





# **Drug-Free Workplace**

4173

The Millard School District will provide a drug-free workplace in accordance with the Drug-Free Workplace Act of 1988 and its implementing regulations.

The unlawful manufacture, distribution, dispensing, possession, or use of a controlled substance by a <u>dD</u>istrict employee on <u>dD</u>istrict property is prohibited. The District shall establish a drug-free awareness program and shall notify employees that they are required to abide by the drug-free workplace policy of the District, and that any violation of this <u>pP</u>olicy will result in action against such employee up to and including termination.

The District shall make a continuing good faith effort to maintain a drug-free workplace through implementation of its drug-free workplace policy.

# **Drug-Free Workplace**

4173.1

In order to implement the drug-free workplace policy of the District, the District shall implement the following rules:

- I. <u>The District shall Ppublish</u> a statement notifying employees that the unlawful manufacture, distribution, dispensing, possession, or use of a controlled substance is prohibited in the District's workplace and specifying the actions that will be taken against employees for violation of such prohibition;
- II. The District shall Eestablish a drug-free awareness program to inform employees about:
  - A. The dangers of drug abuse in the workplace;
  - B. The District's policy of maintaining a drug-free workplace;
  - C. Any available drug counseling, rehabilitation, and employee assistance programs; and
  - D. The penalties that may be imposed upon employees for drug abuse violations occurring in the workplace;
- III. The District shall Pprovide each employee with a copy of the statement set forth in paragraph one Section I.
- IV. <u>The District shall Nnotify</u> each employee in the statement required by <u>paragraph one Section I</u> that as a condition of employment, the employee will:
  - A. Abide by the terms of the statement; and
  - B. Notify the <u>employer District</u> of any criminal drug statute conviction for a violation occurring in the workplace no later than five (5) days after such conviction.
- V. <u>The District shall Nnotify</u> any federal or state agency for whom grant money is received within ten (10) days after receiving notice under <u>subparagraph four (b) Section IV(B)</u> from an <u>employer employee</u> or otherwise receiving actual notice of such conviction.
- VI. The District shall Ttake one of the following actions within thirty (30) days of receiving notice under subparagraph four (b) Section IV(B), with respect to any employee who is convicted:
  - A. Take appropriate personnel action against such an employee, up to and including termination; or
  - B. Require such employee to participate satisfactorily in <u>a drug</u> abuse assistance or rehabilitation program approved for such purposes by a federal, state, or local health, law enforcement, or other appropriate agency.

VII. Make a good faith effort to continue to maintain a drug-free workplace through implementation of the above rules.

## Drug-Free Workplace: Alcohol 4173.2

## General

I. \_\_\_\_\_The purpose of this Rule is to establish standards of conduct for employees as to the use and possession of alcohol while in the course of their employment or in the discharge of their duties and eliminate the unlawful use or distribution of alcohol on District property. The This Rule also applies to acts or any conduct which is illegal under federal, state, or local law. All Millard Public School District employees are covered by this Rule. Violation of this Rule shall result in disciplinary action up to and including termination of employment.

II. \_\_\_\_This Rule shall be administered in accordance with and subject to all applicable <u>dD</u>istrict grievance policies and procedures contained either in collective bargaining agreements or policies and rules of the District, and pursuant to all constitutional rights, state and federal, to which employees are entitled.

<u>III.</u> The name of any employee violating this Rule shall not be released to the public unless the employee requests an open hearing with the Board-of Education; provided, however, that the Superintendent may notify law enforcement authorities of any suspected violation of criminal statutes or ordinances.

#### **Definitions**

## IV. The following definitions shall apply for purposes of the Rule.

- I. A. Alcohol or alcoholic beverage shall mean any substance subject to the jurisdiction of the Nebraska Liquor Control Commission and those beverages and alcoholic liquors defined in Neb. Rev. Stat. section 53-103 (Supp. 1989) the Nebraska Liquor Control Act, Neb. Rev. Stat. § 53-103.
- H. B. Distribution shall mean any delivery, sale, transfer, handling, transmitting, administering, giving, or otherwise making available, alcohol or alcoholic beverages.
- III. C. "Intoxication" and/or "Under the influence" shall mean for the purposes of this policy Rule, that the employee is impaired and/or affected by an alcoholic substance, or the combination of a drug and alcohol, in any detectable manner. The symptoms of influence are not confined to those consistent with misbehavior or to obvious impairment of physical or mental ability such as slurred speech or difficulty in maintaining balance. A determination of influence can be established by professional opinion, a scientifically valid test and, in some cases, by a lay person's opinion.
- IV. D. Possession shall mean on the employee's person, in the employee's personal belongings, including any beverage containers, or under the employee's reasonable control. A dDistrict employee shall be deemed in possession of alcohol, if he or she has alcohol, on his or her person, or under his or her control.
- <del>V.</del> <u>E. Employee Assistance Program</u> (E.A.P.) <u>shall mean an</u> Employee Assistance Program provided by the <u>Millard Public Schools</u> <u>District</u> for the benefit of its employees.

## V. Prohibited Conduct The following conduct is prohibited:

- **L.** A. Reporting to work, performing job duties or conducting any <u>dD</u>istrict business while intoxicated or otherwise under the influence of alcohol is strictly prohibited and shall subject the District employee to immediate discipline actions as hereinafter provided. Conduct of an employee giving rise to <u>such a</u> reasonable suspicion <u>that the employee is under the influence</u> shall be reported to the employee's immediate supervisor <del>and documented in a report. or the Human Resources Department.</del>
- II. B. Using or distributing The possession, consumption, use or distribution of alcohol to minors, while on dDistrict property, while performing job duties, or while in the course of the employees' employment, at a dDistrict-sponsored student event, or at a student activity in which the District or other school districts participate, is strictly prohibited and shall subject the District employee to immediate discipline actions as hereinafter provided.

# VI. Procedure In cases of suspected violations of this Rule, the following actions and procedures shall be implemented.

A. Any employee suspected of being in violation of this Rule shall be interviewed by his or her immediate supervisor or administrator as soon as possible to determine whether the employee is in violation of this Rule or any provisions of this Rule. If necessary, the immediate supervisor or administrator will may summon a second supervisor or administrator to be present at the interview and to assist in the determination. If the supervisor or administrator determines that there is a reasonable suspicion that the employee may be in violation of any provision of this Rule, the supervisor or administrator shall immediately notify refer the employee to the Associate Assistant Superintendent for of Human Resources, or Designee, who shall interview the employee for further investigation. The Assistant Superintendent of Human Resources or designee may interview the suspected employee prior to the immediate supervisor if circumstances warrant.

- B. If, upon further investigation, the Associate Assistant Superintendent of Human Resources, or Ddesignee, has a reasonable suspicion that the employee has violated this Rule, he/she shall suspend the employee with pay from his or her duties and, if the employee is suspected of being under the influence of alcohol, may direct that the employee be tested for alcohol. Employees are required to submit to alcohol testing upon a reasonable suspicion of a violation of this Rule direction from the Assistant Superintendent of Human Resources or designee. The employee shall be advised of the required alcohol testing by the Associate Assistant Superintendent for of Human Resources, and be transported to a location for the administration of such required test.
- C. The results of the breath alcohol test may be used to provide the employee an opportunity to exonerate himself/herself. If the employee tests negative for alcohol, the employee will not be subject to disciplinary measures related to violation of the District's alcohol policy and shall be returned to duty. If a test of an employee's body fluid and/or breath positively detects the presence of alcohol, the results shall be confirmed in accordance with Neb. Rev. Stat. § 48-1903 prior to being used against an employee in any disciplinary or administrative action.
- D. Refusal to submit to a breath test may be offered in evidence in any grievance proceeding related to the disciplinary action for violation of the District's Alcohol Policy. An employee who refuses to undergo testing based upon reasonable suspicion that the employee is intoxicated and/or under the influence of alcohol may be subject to immediate disciplinary action, up to and including termination of employment, and such refusal may be offered in evidence in any grievance proceeding and/or termination hearing. The employee may be subject to further disciplinary action based on violations of other dDistrict policies and/or rules.

Breath test devices will only be administered by personnel who are properly trained.

Breath test devices will be tested for accuracy and calibrated as necessary pursuant to the Nebraska Department of Motor Vehicles guidelines.

- E. The Any employee who is subject to disciplinary action under this Rule shall, within a reasonable time, be provided a written statement setting forth the specific reasons for such disciplinary action specifically stating why the employee was suspended. The Notice written statement shall contain a written acknowledgment of receipt signed by the employee. Should the employee refuse to sign the acknowledgment of receipt, the refusal shall be so noted on the receipt by the supervisor or administrator.
- F. The Associate Assistant Superintendent/Designee of Human Resources or designee shall undertake such additional investigation as may be necessary, and shall provide the employee with a such written statement within a reasonable time specifically stating:
  - L. What additional action, other than being suspended from duties, if any, will be taken in accordance with this Rule; and
  - H. 2. The date and/or the conditions under which the employee may return to his or her regular duties, if applicable; and
  - III. 3. The employee's due process rights and time limits to appeal by reference to the District's Gegrievance procedures or, if applicable, the provision of the Collective Bbargaining Aagreement.

VII. At all times, each dDistrict employee shall make every reasonable effort to ensure that any employee who, in the course of their employment or in the discharge of duties, is under the influence of alcohol does not operate a motor vehicle. Should an employee refuse to cooperate and attempt to operate a motor vehicle when he/she cannot operate it safely or lawfully such employee is intoxicated and/or under the influence of alcohol, law enforcement officials shall be immediately notified and the employee may be subject to immediate disciplinary action, up to and including termination of employment.

#### **Violations & Penalties**

VIII. District employees who violate this Rule shall be subject to the following penalties.

## **Employees of the Millard Public Schools shall not:**

- L. A. Reporting to work under the influence of alcohol.
  - A. 1. First offense: Employee will be issued a written reprimand, a mandatory referral to E.A.P. will be subject to a minimum suspension of suspension of up to five (5) days without pay, and a maximum of termination of employment. Mandatory referral to E.A.P. in the event the employee is not terminated.
  - B. 2. Second offense: Employee will be issued a written reprimand and will be subject to a suspension without pay for a minimum of twenty days and a maximum of termination of employment. Mandatory referral to E.A.P. in the event the employee is not terminated.
  - C. 3. Third offense: Employee shall be terminated from employment.
- H. B. Use of alcohol or beverages containing alcohol while on dDistrict property, or while in the course of the employee's employment or in the discharge of his or her duties thereunder, at a dDistrict-sponsored student event, or at a student activity in which the District or other school districts participate.
  - A. 1. First offense: Employee will be issued a written reprimand, a mandatory referral to E.A.P. will be subject to a minimum suspension of suspension of up to five (5) days without pay, and a maximum of termination of employment. Mandatory referral to E.A.P. in the event the employee is not terminated.
  - B. 2. Second offense: Employee will be issued a written reprimand and be subject to a suspension without pay for a minimum of twenty days and a maximum of termination of employment. Mandatory referral to E.A.P. in the event the employee is not terminated.
  - C. 3. Third offense: Employee shall be terminated from employment.
- III. C. <u>Distribute Distribution of alcohol</u> or beverages containing alcohol to minors while on <u>dDistrict</u> property, at a <u>dDistrict</u>-sponsored student event, or at a student activity in which the District or other school districts participate.
  - A. 1. First offense: Employee shall be terminated from employment.
- IV. D. Refusal to undergo further testing based on a reasonable suspicion of intoxication and/or performance of duties under the influence of alcohol.
  - A. 1. First offense: Employee may be subject to a suspension without pay for a minimum of twenty days or terminated from employment.

## Non-Compliance with Employee Assistance Program

IX. Employees of the Millard School District shall fully comply with and successfully complete the treatment directed by the District's E.A.P. when the employee is being disciplined for violation of this Rule. Failure to do so shall result in the following discipline:

- 4. A. First offense: The penalty listed under second offense for whatever prohibited conduct caused the referral to the E.A.P. or termination of employment.
- II. B. Second offense: The penalty listed under third offense for whatever prohibited conduct caused the referral to the E.A.P. or termination of employment.

## **Alternative Disposition**

X. The District may impose a lesser or alternative disposition of the offense penalty than those provided for herein if the District deems that a lesser or alternative disposition is in the best interests of the District and the employee.

## **Criminal Convictions**

XI. If a dDistrict employee is convicted of any crime related to the distribution or otherwise making alcohol available to minors while off of school property or outside of a school function, the employee may be subject to disciplinary action. Such disciplinary action may include suspension without pay for up to twenty days or termination of employment. An employee convicted of any crime relating to the possession, use, or distribution of alcohol must notify the Associate Assistant Superintendent of Human Resources or designee no later than five days after the conviction. Failure to timely notify may be grounds for disciplinary action, up to and including termination of employment.

## **Education and Counseling**

XII A. Employees are encouraged to participate in the District's substance abuse awareness programs. Additionally, employees are encouraged to <u>voluntarily</u> utilize the E.A.P. services provided by the District in seeking assistance with alcohol problems. An employee's private use of these services on the employee's own initiative will not jeopardize job security or promotional opportunity. When such use is private and voluntary, no identifying report of any kind will be made by the E.A.P. to the District unless the employee so chooses.

B. Any employee who is disciplined for alcohol use and not terminated shall be referred to the District's E.A.P. for assessment, counseling, treatment and rehabilitation. This shall be a management referral and, as such, the employee shall be required to execute the necessary releases so that the E.A.P. may inform the District whether such employee is in compliance with directed treatment.

XIII. The District will provide training for its administrators and supervisors to recognize typical symptoms of alcohol use and abuse.

## Drug-Free Workplace: Drugs 4173.3

## General

- I. The purpose of this FRule is to establish standards of conduct for employees as to the use and possession of illegal drugs while in the course of their employment or in the discharge of their duties and eliminate the unlawful use or distribution of illegal drugs, or the misuse of prescription drugs, on District property. The This FRule also applies to acts or any conduct which is illegal under federal, state, or local law. All Millard Public School District employees are covered by this FRule. Violation of this FRule shall result in disciplinary action up to and including termination of employment.
  - <u>II.</u> This <u>FR</u>ule shall be administered in accordance with and subject to all applicable <u>dD</u>istrict grievance policies and procedures contained either in collective bargaining agreements or policies and rules of the District, and pursuant to all constitutional rights, state and federal, to which employees are entitled.
  - <u>III.</u> The name of any employee violating this  $\frac{1}{2}$ Rule shall not be released to the public unless the employee requests an open hearing with the Board—of Education; provided, however, that the Superintendent may notify law enforcement authorities of any suspected violation of criminal statutes or ordinances.

## **Definitions**

- IV. The following definitions shall apply for purposes of this Rule:
- L. A. Illegal drugs shall mean all controlled substances as defined in sections Neb. Rev. Stat. §§ 28-401, 28-404, 28-405 (Cum. Supp. 1988), and 28-419 (Reissue 1985) including but not limited to "uppers", "downers", barbiturates, marijuana, amphetamines, LSD, heroin, hashish, hallucinogenics, or cocaine, anabolic steroids and any metabolite or conjugated form thereof, and (2)-any other substance, except legal non-prescription drugs or legal beverages, which alters the mood or behavior and which is not taken for medical purposes under a prescription by a licensed physician.
- H. B. Distribution shall mean any delivery, sale, transfer, handling, transmitting, administering, giving, or otherwise making available, illegal drugs.
- III. C. Drug paraphernalia shall mean all equipment, products, and materials of any kind which are used, intended for use, or designed for use, in manufacturing, injecting, ingesting, inhaling, or otherwise introducing illegal drugs into the human body, as defined in Neb. Rev. Stat. § 28-439.
- IV. D. "Look-alike" drugs shall mean any substance which is believed to be or represented to others to be an illegal drug, or possessed with the belief or understanding that the substance is an illegal drug.
- V. E. "Intoxication" and/or "Under the influence" shall mean means for the purposes of this policy Rule that the employee is impaired and/or affected by a drug substance an illegal drug, or the combination of an illegal drug and alcohol, in any detectable manner. The symptoms of influence are not confined to those consistent with misbehavior or to obvious impairment of physical or mental ability such as slurred speech or difficulty in maintaining balance. A determination of influence can be established by professional opinion, a scientifically valid test or and, in some cases, by a lay person's opinion.
- VI. F. Possession shall mean on the employee's person, in the employee's personal belongings, or under the employee's reasonable control A dDistrict employee shall be deemed in possession of illegal drugs, look-alike drugs, or drug paraphernalia if he or she has illegal drugs, look-alike drugs, or drug paraphernalia on his or her person, or under his or her control.
- VII. G. Employee Assistance Program (E.A.P.) shall mean an Employee Assistance Program provided by the Millard Public Schools District for the benefit of its employees.

#### **Prohibited Conduct**

V. The following conduct is prohibited.

- I. A. Reporting to work, performing job duties or conducting any delistrict business while under the influence of any illegal drug is strictly prohibited and shall subject the District employee to immediate discipline actions as hereinafter provided. Conduct of an employee giving rise to such a reasonable suspicion that employee is under the influence shall be reported to the employee's immediate supervisor or Human Resources. and documented in a report.
- H. B. The possession, use or distribution of any illegal drug or "look-alike" drug while on District property, performing job duties, or while in the course of the employees' employment, at a District-sponsored student event, or at a student activity in which the District or other school districts participate, is strictly prohibited and shall subject the District employee to immediate discipline actions as hereinafter provided.

#### **Procedure**

VI. In cases of suspected violations of this Rule, the following actions and procedures shall be implemented.

A. Any employee suspected of being in violation of this Rule shall be interviewed by his or her immediate supervisor or administrator as soon as possible to determine whether the employee is in violation of this Rule or any provisions of this Rule. If necessary, the immediate supervisor or administrator will may summon a second supervisor or administrator to be present at the interview and to assist in the determination. If the supervisor or administrator determines that there is a reasonable suspicion that the employee may be in violation of any provision of this Rule, the supervisor or administrator shall immediately notify refer the employee to the Associate Assistant Superintendent for of Human Resources, or Delesignee, who shall interview the employee for further investigation. The Assistant Superintendent of Human Resources or designee may interview the suspected employee prior to the immediate supervisor if circumstances warrant.

- B. If upon further investigation, the Associate Assistant Superintendent of Human Resources; or Ddesignee, has a reasonable suspicion that the employee has violated this Rule, he/she shall immediately suspend the employee with pay from his or her duties, and if the employee is being suspected of being under the influence of illegal drugs, may direct that the employee be tested for illegal drugs. Employees are required to submit to drug testing upon a reasonable suspicion of a violation of this Rule directive from the Assistant Superintendent of Human Resources or designee. The employee shall be advised of the required drug testing by the Associate Assistant Superintendent for of Human Resources, or Ddesignee, and be transported to a location for the administration of such required test.
- <u>C.</u> The results of the drug test may be used to provide the employee an opportunity to exonerate himself/herself. If the employee tests negative for drugs, the employee will not be subject to disciplinary measures related to violation of the District's drug policy and shall be returned to duty. <u>If a test of an employee's body fluid and/or breath positively detects the presence of illegal drugs, the results shall be confirmed in accordance with Neb. Rev. Stat. § 48-1903 prior to being used against an employee in any disciplinary or administrative action.</u>
- <u>D.</u> Refusal to submit to a breath test may be offered in evidence in any grievance proceeding related to the disciplinary action for violation of the District's Alcohol Policy. An employee who refuses to undergo testing based upon reasonable suspicion that the employee is intoxicated and/or under the influence of illegal drugs may be subject to immediate disciplinary action, up to and including termination of employment, and such refusal may be offered in evidence in any grievance proceeding and/or termination hearing. The employee may be subject to further disciplinary action based on violations of other dDistrict policies and/or rules.
- E. The Any employee who is subject to disciplinary action under this Rule shall, within a reasonable time, be provided a written statement setting forth the reasons for such disciplinary action. specifically stating why the employee was suspended. The Notice written statement shall contain a written acknowledgment of receipt signed by the employee. Should the employee refuse to sign the acknowledgment of receipt, the refusal shall be so noted on the receipt by the supervisor or administrator.

- <u>F.</u> The <u>Associate Assistant Superintendent/Designee of Human Resources or designee</u> shall undertake such additional investigation as may be necessary, and shall provide the employee with <u>a such</u> written statement within a reasonable time specifically stating:
  - L. What additional action, other than being suspended from duties, if any, will be taken in accordance with this Rule; and
  - H. 2. The date and/or the conditions under which the employee may return to his or her regular duties, if applicable; and
  - III. 3. The employee's due process rights and time limits to appeal by reference to the District's Grievance procedures or, if applicable, the provision of the Collective Bbargaining Aagreement.
- <u>VII.</u> At all times, each <u>dD</u>istrict employee shall make every reasonable effort to ensure that any employee who, in the course of their employment or in the discharge of duties, is under the influence of <u>illegal</u> drugs, does not operate a motor vehicle. Should an employee refuse to cooperate and attempt to operate a motor vehicle when <u>he/she cannot operate it safely or lawfully such employee is under the influence of illegal drugs</u>, law enforcement officials shall be immediately notified <u>and the employee may be subject to immediate disciplinary action</u>, up to and including termination of employment.

## **Violations and Penalties**

## **Employees of the Millard Public Schools shall not:**

Use, possess, manufacture, or distribute Possession, use or distribution of illegal drugs, look-alike drugs or drug paraphernalia while on dDistrict property, or while in the course of the employee's employment or in the discharge of his or her duties thereunder, at a dDistrict-sponsored student event, or at a student activity in which the District or other school districts participate.
  - A. 1. First offense: Employee shall be terminated from employment.
- III. C. Refusal to undergo further testing based on a reasonable suspicion of intoxication and/or performance of duties under the influence of illegal drugs.
  - 1. First offense: Employee shall be terminated from employment.

## Non-Compliance with Employee Assistance Program

 $\underline{IX}$ . Employees of the Millard School District shall fully comply with and successfully complete the treatment directed by the District's E.A.P. when the employee is being disciplined for violation of this  $\underline{\mathfrak{r}}\underline{R}$ ule. Failure to do so shall result in termination of employment.

# **Alternative Disposition**

X. The District may impose a lesser or alternative disposition of the offense penalty than those provided for herein if the District deems that a lesser or alternative disposition is in the best interests of the District and the employee.

If a dDistrict employee is convicted of any crime relating to the possession, use, or distribution of any illegal drug while off of school property or outside of a school function, the employee may be suspended without pay for up to twenty days or his or her employment may be terminated. An employee convicted of violating a criminal drug statute must notify the Associate Assistant Superintendent of Human Resources or Ddesignee no later than five days after the conviction. Failure to timely notify is grounds for termination of employment.

## **Standards for Student Conduct**

5400.6

## I. Introduction.

- A. <u>Policy Statement</u>. Every District student has the right to an education. The following Standards have been instituted to ensure that right. Each student and their parents are required, on their own, to become familiar with these Standards, and to help provide an atmosphere conducive to learning.
- B. <u>Grounds for Exclusion</u>. A student may be excluded from school if there is reasonable evidence that the student has committed a prohibited act listed below while on school grounds, in a vehicle owned, leased, or contracted by a school being used for a school purpose or in a vehicle being driven for a school purpose by a school employee or by his or her designee, or at a school-sponsored activity or athletic event, or any other place where the governing law permits the District to discipline students for prohibited conduct.
- C. Exclusion from School Grounds and Activities. A student who is excluded from school for a suspension or expulsion shall not enter upon District property, or ride in a vehicle owned, leased, or contracted by the District being used for a school purpose or in a vehicle being driven for a school purpose by a school employee or his or her designee, or participate in or attend a school-sponsored activity or athletic event. Expelled students may enter upon District property for the sole purpose of attending alternative education at a location and time designated by the Director of Student Services.
- D. <u>Length of Expulsions</u>. Unless specified otherwise within these Standards, the expulsion of a student shall be for a period not to exceed the remainder of the semester in which it took effect unless the misconduct occurred within ten (10) school days prior to the end of the first semester, in which case the expulsion shall remain in effect through the second semester, or within ten (10) school days prior to the end of the second semester, in which case the expulsion shall remain in effect for summer school and the first semester of the following school year. Neb. Rev. Stat. §79-283(2).
- E. <u>Length of Suspension.</u> If there are insufficient school days in the first semester to complete the suspension period, the suspension period will be carried over to the second semester.
- F. <u>Contact of Legal Authorities</u>. The principal of a school or the principal's designee shall notify as soon as possible the appropriate law enforcement authorities, of the county or city in which the school is located, of any act of a student described in Neb. Rev. Stat. §79-267 which the principal or designee knows or suspects is a violation of the Nebraska Criminal Code. Neb. Rev. Stat. §79-293(1).
- G. <u>Sanction to be Followed</u>. If minimum and maximum sanctions are not specified for a specific prohibited act, the recommended sanction shall be imposed.
- H. <u>Expulsion as Sanction</u>. Expulsion is specified as a sanction for particular conduct because the District's Board of Education finds that the type of conduct for which expulsion is specified has the potential to seriously affect the health, safety, or welfare of the student, other students, staff members, or other persons, or to otherwise seriously interfere with the educational process. Neb. Rev. Stat. §79-262(1).
- I. <u>Students with Disabilities</u>. Disciplinary procedures for students who have disabilities as defined by the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act and Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973 shall be subject to the disciplinary procedures set forth in District Rules 5400.2 and 5400.3 and applicable federal and state law.
- J. <u>Mandatory Compliance</u>. Students and their parent(s) or guardian(s) are hereby notified that compliance with the District's Standards for Student Conduct is mandatory. It is the responsibility of all students and their parent(s) or guardian(s) to become familiar with these Standards.

## II. <u>Violations Against Persons</u>.

- A. <u>Use of Violence</u>. Use of violence, force, coercion, threat, intimidation or similar conduct in a manner that constitutes a substantial interference with school purposes.
  - 1. Pushing, Shoving or Related Non-injurious Behaviors.
    - a. <u>Maximum Sanction</u>. Short-term suspension. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of suspension.
  - 2. <u>Fighting</u>. Mutual attempt to physically harm another person through mutual combative physical contact.
    - a. <u>First Offense</u>.
      - (1) <u>Minimum Sanction</u>. Short-term suspension. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of suspension. There is no mandated minimum sanction below grade six (6).
      - (2) <u>Maximum Sanction</u>. Long-term suspension. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of suspension.
      - (3) <u>Mandatory Action</u>. Legal authorities shall be contacted. Neb. Rev. Stat. §§ 79-267(1) and 293.

## b. Additional Offenses.

- (1) <u>Minimum Sanction</u>. Long-term suspension. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of suspension.
- (2) <u>Maximum Sanction</u>. Expulsion. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of expulsion.
- (3) <u>Mandatory Action</u>. Legal authorities shall be contacted. Neb. Rev. Stat. §§79-267(1) and 293.
- 3. <u>Physical Assault.</u> Initiation of a violent act against another person through aggressive physical contact.
  - a. <u>Minimum Sanction</u>. Long-term suspension. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of suspension. There is no mandated minimum sanction below grade six (6).
  - b. <u>Maximum Sanction</u>. Expulsion. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of expulsion.
  - c. <u>Mandatory Action</u>. Legal authorities shall be contacted. Neb. Rev. Stat. §§79-267(1) and 293.
- B. <u>Physical Injury to District Employees, Volunteers, and Students.</u> Causing or attempting to cause personal injury to an employee, a school volunteer, or to any student. Personal injury caused by accident, self-defense, or other action undertaken on the reasonable belief that it was necessary to protect some other person shall not constitute a violation of this provision. Neb. Rev. Stat. §79-267(3).
  - 1. Sanctions on School Grounds.
    - a. <u>Minimum Sanction</u>. Long-term suspension. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of suspension.
    - b. <u>Maximum Sanction</u>. Expulsion. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of expulsion.

 Mandatory Action. Legal authorities shall be contacted. Neb. Rev. Stat. §§79-267(3) and 293.

## 2. <u>Sanctions off School Grounds.</u>

- a. <u>First Offense</u>. Citation during academic school year or the student admits that he or she has violated subsection II(B). Suspension from extracurricular activities for remainder of the semester or nineteen (19) school days, whichever is more.
- b. <u>Additional Offenses</u>. Suspension for extracurricular activities for one (1) year. Prior violations of subsection II(B) on or off school grounds will be included as previous offenses.

## C. <u>Use of Threats or Intimidation</u>.

- 1. <u>Use of Threats (Verbal and Written)</u>. All threats, including those alleged to be jokes, will always be taken seriously and are subject to the following disciplinary action.
  - a. <u>Level One Threat</u>. Using a threat as part of a common expression or in a context that the recipient does not feel threatened, frightened, or coerced (e.g., "Oh, I could just kill you for that" or "I will punch you in the nose").
    - (1) <u>Maximum Sanction</u>. Short-term suspension. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of suspension.
  - b. <u>Level Two Threat</u>. Using an expression or an implied or veiled threat with the intent of threatening, frightening, or coercing another and the recipient feels threatened, frightened, or coerced (e.g., "I will kill you").
    - (1) <u>Minimum Sanction</u>. Short-term suspension. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of suspension. There is no mandated minimum sanction below grade four (4).
    - (2) <u>Maximum Sanction</u>. Long-term suspension. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of suspension.
    - (3) <u>Mandatory Action</u>. Legal authorities shall be contacted. Neb. Rev. Stat. §§79-267(1) and 293.
  - c. <u>Level Three Threat</u>. Threatening to kill or injure another person or threatening to damage property with potential for personal injury, without possessing a weapon or other object that could kill or injure the threatened or intimidated person, and the student describes how it will be done, including any threats that concern dangerous chemical substances, biochemical attacks, or bioterrorism.
    - (1) <u>Minimum Sanction</u>. Long-term suspension. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of suspension. There is no mandated minimum sanction below grade four (4).
    - (2) <u>Maximum Sanction</u>. Expulsion. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of expulsion.
    - (3) <u>Mandatory Action</u>. Legal authorities shall be contacted. Neb. Rev. Stat. §§79-267(1) and 293.
  - d. <u>Threatening with an Object</u>. Threatening with an object which looks like a weapon or an object that could be used to injure someone. To qualify as a lookalike weapon, the object must closely resemble a real weapon in size, shape, and color even when examined up close.
    - (1) <u>Minimum Sanction</u>. Long-term suspension. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of suspension.

- (2) <u>Maximum Sanction</u>. Expulsion. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of expulsion.
- (3) <u>Mandatory Action</u>. Legal authorities shall be contacted. Neb. Rev. Stat. §§79-267(1) and 293.
- 2. <u>Bomb Threat (Verbal or Written)</u>. Threatening to use any type of explosive or incendiary device generally referred to as a bomb to injure a person(s) or destroy property.
  - a. <u>Minimum Sanction</u>. Mandatory expulsion. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of expulsion.
  - b. <u>Mandatory Action</u>. Legal authorities shall be contacted. Neb. Rev. Stat. §28-1221; Neb. Rev. Stat. §879-267(1) and 293.

## D. <u>Firearms, Explosives, and Weapons</u>.

1. <u>Firearms, Etc.</u> Knowingly possessing, handling, transmitting, using, intimidating with, or threatening with any firearm, explosive, destructive device, pipe bomb, or stun gun. For purposes of this subsection II (D)(1), firearm means any weapon, including a starter gun, which will or is designed to or may readily be converted to expel a projectile by the action of an explosive, or the frame or receiver of any such weapon, or any firearm muffler or firearm silencer, or any destructive device. Such term does not include an antique firearm.

## a. Sanctions on School Grounds.

- (1) <u>Minimum Sanction</u>. Mandatory expulsion for one (1) year. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of expulsion.
- (2) <u>Mandatory Action</u>. Legal authorities shall be contacted. Neb. Rev. Stat. §§ 28-1202 to 1204.04, 1215, 1216 and 1220; Neb. Rev. Stat. §§ 79-267 (5) and 293.

## b. Sanctions off School Grounds.

- (1) Citation for illegal possession of a weapon during academic school year or the student admits that he or she has violated subsection II(D). Suspension from extracurricular activities for one (1) year.
- 2. Use and Possession of Dangerous Weapons Other Guns. Using, intimidating with, threatening with, possessing on one's person, handling or transmitting any paint ball gun, air soft gun, B.B. gun, or pellet gun. Using, intimidating with, threatening with, handling, transmitting, possessing on one's person or in one's vehicle any dangerous weapon, including but not limited to any paint ball gun, air soft gun, B.B. gun, or pellet gun.

## a. <u>Sanctions on School Grounds</u>.

- (1) <u>Minimum Sanction</u>. <u>Mandatory expulsion for one (1) year.</u>
  <u>Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of expulsion.</u>
  <u>Long-term Suspension. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of suspension.</u>
- (2) Maximum Sanction. Expulsion for the remainder of the school year if the misconduct occurs during first semester. If the misconduct occurs during second semester the expulsion shall remain in effect for summer school and may remain in effect for first semester of the following school year. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of expulsion. Neb. Rev. Stat. §§ 79-283 (3).

(3) <u>Mandatory Action</u>. Legal authorities shall be contacted. Neb. Rev. Stat. §§ 28-1202 to 1204.04; Neb. Rev. Stat. §§ 79-267 (5) and 293.

## b. <u>Sanctions off School Grounds</u>.

- (1) Citation for illegal possession of a weapon during academic school year or the student admits that he or she has violated subsection II(D). Suspension from extracurricular activities for one (1) year.
- 3. <u>Possession of Other Guns in Vehicles</u>. <u>Possessing any paint ball gun, air soft gun, B.B. gun or pellet gun in any vehicle on school grounds, provided that any such gun is not in any manner handled either within or outside of the vehicle.</u>
  - a. <u>Maximum Sanction</u>. <u>Expulsion</u>. <u>Suspension from extracurricular activities</u> during time of expulsion.
- 3. <u>Other Weapons</u>. Using or threatening with a knife, throwing star, brass knuckles, chemical substances (including, but not limited to, mace, pepper guns, and bleach), and any other objects that could be used to injure a person.

## a. <u>Sanctions on School Grounds</u>.

- (1) <u>Minimum Sanction</u>. <u>Mandatory expulsion</u>. <u>Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of expulsion</u>. <u>Long-term Suspension</u>. <u>Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of suspension</u>.
- (2) Maximum Sanction. Expulsion for the remainder of the school year if the misconduct occurs during first semester. If the misconduct occurs during second semester the expulsion shall remain in effect for summer school and may remain in effect for first semester of the following school year. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of expulsion. Neb. Rev. Stat. §§ 79-283 (3).
- (3) <u>Mandatory Action</u>. Legal authorities shall be contacted. Neb. Rev. Stat. §§28-1202 to 1204.04; Neb. Rev. Stat. §§79-267 (5) and 293.

## b. <u>Sanctions off School Grounds</u>.

- (1) Citation during academic school year or the student admits that he or she has violated subsection II(D). Suspension from extracurricular activities for one (1) year.
- 4. <u>Possession of Certain Prohibited Objects</u>. Knowingly possessing, handling, or transmitting knives, throwing stars, brass knuckles, or other objects not enumerated above which could cause injury.
  - a. <u>Minimum Sanction</u>. Short-term suspension. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of suspension.
  - b. <u>Maximum Sanction</u>. Expulsion. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of expulsion.
- 5. <u>Possession of Look-a-Like Weapons</u>. Possessing a look-a-like weapon, the object must closely resemble a real weapon in size, shape, and color even when examined up close.
  - a. <u>Minimum Sanction</u>. Short-term suspension. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of suspension.
  - b. <u>Maximum Sanction</u>. Long-term suspension. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of suspension.

- 6. <u>Exception for Certain Firearms</u>. Subsection II(D) shall not apply to:
  - a. The issuance of firearms to or possession of firearms by members of the Reserve Officers Training Corps when training; or
  - b. Firearms which may lawfully be possessed by the person receiving instruction under the immediate supervision of an adult instructor who may lawfully possess firearms.
  - c. Firearms and guns which may lawfully be possessed and used off school grounds, not at a school function, activity, or event.
- E. <u>Extortion</u>. Threatening or intimidating any student for the purpose of or with the intent of obtaining money or anything of value from such student.
  - 1. <u>Maximum Sanction</u>. Expulsion. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of expulsion.
  - 2. <u>Mandatory Action</u>. Legal authorities shall be contacted. Neb. Rev. Stat. §§79-267(4) and 293.
- F. <u>Sexual Assault or Attempted Sexual Assault</u>. Any sexual assault or attempt to sexually assault any person. Sexual assault shall mean sexual assault in the first or second degree as defined in Neb. Rev. Stat. §§28-319 and 320 or sexual assault of a child in the first, second or third degree as defined in Neb. Rev. Stat. §§ 28-319.01 and 320.01. Neb. Rev. Stat. §79-267(9).
  - 1. Sanctions on School Grounds.
    - a. <u>Minimum Sanction</u>. Mandatory expulsion for one (1) year and possible reassignment upon return. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of expulsion.
    - b. <u>Mandatory Action</u>. Legal authorities shall be contacted. Neb. Rev. Stat. §§79-267(9) and 293.
  - 2. Sanctions off School Grounds.
    - a. <u>Minimum Sanction</u>. Suspension from extracurricular activities for one (1) year.
    - b. Maximum Sanction. Expulsion for one (1) year. A complaint must have been filed by a prosecutor in a court of competent jurisdiction alleging that the student has sexually assaulted or attempted to sexually assault any person off school grounds not at a school function, activity, or event, and the student's presence at school has a direct and immediate effect on maintaining discipline, order, or safety in the school. Sexual assault shall mean sexual assault in the first degree as defined in Neb. Rev. Stat. §28-319, sexual assault in the second degree as defined in Neb. Rev. Stat. §28-320, sexual assault of a child in the second or third degree as defined in Neb. Rev. Stat. §28-320.01, or sexual assault of a child in the first degree as defined in Neb. Rev. Stat. §28-319.01, as such statutes now provide or may hereafter be amended. Neb. Rev. Stat. §79-267(9).
- G. <u>Sexual Contact</u>. The intentional touching of another person's sexual or intimate parts or the intentional touching of another person's clothing covering the immediate area of the other person's sexual or intimate parts, without the consent of the other person. Sexual contact also includes the non-consensual touching by the other person of the actor's sexual or intimate parts or the clothing covering the immediate area of the actor's sexual or intimate parts when such touching is intentionally caused by the actor. The sexual contact must be such that it can be reasonably construed as being for the purpose of sexual arousal or gratification of either party. Neb. Rev. Stat. §§28-318(5) and 320.

#### 1. Sanctions on School Grounds.

- a. <u>Minimum Sanction</u>. Short-term suspension. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of suspension.
- b. <u>Maximum Sanction</u>. Expulsion. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of expulsion.
- c. <u>Mandatory Action</u>. Legal authorities must be contacted upon the request of the offended party. Neb. Rev. Stat. §79-293.

## 2. Sanctions off School Grounds.

- a. Citation during academic school year or the student admits that he or she has violated subsection II(G). Suspension from extracurricular activities for one (1) year.
- H. <u>Sexual Harassment</u>. Unwanted or unwelcome activity of a sexual nature which materially interferes with or substantially disrupts the educational process. This may include, but is not limited to, unwanted touching, pinching, patting, verbal comments of a sexual nature, sexual name-calling, pressure to engage in sexual activity, repeated propositions, written messages, notes, cartoons or graffiti of a sexual nature, and unwanted body contact.
  - Maximum Sanction. Expulsion. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of expulsion.
- I. <u>Harassment.</u> Any intentionally hurtful, demeaning, or disparaging acts, words, symbolic representations, or behavior used by a student or students against another student or students that is disruptive of the educational process. This includes, but is not limited to, verbal, physical, visual, or graphic actions such as name-calling, taunting, mocking, slandering, humiliating, defaming, teasing, pestering; and making derogatory remarks, demeaning jokes, disparaging drawings or notes.
  - 1. <u>Maximum Sanction</u>. Expulsion. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of expulsion.
- J. <u>Bullying</u>. Any intentionally hostile or offensive verbal, written, graphic, demonstrative, electronic, or physical act that has the purpose of exerting domination over another student through the act of intimidating, frightening, oppressing, or adversely controlling the student, and that is disruptive of the educational process or any ongoing pattern of physical, verbal, written, graphic, demonstrative or electronic abuse, on school grounds, in a vehicle owned, leased, or contracted by a school being used for a school purpose by a school employee or his or her designee, or at school-sponsored activities or school-sponsored athletic events. This may include, but is not limited to, verbal, graphic, written or electronic activities such as name-calling, taunting, blackmailing, inciting to fight, terrorizing, or physical or demonstrative activities such as poking, blocking or impeding, following, hair pulling, mock hitting motions, intentionally bumping, tripping, and damaging clothing.
  - 1. <u>Maximum Sanction</u>. Expulsion. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of expulsion.
- K. <u>Hazing</u>. Any activity by which a person intentionally or recklessly endangers the physical or mental health or safety of an individual for the purpose of initiation into, admission into, affiliation with, or continued membership with or participation in any group or activity. Such hazing activity shall include, but shall not be limited to the following: whipping; beating; branding; forced and prolonged calisthenics; prolonged exposure to the elements; forced consumption of any food, liquor, beverage, drug, or harmful substance not generally intended for human consumption; prolonged sleep deprivation; harassing by exacting unnecessary or disagreeable work, banter, ridicule, or criticism; or any brutal treatment or the performance of any unlawful act which endangers the physical or mental health or safety of any person. Consent to the hazing by the student(s) shall not be a defense to hazing.

 Maximum Sanction. Expulsion. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of expulsion.

## III. Violations Against Public Health and Safety.

A. <u>Possession of Alcohol or other Drugs</u>. Possession or use of an illegal narcotic drug, controlled substance, mood-altering or behavior-affecting substance, or look-a-like substance, or possession or use of a prescribed medication by a student for whom the prescribed medication was not prescribed; or possession or use of drug paraphernalia. Possession or use of alcohol or an alcohol-containing beverage or liquor capable of human consumption.

#### 1. Sanctions on School Grounds.

- a. <u>First Offense</u>. Suspension for nineteen (19) school days. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of suspension. Parents, at their own expense, may choose to participate in a District-approved suspension reduction program. Successful completion of this program may reduce the suspension and curtailment of extracurricular activities by a maximum of nine (9) school days (results in a total of ten (10) days out of school).
- b. <u>Additional Offenses.</u> Mandatory expulsion. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of expulsion. Prior violations of subsections III(A), (B), (C), (D), or (G) will be included as previous offenses.
- c. <u>Mandatory Action</u>. Legal authorities shall be contacted. Neb. Rev. Stat. §§79-267(6) and 293.

## 2. <u>Sanctions off School Grounds</u>.

- a. Citation during academic school year or the student admits that he or she has violated subsection III(A). Curtailment of extracurricular activities for nineteen (19) school days.
  - (1) <u>First Offense.</u> Parents, at their own expense, may choose to participate in a District-approved suspension reduction program. Successful completion of this program may reduce the curtailment of extracurricular activities by a maximum of nine (9) school days (results in a total of ten (10) school days curtailment of extracurricular activities).
  - (2) <u>Additional Offenses.</u> Suspension from extracurricular activities for one (1) year. Prior violations of subsections III(A), (B), (C), (D), or (G) on or off school grounds will be included as previous offenses.
- B. <u>Distribution of Alcohol or other Drugs</u>. Distribution or attempted distribution to any other person, of any illegal narcotic drug, controlled substance, look-a-like substance, mood-altering or behavior affecting substance, drug paraphernalia, or alcohol.

## 1. Sanctions on School Grounds.

- a. <u>First Offense.</u> Mandatory expulsion. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of expulsion.
- b. <u>Mandatory Action</u>. Legal authorities shall be contacted. Neb. Rev. Stat. §§79-267(6) and 293.

#### 2. Sanctions off School Grounds.

- a. Citation during academic school or the student admits that he or she has violated subsection III(B). Curtailment of extracurricular activities for one (1) year.
- C. Possession, Use and Transportation of Medications. The possession, use, and transportation of

prescribed and non-prescribed medications shall be in accordance with the following rules.

- 1. <u>Possession of Medications (Preschool and Elementary Levels)</u>. Possession of prescribed or non-prescribed medications, or possession of prescribed or non-prescribed medications on school grounds during transportation to and from school, is prohibited. Elementary school students may possess and use inhalers, as well as glucose tablets, according to the provisions of Rule 5600.2.
  - a. <u>First Offense.</u> Short-term suspension. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of suspension.

#### b. Additional Offenses.

- (1) <u>Maximum Sanction.</u> Expulsion. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of expulsion. Prior violations of subsections III(A), (B), (C), (D), or (G) will be included as previous offenses.
- 2. Possession of Medications (Middle School Level). Possession of prescribed or non-prescribed medications, or possession of prescribed medications on school grounds during transportation to and from school, is prohibited. Middle school students may transport non-prescribed medications to and from school but must turn it into the nurse upon arrival at school. Middle school students may possess and use inhalers, as well as glucose tablets, according to the provisions of Rule 5600.2.

## a. <u>First Offense</u>.

- (1) <u>Minimum Sanction.</u> Short-term suspension. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of suspension.
- (2) <u>Maximum Sanction.</u> Long-term suspension. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of suspension. Parents, at their own expense, may choose to participate in a District-approved suspension reduction program. Successful completion of this program may reduce the curtailment of extracurricular activities by a maximum of nine (9) school days (results in a total of ten (10) school days curtailment of extracurricular activities).

## b. Additional Offenses.

- (1) <u>Maximum Sanction.</u> Expulsion. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of expulsion. Prior violations of subsections III(A), (B), (C), (D), or (G) will be included as previous offenses.
- 3. Possession of Medications (High School Level). Possession of prescribed medications is prohibited. High school students may possess non-prescribed medications, but they may not possess prescribed medications except in transport to and from school. Prescribed medications must be turned into the nurse upon arrival at school. High school students may possess and use glucose tablets and inhalers according to the provisions of Rule 5600.2.

#### a. <u>First Offense</u>.

(1) <u>Maximum Sanction.</u> Long-term suspension. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of suspension. Parents, at their own expense, may choose to participate in a District-approved suspension reduction program. Successful completion of this program may reduce the curtailment of extracurricular activities by a maximum of nine (9) school days (results in a total of ten (10) school days curtailment of extracurricular activities).

#### b. Additional Offenses.

- (1) <u>Maximum Sanction.</u> Expulsion. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of expulsion. Prior violations of subsections III(A), (B), (C), (D), or (G) will be included as previous offenses.
- D. <u>Distribution of Prescribed Medications</u>. Distribution or attempted distribution to any other person, of any prescribed medication.
  - 1. <u>First Offense</u>. Mandatory expulsion. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of expulsion.
  - 2. <u>Mandatory Action</u>. Legal authorities shall be contacted. Neb. Rev. Stat. §§79-267(6) and 293.
- E. <u>Distribution of Non-Prescribed Medications</u>. Distribution or attempted distribution to any other person, of any non-prescribed medication.
  - 1. <u>First Offense</u>. Short-term suspension. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of suspension.

## 2. Additional Offenses.

- a. <u>Minimum Sanction</u>. Long-term suspension. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of suspension.
- b. <u>Maximum Sanction</u>. Expulsion. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of expulsion.
- F. <u>Receiving Non-Prescribed Medications</u>. Receiving non-prescription medications by high school students that are distributed by another student at school.
  - 1. <u>Maximum Sanction</u>. Short-term suspension. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of suspension.
- G. <u>Under the Influence of Alcohol or Other Drugs</u>. Being intoxicated or under the influence of any illegal narcotic drug, controlled substance, prescribed medication by a student for whom the prescribed medication was not prescribed, mood-altering or behavior-affecting substance, or alcohol.

## 1. Sanctions on School Grounds.

- a. <u>First Offense</u>. Suspension for nineteen (19) school days. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of suspension. Parents, at their own expense, may choose to participate in a District-approved suspension reduction program. Successful completion of this program may reduce the suspension and curtailment of extracurricular activities by a maximum of nine (9) school days (results in a total of ten (10) days out of school).
- b. <u>Additional Offenses</u>. Mandatory expulsion. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of expulsion. Prior violations of subsections III(A), (B), (C), (D), or (G) will be included as previous offenses.
- c. <u>Mandatory Action</u>. Legal authorities shall be contacted. Neb. Rev. Stat. §§79-267(6) and 293.

## 2. <u>Sanctions off School Grounds</u>.

- a. Citation during academic school year or the student admits that he or she has violated subsection III(G). Curtailment of extracurricular activities for nineteen (19) school days.
  - (1) <u>First Offense.</u> Parents, at their own expense, may choose to participate in a District-approved suspension reduction program. Successful completion of this program may reduce the curtailment of

- extracurricular activities by a maximum of nine (9) school days (results in a total of ten (10) school days curtailment of extracurricular activities).
- (2) <u>Additional Offenses.</u> Suspension from extracurricular activities for one (1) year. Prior violations of subsections III(A), (B), (C), (D), or (G) on or off school grounds will be included as previous offenses.
- H. <u>Exposure to Bodily Fluids</u>. Intentionally spitting, throwing, wiping, or otherwise dispersing bodily fluids on or to another student or staff member for the purpose of infecting, inciting, demeaning, or intimidating that person.
  - 1. <u>Minimum Sanction</u>. Short-term suspension. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of suspension.
  - 2. <u>Maximum Sanction</u>. Long-term suspension. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of suspension.
- I. <u>Tobacco</u>. Possession or use of tobacco or tobacco products.
  - 1. <u>Maximum Sanction</u>. Long-term suspension. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of suspension.
- J. Possession of Fireworks.
  - 1. <u>Maximum Sanction</u>. Expulsion. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of expulsion.
- K. <u>Use of Fireworks</u>. Use or lighting of firecrackers or fireworks of any description.
  - 1. <u>Maximum Sanction</u>. Expulsion. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of expulsion.
- IV. <u>Violations against Public Decency and Good Morals.</u>
  - A. <u>Public Indecency</u>. Behavior resulting in public indecency (see definition). This subsection shall apply only to students above grade five (5). Neb. Rev. Stat. §79-267(7).
    - 1. <u>Maximum Sanction</u>. Expulsion. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of expulsion.
  - B. <u>Profanity and Obscenity</u>. Written or oral language that is reasonably offensive or repulsive to the person hearing the same and which is disruptive of the educational process.
    - 1. <u>Maximum Sanction</u>. Expulsion. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of expulsion.
  - C. <u>Disparaging Language/Symbolism</u>. Disparaging or demeaning language or symbolic actions of any kind including, but not limited to gestures or language that is intended to disparage, demean, or subject another student or staff member to ridicule.
    - Maximum Sanction. Expulsion. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of expulsion.
  - D. <u>Secret Organizations/Gangs</u>. Participation or membership in any secret fraternity, sorority, club, association, or organization is prohibited. The wearing of any ring, pin, or insignia of such a secret organization is also prohibited. Organizations or gangs, which initiate, advocate, or promote violence, drug or alcohol use, sex, criminal activity, or activities which disrupt the school environment or threaten the safety or wellbeing of persons or property, and which identify themselves through the use of a name, geographic territory, unique appearance, or language, are a substantial disruption to and material interference with the educational environment, and are prohibited. The use of hand signals, graffiti, or the presence of any apparel, jewelry, accessory, or manner of grooming which, by virtue of its color, arrangement, trademark, symbol, or other

attributes indicates or implies membership in or affiliation with such a group, constitutes a substantial disruption to and material interference with the educational environment, and are prohibited.

1. <u>Maximum Sanction</u>. Expulsion. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of expulsion.

## V. <u>Violations against Property.</u>

- A. <u>Damage to Property</u>. Willfully causing or attempting to cause substantial damage or participating in behavior that results in negligent damage to property, or repeated damage to property. This shall include school property lent to the student which the student damages. As to any such damaged property, the student's parent(s) or guardian(s) shall be liable for the damage to the school property. Neb. Rev. Stat. §79-267(2).
  - 1. <u>Maximum Sanction</u>. Expulsion. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of expulsion.
  - 2. <u>Mandatory Action</u>. Legal authorities shall be contacted when the value of the property is five hundred dollars (\$500.00) or more. Neb. Rev. Stat. §28-519; Neb. Rev. Stat. §\$79-267(2) and 293.
- B. <u>Theft/Larceny</u>. Stealing or attempting to steal property, or repeated theft of property. This will include school property lent to a student that is not returned upon demand by an authorized staff member and for which there is no reasonable justification for the failure to return the property. Neb. Rev. Stat. §79-267(2).
  - 1. <u>Maximum Sanction</u>. Expulsion. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of expulsion.
  - 2. <u>Mandatory Action</u>. Legal authorities shall be contacted when the value of the property involved is five hundred dollars (\$500.00) or more. Neb. Rev. Stat. §\$28-511 and 518; Neb. Rev. Stat. §\$79-267(2) and 293.
  - 3. <u>Sanctions off School Grounds</u>. Committing burglary or theft which constitutes a felony provided the student has received a citation by a law enforcement officer which involves the offense subject to this subsection or the student admits that he or she has violated subsection V(B). Suspension from extracurricular activities for one (1) year.
- C. <u>Arson or False Fire Alarm</u>. Intentionally starting a fire. Use of any fire causing agents to start or attempt to start a fire. Purposely or knowingly causing a false fire alarm. Neb. Rev. Stat. §§28-502 to 504 and 907; Neb. Rev. Stat. §79-267(10).
  - 1. <u>Minimum Sanction</u>. Short-term suspension. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of suspension. There is no mandated minimum sanction below grade six (6).
  - 2. <u>Maximum Sanction</u>. Expulsion. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of expulsion.
  - 3. <u>Mandatory Action</u>. Legal authorities shall be contacted if it is believed the arson was criminal. Neb. Rev. Stat. §§28-502 to 504 and 907; Neb. Rev. Stat. §§79-267(10) and 293.
- D. <u>False Alarm or Report</u>. Purposely making a false alarm or false report, or purposely furnishing false information or making a false communication or statement, whether verbal, written or electronic, concerning the existence of any bomb, explosive device or weapon, dangerous chemical substance, or biochemical or terroristic device, or concerning another's intent or attempt to be made to kill, injure, or intimidate any individual or to use any bomb, explosive device, or weapon, dangerous chemical substance, or biochemical or terroristic device, or concerning the need for medical, police, or emergency services or procedures. Neb. Rev. Stat. §\$28-907 and 1221; Neb. Rev. Stat. §79-267(10).

- 1. <u>Minimum Sanction</u>. Short-term suspension. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of suspension.
- 2. <u>Maximum Sanction</u>. Expulsion. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of expulsion.
- 3. <u>Mandatory Action</u>. Legal authorities shall be contacted. Neb. Rev. Stat. §§28-907 and 1221; Neb. Rev. Stat. §§79-267(10) and 293.
- E. <u>Computers</u>. Direct or indirect use of District computers, computer networks, or computer systems, which involves offensive, personal, commercial, and/or religious messages, or any unauthorized access or use of a District computer, computer network, or computer system which violates District policy or state or federal law. Neb. Rev. Stat. §\$28-1341 to 1348; Neb. Rev. Stat. §79-267(10).
  - 1. <u>Maximum Sanction</u>. Expulsion. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of expulsion.
  - 2. <u>Mandatory Action</u>. Legal authorities shall be contacted if the action constitutes a felony. Neb. Rev. Stat. §§28-1341 to 1348; Neb. Rev. Stat. §§79-267(10) and 293.

## VI. <u>Violations against School Administration</u>.

- A. <u>Truancy</u>. Unauthorized absence from school. Neb. Rev. Stat. §§79-201 and 209.
  - 1. <u>Maximum Sanction</u>. Short-term suspension. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of suspension.
- B. <u>Gambling</u>. Playing any game of chance for money or other stakes. Neb. Rev. Stat. §79-267(10).
  - 1. <u>Maximum Sanction</u>. Expulsion. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of expulsion.
- C. <u>Dishonesty</u>. Dishonesty that interferes with the educational process.
  - 1. <u>Maximum Sanction</u>. Expulsion. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of expulsion.
- D. <u>Cheating or Plagiarism.</u> Cheating on examinations including but not limited to ELO examinations. Plagiarism on projects including but not limited to reports, research papers, and portfolios.
  - 1. <u>Maximum Sanction</u>. Long-term suspension. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of suspension.
- E. <u>Insubordination</u>. Disrespect for, defying authority of, or refusing to obey requests or directions of teachers, school officials or school employees.
  - 1. <u>Maximum Sanction</u>. Expulsion. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of expulsion.
- F. <u>Disruptive Behavior</u>. Behavior or possession of any item that materially interferes with or substantially disrupts class work, school activities, or the educational process.
  - 1. <u>Maximum Sanction</u>. Expulsion. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of expulsion.
- G. <u>Nuisance Items.</u> Any item in a student's possession that is sufficiently annoying, offensive, unpleasant, or obnoxious that it substantially interferes with or materially interrupts the educational process. These items may include, but are not limited to all electronic devices.
  - 1. <u>Maximum Sanction</u>. Expulsion. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of expulsion.

- H. <u>Unlawful Activity</u>. Engaging in any unlawful activity not specifically covered herein, which constitutes a danger to other students or school personnel, or interferes with school purposes or the educational process. Neb. Rev. Stat. §79-267(10).
  - 1. <u>Maximum Sanction</u>. Expulsion. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of expulsion.
- I. <u>False Complaints</u>. False accusations or complaints against another student or staff member.
  - 1. <u>Maximum Sanction</u>. Long-term suspension. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of suspension.
- J. <u>Noncompliance with Code Yellow or Code Red</u>. Intentionally leaving an assigned area already in containment during a Code Yellow or Code Red alert unless specifically given permission to do so by the supervisor of the assigned area.
  - Minimum Sanction. Long-term suspension. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of suspension.
  - 2. <u>Maximum Sanction</u>. Expulsion. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of expulsion.
- K. <u>Student Identification</u>. Failure of a high school student to present the school approved student identification card upon the request of a District staff member while on school grounds, in a vehicle owned, leased, or contracted by a school being used for a school purpose or in a vehicle being driven for a school purpose by a school employee or by his or her designee, or at a school-sponsored activity or athletic event, or any other place where the governing law permits the District to discipline students for prohibited conduct.
  - 1. <u>Maximum Sanction</u>. Short-term suspension. Suspension from extracurricular activities during time of suspension.

## VII. Repeated Offenses or Series of Prohibited Conduct.

- A. Two (2) or more violations of prohibited conduct or violation of two (2) or more of the acts prohibited herein within the current building level, which constitute a substantial interference with school purposes. Neb. Rev. Stat. §79-267(11).
  - 1. <u>Sanction</u>. Unless otherwise provided herein, prohibited conduct otherwise subject to short-term suspension shall be subject to long-term suspension; conduct otherwise subject to long-term suspension shall be subject to expulsion; prohibited conduct initially subject to expulsion shall be again subject to expulsion.

## VIII. <u>Curtailment of Extracurricular Activities</u>.

- A. <u>General Statement</u>. When reasonably necessary to aid the student, further school purposes, or prevent interference with the educational process, the District shall curtail a student's participation in District extracurricular activities. Students shall not be permitted to be on District property or participate in or attend District-sponsored extracurricular activities during the time period that the student is excluded from school for disciplinary reasons. In addition, students may be curtailed from extracurricular activities for misconduct taking place off school grounds and not at a school function, activity, or event during the academic school year pursuant to the provisions of this section and Rule 5400.4.
- B. Period of Ineligibility for Conduct on School Grounds.
  - 1. Period of Ineligibility. During any time period that a student is excluded from school due to short-term suspension, long-term suspension, expulsion, or emergency exclusion for conduct occurring on school grounds, in a vehicle owned, leased, or contracted by a school being used for a school purpose or in a vehicle being driven for a school purpose by a school employee or by his or her designee, or at a school-sponsored activity or athletic event, or any other place where the governing law permits the District to

- discipline students for prohibited conduct, the student so excluded shall also be ineligible for participation in extracurricular activities for the entire period of exclusion, and will also be prohibited from being on District property or attending any District-sponsored extracurricular events during the period of exclusion from school.
- 2. <u>Effective Following Semester if Necessary</u>. The ineligibility period shall remain in effect during the following semester (including the following school year) if there are insufficient school days in the semester to complete the ineligibility period.
- C. <u>Period of Ineligibility for Conduct off School Grounds</u>. The following prohibited conduct occurring off school grounds not at a school function, activity, or event during the academic school year shall subject the student to the following periods of ineligibility for extracurricular activities:
  - 1. <u>Guns, etc.</u> Knowingly possessing, handling, transmitting, using, intimidating with, or threatening with any object or material that is ordinarily and/or generally considered a firearm, explosive, destructive device, or weapon, including, but not limited to, guns, firearms, pipe bombs, stun guns, paint ball guns, air soft guns, B.B. guns and pellet guns, provided the student has received a citation by a law enforcement officer which involves the offense subject to this subsection or the student admits that he or she has violated this subsection.
    - a. Suspension from extracurricular activities for one (1) year.
  - 2. <u>Other Weapons</u>. Using or threatening with a knife, throwing star, brass knuckles, chemical substances (including, but not limited to, mace, pepper guns, and bleach), and any other object that could be used to injure a person, provided the student has received a citation by a law enforcement officer which involves the offense subject to this subsection or the student admits that he or she has violated this subsection.
    - a. <u>Sanction</u>. Ineligibility period of one (1) year.
  - 3. <u>Sexual Contact</u>. The intentional touching of another person's sexual or intimate parts or the intentional touching of another person's clothing covering the immediate area of the other person's sexual or intimate parts, without the consent of the other person. Sexual contact also includes the non-consensual touching by the other person of the actor's sexual or intimate parts or the clothing covering the immediate area of the actor's sexual or intimate parts when such touching is intentionally caused by the actor, provided the student has received a citation by a law enforcement officer which involves the offense subject to this subsection or the student admits that he or she has violated this subsection.
    - a. <u>Sanction</u>. Ineligibility period of one (1) year.
  - 4. <u>Possession of Alcohol or other Drugs</u>. The use or possession of an illegal narcotic drug, drug paraphernalia, look-a-like substance, controlled substance, mood-altering or behavior-affecting substance, or alcoholic beverage, provided the student has received a citation by a law enforcement officer which involves the offense subject to this subsection or the student admits that he or she has violated this subsection.
    - a. <u>First Offense</u>. Ineligibility period of nineteen (19) school days. Parents, at their own expense, may choose to participate in a District-approved suspension reduction program. Successful completion of this program may reduce the curtailment of extracurricular activities a maximum of nine (9) school days (results in a total of ten (10) school days curtailment of extracurricular activities).
    - b. <u>Additional Offenses</u>. Suspension from extracurricular activities for one (1) year. Prior violations of subsections III(A), (B), (C), (D), or (G) on or off school grounds will be included as previous offenses.
  - 5. <u>Distribution of Alcohol or other Drugs</u>. The dispensing, sale, or the intent to sell or dispense an illegal narcotic drug, look-a-like substance, controlled substance, mood-

altering or behavior-affecting substance, or alcoholic beverage, provided the student has received a citation by a law enforcement officer which involves the offense subject to this subsection or the student admits that he or she has violated this subsection.

- a. <u>Sanction</u>. Ineligibility period of one (1) year.
- 6. Under the Influence of Alcohol or other Drugs. Being intoxicated or under the influence of any illegal narcotic drug, controlled substance, prescribed medication by a student for whom the prescribed medication was not prescribed, mood-altering or behavior-affecting substance, or alcohol, provided the student has received a citation by a law enforcement officer which involves the offense subject to this subsection or the student admits that he or she has violated this subsection.
  - a. <u>First Offense</u>. Ineligibility period of nineteen (19) school days. Parents, at their own expense, may choose to participate in a District-approved suspension reduction program. Successful completion of this program may reduce the curtailment of extracurricular activities a maximum of nine (9) school days (results in a total of ten (10) school days curtailment of extracurricular activities).
  - b. <u>Additional Offenses</u>. Suspension from extracurricular activities for one (1) year. Prior violations of subsections III (A), (B), (C), (D), or (G) on or off school grounds will be included as previous offenses.
- 7. Physical Injury to District Employees, Volunteers, and Students. Causing or attempting to cause personal injury to any District employee, school volunteer, or to any student, provided the student has received a citation by a law enforcement officer which involves the offense subject to this subsection or the student admits that he or she has violated this subsection.
  - a. <u>Sanction</u>. Ineligibility period of remainder of the semester or nineteen (19) school days, whichever is more.
  - b. <u>Additional Offenses</u>. Suspension from extracurricular activities for one (1) year. Prior violations of subsection II(B) on or off school grounds will be included as previous offenses.
- 8. <u>Sexual Assault or Attempted Sexual Assault</u>. Sexually assaulting or attempting to sexually assault any person, provided the student has received a citation by a law enforcement officer which involves the offense subject to this subsection, the student admits that he or she has violated this subsection, or a complaint has been filed by a prosecutor in a court of competent jurisdiction alleging that the student has sexually assaulted or attempted to sexually assault any person.
  - a. <u>Sanction</u>. Ineligibility period of one (1) year.
- 9. <u>Theft/Larceny</u>. Committing a burglary or theft that constitutes a felony, provided the student has received a citation by a law enforcement officer which involves the offense subject to this subsection or the student admits that he or she has violated this subsection.
  - a. <u>Sanction</u>. Ineligibility period of one (1) year.
- 10. <u>Repeated Offenses</u>. Two (2) or more offenses of one (1) of the above prohibited actions. Prior offenses of the above prohibited actions will be included as previous offenses.
  - a. <u>Sanction</u>: Ineligibility period of one (1) year.
- D. <u>District Events During Ineligibility Period</u>. Students who are ineligible for participation in extracurricular activities will also be prohibited from attending any District-sponsored extracurricular events during the ineligibility period.
- E. <u>Effective Following Semester if Necessary</u>. The ineligibility period shall remain in effect during

the following semester (including the following school year) if there are insufficient school days in the semester to complete the ineligibility period.

- F. <u>Commutation</u>. Penalties assigned under this Section may be reduced by the Superintendent or Superintendent's designee upon the successful completion of counseling, community service, or other alternatives to curtailment set by the District. The District shall have the sole discretion in determining whether the student is eligible for commutation, and what form the counseling, community service, or other alternatives to curtailment must be successfully completed before commutation may take place. Any costs associated with counseling, community service, or other alternatives to curtailment shall be borne by the student or the student's parent(s) or guardian(s).
- G. <u>Effective Date</u>. The effective date of the curtailment of extracurricular activities shall be the date that the principal or principal's designee provides the student with the oral or written notice of the charges except the principal shall not issue a letter of curtailment until there is a student admission, court decision or uncontested citation.

## IX. DEFINITIONS.

- A. "Alcoholic beverage" shall mean any substance subject to the jurisdiction of the Nebraska Liquor Commission.
- B. "Citation" shall mean a summons to appear in court issued by a law enforcement officer.
- C. "Controlled substance" shall mean opiates, opium derivatives, depressants, stimulants, and the substances and derivatives as defined by Neb. Rev. Stat. §28-401(4) including, but not limited to, "uppers", "downers", barbiturates, amphetamines, LSD, heroin, hashish, hallucinogenic or cocaine, and substances, such as glue, to the extent any such substance is used for the purpose of mood or behavior alteration by a student, and any other substance which alters the mood or behavior and which is not taken for medical purposes (e.g., steroids).
- D. "Current building level" shall mean the current education level in which the student is enrolled (i.e., grades 9-12 are the high school building level, grades 6-8 are the middle school building level, and grades K-5 are the elementary school building level).
- E. "Curtailment of extracurricular activities" shall mean that the student is ineligible for participation in or attending any extracurricular activities. During any time that a student is excluded from school for conduct occurring while within school jurisdiction, the student is ineligible for participation in or attending any extracurricular activities.
- F. "Destructive device" shall mean (1) any explosive, incendiary or poison gas-bomb, grenade, rocket having a propellant charge of more than four (4) ounces, missile having an explosive or incendiary charge of more than one-quarter ounce, mine, or device similar to any of the devices described in the proceeding clauses; (2) any type of weapon (other than a shotgun shell which is generally recognized as particularly suitable for sporting purposes) by whatever name known which will, or which may be readily converted to expel a projectile by the action of an explosive or other propellant, and which has any barrel with a bore of more than one-half inch in diameter; and (3) any combination of parts either designed or intended for use in converting any device into any destructive device or from which a destructive device may be readily assembled.
- G. "Exclusion" shall mean that time period a student is excluded from school during short-term suspension, long-term suspension, emergency exclusion, or expulsion. It may also mean that period that the student is mandatorily reassigned.
- H. "Expulsion" shall mean exclusion from all schools in the District (except the location designated for alternative education).
- I. "Extracurricular activities" shall mean all athletic teams, activities, groups, clubs, homecomings, proms, dances, graduation ceremonies, and all other organizations or events sponsored by or associated with the District which are not part of the District curriculum.
- J. "Firearms" shall mean (1) any weapon (including a starter gun) which will or is designed to or may readily be converted to expel a projectile by the action of an explosive; (2) the frame or receiver of any

- such weapon; (3) any firearm muffler or firearm silencer; or (4) any destructive device. Such term does not include an antique firearm.
- K. "Illegal narcotic drug" shall mean the illegal substances as defined by Neb. Rev. Stat. §28-401(15).
- L. "Ineligibility period" shall mean that period of time that a District student is prohibited from participating in and/or attending any District extracurricular activities.
- M. "Injury" shall mean damage to a person that results in a specific wound or wounds that requires first aid treatment or a physician's care.
- N. "Long-term suspension" shall mean exclusion from all schools in the District for more than five (5) school days but less than twenty (20) school days. If there are insufficient school days in the first semester to complete the suspension period, the suspension period will be carried over to the second semester.
- O. "Look-a-like substance" (also known as imitation controlled substance) shall mean any substance which is not a controlled substance, but which by its appearance (including, but not limited to, color, shape, size, markings, or packaging) or by representations made, induce or are intended to induce, persons to believe that the substance is a controlled substance. "Look-a-like substance" shall include any beverage containing alcohol or a beverage that is represented to contain alcohol.
- P. "Medication" shall be broadly defined and shall mean all prescribed medications, over the counter and other non-prescribed medications, and all chemical substances, compounds, homeopathic substances, herbs, vitamins, and/or devices, which purport to aid in a person's health or well-being or are intended for use in the diagnoses, cure, mitigation, treatment, or prevention of diseases, or are intended to affect the structure or any function of the body; and any device, instrument, apparatus, implement, machine, contrivance, implant, or other similar or related article, including any component part or accessory, which is prescribed by a physician, physician assistant, or advanced practice registered nurse, and dispensed by a pharmacist or other person authorized by law.
- Q. "Non-prescribed medication" shall mean all medications which are available without a prescription or order from a person who is licensed under the laws of Nebraska to prescribe medications.
- R. "On school grounds" shall mean on District property, in a vehicle owned, leased, or contracted by the District being used for a school purpose or in a vehicle being driven for a school purpose by a school employee or his or her designee, or at a school-sponsored activity or athletic event, or any other place where the governing law permits the District to discipline students for prohibited conduct.
- S. "One year" shall mean the three hundred sixty-five (365) days that follow the acts at issue.
- T. "Prescribed medication" shall mean all medications which are available only with a prescription or order from a person who is licensed under the laws of Nebraska to prescribe medications.
- U. "Prior violations" shall mean violations of the cited subsections, which occurred while the student is in the current building level. Student conduct violations which occurred in another school district at the current building level shall be included as prior violations. For suspension, expulsion, or reassignment purposes, prior violations shall only include previous student conduct violations which occurred on school grounds. For curtailment of extracurricular activities purposes, prior violations shall include previous student conduct violations which occurred on or off school grounds.
- V. "Public indecency" shall mean performing, procuring, or assisting any other person to perform, in a public place and where the conduct may reasonably be expected to be publicly viewed: (1) An act of sexual penetration; (2) An exposure of the genitals, female breasts or buttocks of the body done with intent to affront or alarm any person; or (3) A lewd fondling or caressing of the body of another person of the same or opposite sex.
- W. "School day" shall mean any day that school is in session and students are attending academic courses. It does not include practices for extracurricular activities held during the summer, or weekends and vacations that occur during the academic school year.
- X. "School jurisdiction" shall mean on District property, in a vehicle owned, leased, or contracted by the

District being used for a school purpose or in a vehicle being driven for a school purpose by a school employee or his or her designee, or at a school-sponsored activity or athletic event, or any other place where the governing law permits the District to discipline students for prohibited conduct.

- Y. "Sexual assault" shall mean sexual assault in the first degree as defined in Neb. Rev. Stat. §28-319, sexual assault in the second degree as defined in Neb. Rev. Stat. §28-320, sexual assault of a child in the second or third degree as defined in Neb. Rev. Stat. §28-320.01, or sexual assault of a child in the first degree as defined in Neb Rev. Stat. §28-319.01, as such statutes now provide or may hereafter be amended.
- Z. "Sexual or intimate parts" shall mean the genital area, groin, inner thighs, buttocks or breasts.
- AA. "Short-term suspension" shall mean exclusion from all schools in the District not to exceed five (5) school days. If there are insufficient school days in the first semester to complete the suspension period, the suspension period will be carried over to the second semester.
- BB. "Under the influence" shall mean the manifestation of physical and physiological symptoms or reactions caused by the use of any illegal narcotic drug, controlled substance, mood-altering or behavior- affecting substance, prescribed medication by a student for whom the prescribed medication was not prescribed, or alcohol.

**Background:** The annual Personnel Report contains information regarding the District's staffing levels, classroom enrollment averages, teacher preparation, experience and student teacher internships. Report highlights include:

- 67% of our certificated staff hold an advanced degree.
- Certificated staff members have worked for Millard for an average of 11.1 years and an average of 14.5 total years in education.
- We hosted 83 student teachers in Millard during the 2012-2013 school year.
- A historical look at personnel distribution and ratios between staff positions is provided along with graphs to illustrate trends since 1980.
- Information regarding retention percentages of teachers hired over the last five years is included. Our first year staff member retention rate for the 2012-13 school year was 96% (New to profession teachers was 92%)
- Across all job classes, we show an increase of 18.81 FTE's from the previous school year. Since 2010, we show a reduction of 24.71 FTE's for certificated teachers and 40.31 FTE's for all staff. Over this same time period student enrollment has increased by approximately 795 students.
- Information regarding our health insurance fund is included which shows an average enrollment of 2,469 employees taking insurance.
- The information provided is a "snapshot" of information that can change from day-to-day and year-to-year. As a result, staff changes reflect the difference in the "snapshot" from September 2012 to September 2013.



In December of 2011, EHA offered a one month premium holiday on the condition that the local teachers' bargaining unit agreed to the distribution of the savings between the employee and the employer. While it is our understanding that most districts did not receive 100% of this premium holiday, we have nonetheless reduced the EHA premiums by one-twelfth in 2011-12 for purposes of this chart.


