be for constitutionally <u>or statutory</u> impermissible reasons. If the <u>school bB</u> oard, <u>sSuperintendent</u> or <u>sSuperintendent</u>'s designee determines it is appropriate to consider the amendment or non-renewal of a probationary certificated employee's contract for the ensuing school year, the following procedure shall be followed:
 - **L1.** Written notice shall be given to the employee on or before April 15 that the school bBoard will consider amendment or non-renewal of the employee's contract for the ensuing school year.
 - <u>II.2.</u> Upon request, the reasons for the proposed amendment or the non-renewal shall be provided in writing. and shall be sufficiently specific so with such clarity that the employee is able to prepare a response. The reasons set forth in the notice shall be employment related
 - <u>HI.3.</u> Within seven <u>calendar</u> days after receipt of the written notice, <u>the probationary employee may make a</u> written request <u>may be made for a hearing</u> to the secretary of the <u>School b-Board</u>, <u>sSuperintendent or sSuperintendent's designee.</u> <u>that a hearing before the school board be held.</u>
 - IV.4. Prior to the hearing, if requested, the notice of possible amendment or non-renewal and any reasons therefore shall be considered a confidential employment matter as provided in Sections Neb. Rev.Stat.raska law §§ 84 1410 and 79 539, 79 8, 109 and 84 1410 and shall not be disclosed to the public or news media.
 - V.5. An informal hearing as set forth in Section III (B) of this Rule shall be held before the School bBoard within thirty (30) days of the date of the request thereof unless otherwise agreed to by the parties in writing.
 - VI.6. If a hearing is not requested, the Board shall make a final determination. At any time prior to a hearing or final determination, the probationary employee may submit a letter of resignation which shall be accepted by the Board.
 - VII.7. Unless otherwise agreed upon by the parties, final action by the Board must be taken on or before May 15.
- <u>B.</u> The procedure for an informal hearing is as follows:
 - **L1.** Notice, in writing, of the date, time and place of hearing shall be given five (5) days prior to the date of the hearing.
 - H.2. Certificated The probationary employee or Superintendent, or his or her representative, shall have an opportunity to discuss and explain his or her position regarding continued employment, to present information, and to ask questions of those appearing on behalf of the District.
 - III. There should be an opportunity to present information and to ask questions of persons appearing on behalf of the school district.
 - IV.3. The hearing shall be held in closed session, if requested by the probationary employee and upon affirmative vote by a majority of the Board members present and voting.

- V.4. The formal action of the school bBoard to amend or non-renew shall be taken in open session. Formal action shall be taken by a roll call vote.
- VI. The Board may issue subpoenas and compel the attendance of witnesses for purposes of testifying at the hearing, for purposes of giving depositions, and for production of documents.

IV. Permanent Certificated Employees, Contract Amendment or Termination

- A. A certificated employee who has served_completed_the probationary period is a permanent certificated employee. His/her contract shall be deemed continuing and shall be renewed and remain in full force and effect unless amended or terminated as provided by law. The contract of a permanent certificated employee shall be amended or terminated for any of the following reasons by majority vote of the school bBoard:
 - **<u>I.1.</u>** Just cause as defined by law.
 - **H.2.** Reduction in force as provided by law or change of leave of absence policies.
 - HI.3. Failure upon written request of the school board or administrators <u>District</u> to accept employment for the ensuing <u>school</u> year within the time designated in the request, but not prior to March 15 of each year.
 - IV.4. Revocation, cancellation, suspension or termination of certification a certificate by the State Board of Education for an employee whose duties require a certificate.
- B. The procedure to be followed when it is determined that it is appropriate to consider the amendment for termination of the contract, is as follows:
 - <u>H.1.</u> <u>Written Nnotification that the contract may be amended or terminated, shall be provided on or before April 15., in writing.</u>
 - H.2. A hearing may be requested in writing to the secretary of the school bBoard, sSuperintendent or sSuperintendent's designee within seven calendar days of receipt of written notice.
 - HI.3. A formal hearing as set forth in Section IV (C) of this Rule shall be held before the sehool
 bBoard within thirty (30)-days of the date of the request thereof unless otherwise agreed to by the parties in writing.
 - IV.4. If no request is made, a final determination may be made by the Board.
 - V.5. The employee shall be advised at least five (5) days prior to the date of the hearing of the date, time and place, all of which shall be in writing.
 - VI.6. The parties may extend the time for hearings or final determination by mutual agreement in writing.
 - VII.7. Final action by the Board must be taken on or before May 15, unless such time is extended by mutual agreement in writing.
 - VIII.8. If a hearing is requested, it shall be a formal due process hearing as set forth in Section IV (C) of this Rule.
- <u>C.</u> The procedure for a formal due process hearing is as follows:
 - I. 1. At least five (5)-days prior to the hearing the employee shall be notified in writing of the basis for the proposed termination or amendment of the employee's contract.

- **II.-2.** Upon request, the employee shall be notified at least five (5) days prior to the hearing of witnesses to be called to testify against the employee.
- **III.3.** Upon request, the employee shall have the opportunity at least five (5) days prior to the hearing to examine any documents that will be presented at the hearing.
- IV.4. The employee has the right to be represented.
- ¥.-5. The employee shall have an opportunity to cross-examine all witnesses and to examine all documents.
- VI.6. The employee shall have an opportunity to present evidence material to the issues.
 - 7. Upon request of the employee or his or her representative an and the affirmative vote of a majority of the school bBoard members, the hearing shall be conducted in a closed session. Formal action of the Board shall be taken in open session. Formal action shall be taken by roll call vote.
 - 8. The decision to amend, cancel or non-renew of the school bBoard shall be by roll call vote of a majority of members at the meeting and based solely upon the evidence produced at the hearing. The majority shall reduce its findings and determinations to writing and provide a written copy to the employee.
 - 9. After the opportunity for a hearing has been provided, except in the case of a reduction in force, and just cause has been shown, sanctions other than termination or amendment may be imposed by the Board as agreed upon by the parties.
 - <u>10.</u> Past action may be considered in determining the appropriate action in future hearings, if such action was taken within the past five years.
 - 11. The Board shall have all the powers to subpoena and compel the attendance of witnesses for purposes of testimony testifying at the hearing and for the taking of depositions and to issue subpoenas for the production of documents.

Resignation Notification Incentive

4165.3

The District may offer a financial incentive for an employee planning on resigning or retiring to give advanced notification to the District.

Purpose of the Incentive

- <u>I.</u> The primary purpose of the incentive is to encourage eligible employees who are considering separation or retirement to accelerate their decision. Objectives include, but are not limited to, the following:
 - <u>A.</u> To offer a financial incentive for District employees to provide advanced notification to the District.
 - H. B. To provide the District the opportunity to make job offers to highly qualified candidates when the candidate pool is at its best.
 - III. C. To provide the District additional time to develop a quality candidate pool where one does not already exist.
 - W. D. To increase the District's competitiveness for highly qualified candidates in critical needs areas.

Program Eligibility Requirements and Provisions

All regular full-time and part-time exempt employees working 50% or more are eligible for the incentive. Employees on extended leave of absence without pay (4510.1) are eligible. The following conditions also apply:

Conditions

- I. A. Acceptance of an employee's application will be considered a voluntary resignation and termination of the employee's employment and contract rights with the District at the conclusion of the school year. Any future re-employment by the District is at the sole discretion of the District.
 - H. B. An eligible employee must complete the school year before separation commences.
 - **III.** C. An employee receiving long-term disability benefits is not eligible.
- W. D. An employee is not eligible for the incentive if his or her employment is terminated by the District.
- ¥. E. Payment will be made with the employee's final payroll.
 - VI. F. In the event the number of applications exceeds the expectations of the District, the District may deny all applications, provided, however, the applications were not first approved by the Board.

III. Application Process

- **I.** A. The District will notify employees of the availability of the incentive and the deadline for application.
- H. B. Employees will be given at least 30 days from the date of District notification to submit the Resignation Notification Incentive application. The written application must be submitted to the Human Resources Office Department on or before the date specified by the Superintendent.
- III.C. The request shall set forth that the employee resigns his or her position, effective at the end of the school year, provided, however, that it is subject to the acceptance and approval of the employee's request by the Superintendent and the Board.

IV.D. Employees applying for both the resignation notification incentive and voluntary separation may withdraw an approved application in the event the other application is denied.

Financial Incentive

IV. The District will offer an additional financial incentive of a \$500 stipend-for teachers, school nurses, exempt professional/technical employees, and administrators.

- B. Upon approval and adoption of the cutscore established for each assessment by the Board of Education, the assessment will be incorporated in the District curriculum.

II. Description of the Standard Setting Processes for National, State, and Local Assessments

- A. <u>Essential Learner Outcomes of College and Career Readiness (Locally-Developed Assessment):</u>

 Psychometrically accepted, standard methods shall be used for setting the cutscores on the assessments. All <u>locally-developed</u> assessments shall be re-examined and recalibrated as needed to ensure curriculum alignment as well as appropriateness of the <u>eutscore College and Career Ready metric.</u>
- B. ACT® Assessment: District locally defined College and Career Ready metric will be based on the most current ACT® College and Career Readiness Benchmarks as established for the corresponding year in which the assessment was taken.
- C. <u>ACT[®] Plan Assessment: District locally defined College and Career Ready metric will be based on the most current ACT[®] College and Career Readiness Benchmarks as established for the corresponding year in which the assessment was taken.</u>
- D. <u>Nebraska State Accountability (NeSA) Tests:</u> District locally defined College and Career Ready metric will be based on NeSA Scale Score ranges associated with Meets Expectation and Exceeds Expectation for the year in which the assessment was taken.

III. Effect of Student Performance

- A. When a student has successfully met the Essential Learner Outcomes <u>of College and Career</u>

 Readiness metric assessment cutscore for each outcome:
 - 1. A notation shall be made in the student's cumulative record. Such information will be communicated to parent(s)/guardian(s) in writing.
 - 2. Students who meet the <u>eutseores College and Career Readiness metric</u> for the high school Essential Learner Outcomes <u>of College and Career Readiness</u> assessments have met an essential criterion for graduating from the Millard Public Schools. Upon successful completion of the required number of credits <u>and Personal Learning Plan</u> as defined by Policy 6320 and Rule 6320.1, <u>the</u> students shall be eligible for a graduation diploma from the Millard Public Schools.
- B. If a student has not met the <u>eutseore</u> <u>College and Career Readiness metric</u> for a given Essential Learner Outcomes <u>of College and Career Readiness</u>, the following shall occur:
 - 1. An Individual Learning Plan (ILP) shall be designed by a team of qualified staff. Classroom teachers may refer students to the Building Problem Solving Team for assistance in evaluating and implementing problem solving and intervention strategies.
 - 1. The school/district will initiate a consistent and collaborative problem solving and intervention model called Response to Instruction and Intervention (RtI+I). Records of problem solving and intervention strategies are required.
 - 2. If after a retake of an <u>locally-developed</u> assessment, a student has not met the <u>eutscore</u> <u>College and Career Readiness metric</u> for a given Essential Learner Outcomes <u>of College and Career Readiness</u> assessment, the following shall occur:

- 1. The Individual Learning Plan the problem solving and intervention strategies will be reviewed by a qualified team and, if necessary, redesigned. Students shall be referred to Building Problem Solving Team for identification of needs if not previously referred.
- 2. The student shall be retested using the appropriate Essential Learner Outcomes of College and <u>Career Readiness locally-developed</u> assessment. Students shall be given the opportunity to be retested multiple times until the requisite <u>cutscore</u> <u>College and Career Readiness metric</u> is achieved. Students shall be given notice of the opportunities for retesting.
- 3. The student will be considered ineligible for a diploma from the Millard Public Schools until such time that the requisite eutscore College and Career Readiness metrics are achieved for high school Essential Learner Outcomes of College and Career Readiness assessments.
- 4. If the student is verified with a disability or has a 504 Accommodation Plan, then the IEP or 504 Team will reconvene to review the education plan and may consider lowering the eutscore College and Career Readiness metric requirement as part of the IEP or 504 Accommodation Plan. The student's parent(s) and/or guardian(s) shall be notified and shall also be advised of the effect of lowering the eutscore College and Career Readiness metric.
 - a. Applications for approval of lowered <u>eutseore</u> <u>College and Career Readiness metric</u> requirements may be submitted by the student's IEP or 504 Team to the Associate Superintendent of Educational Services for consideration and where appropriate, approval. The Associate Superintendent of Educational Services or designee shall decide and respond to all such requests.
 - b. If the lowered <u>cutscore</u> <u>College and Career Readiness metric</u> is approved, the student shall then be eligible to receive a graduation diploma with appropriate notation from the Millard Public Schools as provided in Rule 6320.1.

D. Procedures for high school students (graduation cohort 2016 & beyond)

 - (i) A notation shall be made in the student's cumulative record. Such information will be communicated to parent(s)/guardian(s) in writing.
 - (ii) <u>Students who meet the College and Career Readiness metric for the high school</u> <u>Essential Learner Outcomes of College and Career Readiness assessments have met an essential criterion for graduating from the Millard Public Schools. Upon</u>

- successful completion of the required number of credits and Personal Learning Plan as defined by Policy 6320 and Rule 6320.1, the students shall be eligible for a graduation diploma from the Millard Public Schools.

 - b. The building will review the student's results of Nebraska State Accountability (NeSA)

 Tests. If the student has successfully met the Essential Learner Outcomes of College and

 Career Readiness metric measured by Nebraska State Accountability (NeSA) Tests for each outcome, then
 - (i) A notation shall be made in the student's cumulative record. Such information will be communicated to parent(s)/guardian(s) in writing.
 - (ii) Students who meet the College and Career Readiness metric for the high school Essential Learner Outcomes of College and Career Readiness assessments have met an essential criterion for graduating from the Millard Public Schools. Upon successful completion of the required number of credits and Personal Learning Plan as defined by Policy 6320 and Rule 6320.1, the students shall be eligible for a graduation diploma from the Millard Public Schools.
- 3. <u>If after review of the student's results of Nebraska State Accountability (NeSA) Tests a student has not met the College and Career Readiness metric for the Essential Learner Outcomes of College and Career Readiness, the following shall occur:</u>
 - a. The problem solving and intervention strategies will be reviewed by a qualified team and, if necessary, redesigned. Students shall be referred to Building Problem Solving Team for identification of needs if not previously referred.
 - b. The building will review administer locally-developed Essential Learner Outcome assessments. If the student has successfully met the Essential Learner Outcomes of College and Career Readiness metric measured by locally-developed ELO assessments for each outcome, then
 - (i) A notation shall be made in the student's cumulative record. Such information will be communicated to parent(s)/guardian(s) in writing.
 - (ii) Students who meet the College and Career Readiness metric for the high school Essential Learner Outcomes of College and Career Readiness assessments have met an essential criterion for graduating from the Millard Public Schools. Upon successful completion of the required number of credits and Personal Learning Plan as defined by Policy 6320 and Rule 6320.1, the students shall be eligible for a graduation diploma from the Millard Public Schools.
 - (iii) The student shall be retested using the appropriate Essential Learner Outcomes of College and Career Readiness assessment. Students shall be given the opportunity to

be retested multiple times until the requisite College and Career Readiness metric is achieved. Students shall be given notice of the opportunities for retesting.

E. Demonstration of Proficiency

An additional opportunity is available to demonstrate student proficiency.

Graduation cohort 2014 & 2015: After two retest attempts to meet the established eutseore(s) College and Career Readiness metric(s) for the Essential Learner Outcomes of College and Career Readiness locally-developed assessments without achieving the eutseore College and Career Readiness metric, students, under building supervision, shall participate in a process, as provided in the District's Assessment Procedures, to demonstrate an appropriate level of proficiency in reading, writing, math, science or social studies. A student who successfully meets the standards and requirements of a Demonstration of Proficiency shall have met one of the essential criteria for graduating from the Millard Public Schools.

Graduation cohort 2016 & beyond: After review of ACT® Assessment, ACT® Plan Assessment, Nebraska State Accountability (NeSA) Tests, and one or more attempts on Essential Learner Outcome of College and Career Readiness locally-developed assessments without achieving the College and Career Readiness metric, students, under building supervision, shall participate in a process, as provided in the District's Assessment Procedures, to demonstrate an appropriate level of proficiency in reading, writing, math, science or social studies. A student who successfully meets the standards and requirements of a Demonstration of Proficiency shall have met one of the essential criteria for graduating from the Millard Public Schools.

IV. District Procedures for Opting Out of Recommended Reteaching

- A. Should a student participating in the Assessment Program not meet the requisite <u>cutscore</u> <u>College</u> <u>and Career Readiness metric</u> and be recommended for one of the <u>reteaching strategies</u> <u>problem</u> <u>solving and intervention strategies</u> listed above, the student's parent(s)/guardian(s) shall have the right to refuse placement of their student within the recommended strategy and either:
 - 1. Request an alternative teaching strategy; or

- 2. Refuse such placement at all.
- B. Such requests for an alternative teaching strategy shall be submitted in writing to the appropriate building principal. The building principal or designee shall respond within thirty (30) calendar days.

V. District Procedures for New Students

- A. <u>Graduation cohort 2014 & 2015</u>: At the high school level, incoming students shall take all high school assessments designated for that grade level or lower grades, regardless of their grade-level when they enter the District. They may participate in all remedial and supplemental learning activities provided by the District. Students are required to meet the established cutscore on each of the high school Essential Learner Outcome assessments.
- B. Graduation cohort 2016 & beyond: At the high school level, incoming students who enroll after district administration of ACT® Assessment and/or ACT® Plan Assessment may provide verified results of these assessments from prior administration. If verified results are not provided, students will take all high school locally-developed assessments designated per Essential Learner Outcome of College and Career Readiness.

VI. District Procedures for Students with Disabilities and ELL Students

Pursuant to the Assessment Accommodations section of the District's Assessment Procedures Manual, all students are to participate in the District's regular assessments and the only students to be excluded are those with a disability or language proficiency which has excluded the student from the norm sample of the standardized assessment, and/or those students who have not participated in the area and/or level of the curriculum that the assessment measures. Even for such students, they are not totally exempt and they must take an alternate assessment.

A. Procedures for Students with Disabilities

The preceding assessments may not be appropriate for some students with disabilities whose individualized education programs prescribe a different course of instruction and/or different requirements for graduation. The participation of students with disabilities, the provision of accommodations, and the provision of alternate assessments will be in accordance with the District's Assessment Procedures, which include the process for identifying appropriate assessment accommodations and alternate assessments.

B. Procedure for ELL Students

Students must meet all graduation requirements in the English language to earn a Millard Public Schools diploma. ELL students who have not demonstrated adequate English language proficiencies may postpone testing according to district procedures.

VII. Student's Right to Appeal

- A. Students who have not achieved the necessary high school <u>eutseore</u> <u>College and Career Readiness</u> <u>metrics</u> as approved by the Millard Board of Education may appeal the denial of a diploma.
- B. A student may appeal the denial of a diploma only on the grounds that the student's failure to achieve the required cutscore is due to:

- 1. The failure of the District to provide a reasonable accommodation that was previously requested by the student and denied by the District.
- 2. The failure of the District to provide an alternate assessment or approve a demonstration of proficiency, which had been previously requested by the student and denied by the District.

VIII. Procedures for Appeal

- A. Within seven (7) days after the receipt of the notice that the student failed to achieve the cutscore required for graduation from the Millard Public Schools, a written notice of appeal shall be served upon the Superintendent of the Millard Public Schools or his/her designee. Such appeal shall set forth all of the reasons for the appeal as provided herein and shall set forth the relief sought by the student, parent(s) or guardian(s). Such notice of appeal may also include any additional information, which is relevant to the appeal.
- B. Within seven (7) days after the receipt of the written notice of appeal and any supporting information relevant to the appeal, the Superintendent or designee shall consider and render a decision on the appeal based on whether the decision of the District was unreasonable. Such decision shall then be forwarded to the student's parent(s) and/or guardian(s) advising the student's parent(s) and/or guardian(s) of the basis for the Superintendent's decision and the reasons therefore.
- C. Within seven (7) days after the receipt of the written notification from the Superintendent or the Superintendent's designee, a written request may be made by the student, parent(s), or guardian(s) to the secretary of the Millard Board of Education or the Superintendent, or designee for a hearing before the Millard Board of Education, or a committee of the Board consisting of not less than two (2) members or more than three (3) members to be held on the issue whether the decision of the Superintendent or designee was unreasonable.
- D. Such hearing shall be held before the Millard Board of Education or committee within thirty (30) days of the date the request for hearing was received. If a hearing request is not received in a timely manner, the decision of the Superintendent or the Superintendent's designee shall be final.
- E. The student, parent(s) and/or guardian(s) shall be advised at least seven (7) days prior to the date of the hearing before the Board and such notification shall set forth the date, time, and place for the hearing before the Millard Board of Education or committee.
- F. The parties may, by mutual written agreement, extend the time for hearing or final determination.
- G. The student, parent(s), and/or guardian(s) shall have the right to be represented by legal counsel and shall have the opportunity to present such evidence that is material to the issue or issues stated in the appeal.
- H. The hearing shall be conducted in closed session and in accordance with the student privacy laws unless the student, parent(s), and/or guardian(s) shall request, in writing, that the hearing be held in open session. Any formal action of the Millard Board of Education or committee shall be taken in closed session unless such proceeding was requested by the student, parent(s), or guardian(s) to be held in open session.
- I. The decision of the Millard Board of Education or committee shall be by vote of a majority of the members of the Millard Board of Education and the Millard Board of Education or committee shall reduce its findings and decision to writing and provide the written findings and decision to the student, parent(s), and/or guardian(s) within ten (10) days of the hearing. When conducting such proceedings, the Millard Board of Education or committee shall be exercising a judicial function and deciding a dispute of adjudicative facts.

IX. Annual Review

This Rule shall be reviewed annually.



AYP Background

Signed into law the winter of 2002, Public Law 107-110, short title "No Child Left Behind Act of 2001," defined in the accountability section "...not later than 12 years after the end of 2001-2002 school year, all students in each group described... will meet or exceed the State's proficient level of academic achievement on the State's assessments." No later than 2005-06, it was required to measure achievement of students against the challenging State academic content and student academic achievement standards in math and reading. Science was to be required later.

Nebraska School-based, Teacher-led Assessment and Reporting System (STARS) integrated federal accountability requirements into the state accountability requirements. STARS required each public school district to adopt rigorous standards at or equal to state standards in reading, writing, math, science, social studies, and history. Beginning 2000-2001, districts assessed the content standards. Beginning 2005-2006, annual reporting of reading, math, and writing through STARS ensured compliance with NCLB. Local reading and math assessments continued to be used for STARS reporting through 2008-2009. Starting in 2009-2010, the state began phasing in NeSA tests, 09-10 NeSA-R and NeSA-AAR replaced local reading assessments, in 10-11 NeSA-M and NeSA-AAM replaced local math assessments, and in 11-12 NeSA-S and NeSA-AAS replaced local science assessments.

NePAS Background

The Nebraska Performance Accountability System (NePAS) was adopted in August 2012 by the State Board of Education pursuant to state law 79-760.06. NePAS is based on student scale scores within grades, buildings and districts. As stated on the Nebraska Department of Education website, "The system is intended to inform educators, parents, school board members, community members and policymakers about the learning progress of Nebraska schools and school districts."

What is Adequate Yearly Progress (AYP)?

As a condition of receiving federal funds under No Child Left Behind (NCLB), all states are required to define a process for identifying groups of students, schools, districts and the State as being in need of improvement. This requirement is called Adequate Yearly Progress or AYP. It is an annual status check of identified data elements to determine whether or not buildings and districts are meeting State AYP progress goals.

What will it mean if a school doesn't make AYP in No Child Left Behind?

AYP is but one indicator of a school or district's performance. It focuses solely on whether any group of students is meeting the expectations for growth. A school will be able to identify and address the instruction and services for that group of students not meeting the State goals for Adequate Yearly Progress. AYP does NOT mean a "failing school," but it does mean that schools must address the needs of the group of students or subject area that is not showing progress.

What happens to schools and districts that do not "make" AYP?

The NCLB consequences for not making AYP targets apply only to schools and districts that have a Title I program. The federal law prescribes graduated sanctions for Title I schools beginning with the second consecutive year of not making AYP. Title I schools must provide students with the option to transfer to another school in their district in the first year of "school improvement." In the second year, supplemental educational services (SES or tutoring) must be provided in addition to the option to transfer. Additional sanctions apply the longer a Title I school does not make Adequate Yearly Progress.

Will the definition of AYP stay the same until 2013-14?

The definition should stay the same, unless the law changes, but the interpretation of guidance and the manner of collecting data may change.

B-1. How is Adequate Yearly Progress determined?

To determine if a group of students, a school, district or the State has made AYP under NCLB, the following is applied:

- a) The performance of all students and groups of students, who have been enrolled in a district for a full academic year, must equal or exceed the State goal in Reading and Math, and
- b) At least 95% of all students must participate in the assessments, and
- c) The school and district must meet or demonstrate progress toward meeting a State goal for one other indicator for elementary and middle schools (NeSA-Writing, formerly referred to as the statewide writing assessments) and a State goal for a graduation rate at the high school.

Although AYP status is checked on an annual basis, a school must not meet the State goals for AYP in the same subject area and grade span for two consecutive years in order to be considered as being in need of improvement. A district must not meet the State goals for AYP in the same subject for two consecutive years in all grade levels present in the district to be considered as being in need of improvement. The subject area includes both the student performance and the participation rate.

How were the State Goals for AYP determined for student performance in Reading and Math?

NCLB specifies the method for establishing the starting points for the State goals for mastery level for each subject area and grade level. The starting point must be the higher of: a) the lowest performing subgroup in the State, or b) the percent of students at mastery level in the school that represents 20% of the enrollment when all the schools are ranked from highest to lowest in performance. (All schools are ranked by subject and grade level. Starting with the lowest performing school and moving up, enrollments were added together until 20 percent of the State's enrollment for that grade was captured.)

State AYP goals for Reading and Math for 2012-13 are listed below.

How is the graduation cohort determined?

A student is assigned an Expected Graduation Year when s/he enters grade nine for the first time. The Graduation Cohort Year (Year X) is based on the Expected Graduation Year (Student Expected Graduation Year) from students identified in grade levels 9, 10, 11, or 12 in NSSRS. If a student enters ninth grade for the first time in the spring or summer of a school year, the district must calculate the Expected Graduation Year from the fall of the school year (Year X-4). For example, the Expected Graduation Year is 2013 for a student promoted to grade level nine in the spring of the 2008-09 school year [(Year X-4) or 2013 - 4 = 2009]. In summary, the Graduation Cohort Year [(Year X) minus four equals the fall of the school year [(Year X-4)] when a student entered grade level nine for the first time.

In the Cohort Four-Year Graduation Rate the students in the Current Graduation Cohort receiving a regular high school are the only students in the numerator. The denominator consists of all students in the Current Graduation Cohort including students receiving a regular high school diploma, General Education Development (GED) diploma or credential, certificate of attendance, certificate of achievement, or an alternative award. Other students in the denominator include: dropouts; students who continue enrollment; or students who pass the age to which the district is required to provide a free, public education. How is graduation rate calculated?

For the 2011-12 school year, Nebraska began using the 5th year adjusted Cohort graduation rate. Beginning with the 2012-13 school year, the 6th year adjusted Cohort graduation rate will also be used. A student is assigned an Expected Graduation Year when he or she enters grade nine for the first time. The Graduation Cohort Year (Year X) is based on the Expected Graduation Year. The students who receive a regular high school diploma are the only students in the numerator. The denominator consists of all students in the cohort including students receiving a regular high school diploma, General Education Development diploma or credential (GED), certificate of attendance, certificate of achievement, or an alternative award. Other students in the denominator include: dropouts; students who continue enrollment; or students who pass the age to which the district is required to provide a free, public education.

The state's graduation goal is 90% and will be applied to every group and subgroup that has at least 30 students.

With the 4-year Cohort, if the 90% goal is not met, BUT the percentage of graduates increases by at least two percentage points from the previous 4-year Cohort, the goal for the Other Academic Indicator (OAI) will be met. For the 5-year Cohort, if the 90% goal is not met, BUT the percentage of graduates compared to the previous 5-year Cohort increases by three percentage points, then the graduation goal is met. For the 6-year Cohort, the Graduation Cohort must increase by 4 percentage points to be considered as meeting the goal. The 5-year Cohort will only be used if the 4-year did not meet by comparison. The 6-year Cohort will only be used if the 4-year and 5-year Cohort did not meet by comparison.

How are special education students assessed?

There are three levels of assessment practices for students with disabilities. The first level includes students with mild disabilities who participate in the general curriculum and activities on a daily basis. These students take the state and district-wide assessments in the same manner as their non-disabled peers without accommodations.

A second level includes students who take the state and district-wide assessments, but participate using individually determined accommodations. The accommodations must be consistent with the accommodations determined by the IEP team. An accommodation is a change in materials or procedures that enables students to participate in the curriculum and assessment in a way that allows their abilities and knowledge to be expressed and assessed. Some examples would be the use of large print, Braille, or extended time on assignments or assessments. Accommodations do not change what information is learned or measured, but are tools that enable a student to more readily access curricular content and to more easily demonstrate understanding of that content. Approved accommodations for NeSA are found in the "Nebraska State Accountability Approved Accommodations" document located at: http://www.education.ne.gov/Assessment/
The U. S. Department of Education has issued guidance regarding students with modified assessments and Adequate Yearly Progress (AYP). For reporting purposes for AYP, students who have taken modified assessments must be included in the count of students enrolled a full academic year if they have been. However, the results of modified assessments (including out-of-level tests) cannot be included in the count of proficient and the students cannot be considered to have

participated in the assessments. The NSSRS collects information on whether modified or out-of-level assessments are used for Math. There are no modified assessments in NeSA. See question B-8.

A third level of students with the most severe disabilities who participate in specialized functional curriculum and activities are assessed utilizing an alternate assessment, the NeSA-AAR and the NeSA-AAM.

What is the Safe Harbor provision of NCLB?

Any group that does not meet or exceed the State goal for student performance but has decreased the percentage of students performing below mastery, from the previous year, by at least 10% and meets the participation rate and the other academic indicator is considered to have made Adequate Yearly Progress. A 75% confidence interval will be used to ensure that the Safe Harbor decisions are made appropriately.

When a group has more than the minimum number (30) for Reading and Math results but has less than 30 for the Statewide Writing assessment, the writing results of the current and the previous year will be averaged and the participant counts will be aggregated.

For the 2012-13 AYP Calculations

- Due to technical issues during the administration of 2012-13 grade 8 NeSA Writing, results will NOT be used to calculate Writing performance so there will be no AYP decision for this "Other Academic Indicator" in 2012-13. AYP decisions will be based on Reading and Math performance and participation.
- This "Other Academic Indicator," (8th grade Writing) is used to determine eligibility for the Safe Harbor provision. For 2012-13, if the number of participants in 8th grade Writing is ≥ 30 in any group/subgroup, then that group/subgroup will be considered eligible for Safe Harbor.
 - O Participants on the NeSA Writing from 2011-12 & 2012-13 may be added together to determine Safe Harbor eligibility if participants are not \geq 30 in 2012-13 alone.

For the 2013-2014 AYP Calculations

- Continuous progress for AYP decisions for Grade 8Writing performance starts over in 2012-13 for ALL groups/subgroups.
- For 2013-14, the process for determining eligibility for Safe Harbor will be the same as in 2012-13 since there will not be Writing results available for those schools that need two years of participants to reach at least 30.

The U. S. Department of Education has determined that each subgroup must be eligible for Safe Harbor. Each subgroup must have met the participation rate and the performance for the other academic indicator as well as having decreased the percentage of students performing below mastery.

How will AYP status be reported to the public?

Federal Accountability is one component of the State of the Schools Report. Each school, district, and the state will have a Federal Accountability (AYP) status. A school or district will have one of the following AYP Status decisions:

MET – all AYP goals have been met;

NOT MET – not all AYP goals have been met but not in the same subject area and grade level for two consecutive years;

NOT MET, IMPROVEMENT SHOWN – since this decision is a comparison of two consecutive years of progress, this decision indicates that the school or district made AYP in the current year but not in the previous year

NEEDS IMPROVEMENT – a NOT MET for two consecutive years in the same subject area at all grade levels present.

The State of the Schools Report includes the list of schools and districts that did not make AYP for two or more consecutive years and have been identified as being in need of improvement.

Reflective of 2012-2013 performance, 11 schools are listed as being in need of improvement: Bryan Elementary (Title I), Disney Elementary, Holling Heights Elementary (Title I), Montclair Elementary, Andersen Middle School, Central Middle School, North Middle School, Russell Middle School, North High School, South High School, and West High School.

Definitions of Calculations

Ranking will be calculated such that the highest achieving school district receives the rank of 1. A separate rank will be calculated for each indicator with no overall rank calculated for a school district.

Additionally, tied scores within each indicator will be displayed with the same rank.

Example: If fifty school districts have a 99% graduation rate, each of the school districts will receive a rank of #1 and the district with the next lower percent will be ranked as #51.

Status is the average of the scale scores in each of four separate content areas: reading, mathematics, writing and science. Scores for all students tested in the grade range for the current year are included. Status can be thought of as a "snapshot" of the current achievement by grade, building, district and state.

Improvement (Cross-Sectional) will be calculated based on the difference between the average NeSA scale score for the current year and average scale score for the previous year in a grade. These are averages of different students each year. The average scale score is calculated as the mean of all scores from students tested in that year. Improvement is based on the performance of all students in the grades that are tested each year. The two groups of students being compared will be different because of the normal progression of students through the grades. For example, this year's fifth graders will be compared to last year's fifth graders and those fifth graders from last year will not be included in the current year's average because they have moved to the sixth grade.

Growth (Cohort) will be calculated in reading and mathematics by subtracting each student's scale score for the previous year from the current year scale score. The growth measure will be the average of these differences. Growth is based on tracking the scores of the same students from one year to the next. Only students who were tested in both years in the same school district will be included in the calculation, so if students move from one school district to another, they are not included in the calculations. For example, this year's fifth graders will be compared with last year's fourth graders. Note that the same scale score range is used at each grade level. Therefore a student who earns the same scale score two years in a row can be said to have achieved one year's growth. In other words, a student with a difference in scale score of zero has achieved the growth expected for a single year. Growth scores are not applicable to third grade or high school.

Participation will be calculated as percentage of enrolled students who take the NeSA assessment in grades tested. The target rate has been set at 95%.

Graduation Rate is calculated by following the students enrolled in grade 9 and calculating the percentage who have graduated after four and six years. The method to be used is the cohort four-year graduation rate defined by the US Department of Education. As data become available in 2013, the 6-year rate will be calculated as a two-year extension using the same method.

Business Rules that define the details of calculating all indicators will be taken from existing reports, e.g. State of the Schools or AYP, as appropriate, and include masking of groups with fewer than 10 to prevent issuance of personally identifiable information.

Background: The opportunity to participate in extended school offerings during the

summer was provided to Pre-K through Grade 12 students. Courses for English Language Learners at the beginning levels were offered for students in Kindergarten through 12th grade. Opportunities to continue to develop competency in reading, math, and writing skills

were offered to all students.

A total of 1,673 students participated in the MPS Summer School, which is an increase of 214 students from the previous year. These students had more than 2,151 course enrollments, an increase of 313

course enrollments from 2012.

Transportation was requested by 167 students who qualify for the free and reduced price meal program or are English Language Learners. This is an increase from 89 requests for transportation in 2012.

The 2013 Summer School Program end-of-year financial statements reflect a deficit of \$22,308.84 when not including the State Aid Summer School Allowance for FY13 of \$717,957. This contrasts with the 2012 deficit of \$3,031.93 and reflects an increase in transportation cost as well as an increase in the number of tuition waivers for courses taken by students who qualify for the free or reduced price meal program.

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



- 72 preschoolers experienced the four *Kindergarten Readiness* classes. Sixty-nine of these students, or 96%, are now in Kindergarten.
- 221 first through fifth grade students participated in reading and math reteaching courses. The average class size for these courses was 18.4 students.
- 127 first through fifth grade students learned more about science in *Perfecting Playdough, Lego Technics, Earth Habitats*, and *Gravity and Magnetism*.
- 34 students in second through fifth grade enrolled in the *HAL Math Pentathlon* courses.
- One course was offered for students with Limited English Proficiency at level one. Fortytwo students with Limited English Proficiency participated in the ELL course, Kindergarten Readiness or the Reading and Math Skills courses.

- The number of students receiving tuition waivers due to eligibility for the free and reduced priced lunch program increased from 194 to 204, accounting for 33% of the elementary summer school population.
- Transportation was requested by the families of 78 elementary students who qualify for the free and reduced price meal program or are English Language Learners. Three bus routes were established to accommodate these requests.

MIDDLE LEVEL SUMMER SCHOOL REPORT

The middle level summer program was offered at Millard North Middle School. Seventeen 3-week courses were offered. Babysitting Basics was the only mini-course offered and four sections were held. Middle school enrollment increased from 256 in 2012 to 313 in 2013.

- 123 incoming sixth grade students accounted for 205 course enrollments, or 47.5% of all middle school course enrollments.
- 112 students participated in reading and math reteaching courses. This is 26% of all course enrollments.

Points of Special Note:

- On average, 112 lunches were served each day at the high school. The daily average of meals served to students who qualify for free or reduced lunch was 54, or 48%.
- The average daily attendance rate was 96%.
- The number of courses taken which qualified for tuition waivers due to students qualifying for the free or reduced price lunch program was 306. This is 28% of all high school courses taken in 2013.
- 219 courses were taken for credit recovery which is 19.8% of all courses taken.
- Parents and teachers requested an English Language Learner course for level one or beginning middle school or high school students. The course was offered at the high school and 3 high school students participated.
- There were 14 summer graduates. Three juniors and 11 seniors were successful in completing the graduation requirements.
- 42 students completed the full year courses: Algebra (22), and Geometry (20), in the full-day, 5-week semester classes.
- 241 students participated in 8 sections of physical education. Two sections each of Lifetime Fitness, Sports Skills and Cross Training I were offered at Millard North High School. One section of Lifetime Fitness and one section of Sports Skills were offered at North Middle School. PE enrollments accounted for 22% of all high school course enrollments.
- Students received a grade of 3 or above on 91% of the courses taken in 2013.
- The number of courses failed in Summer School 2013 was 19, including 2 courses receiving a grade of Withdraw Fail. These failures are 1.7% of all courses taken.
- Transportation was requested by 50 high school students who qualify for the free and reduced priced lunch program or are English Language Learners. Four routes were established to meet the needs of high school and middle school students.
